Closely fitting clothes should be avoided and loose, light-fitting garments should be worn in order to permit the free circulation of air about the body.

When overheated work slowly and bathe the head, chest and wrists in cool water frequently. If the overheated condition continues quit work and rest quietly in some shady place where the breeze can be felt.

Both attacks may be preceded by nausea and delirium, but sunstroke must be distinguished from heat prostration. In the former the heat of the body is below the normal.
