The Ballot, under the New Election Law.

As the new Election Law is now a fact to be met, the sooner it is understood the better. As we have heretofore pointed out, the sooner it is under-stood the better. As we have heretofore pointed out, this law is not so much an educational test, as it is a difficult method of voting. The illiterate, who possesses good eyesight and a reasonable amount of acuteness, will have but little difficulty in marking his ballot; but, the older men, with their failing eyesight and uncertain nerves, although men of intelligence and good judg-ment, are as likely to vote against their convictions, as for them.

Many persons who read and write—or could, before their eyesight failed them—will find it a difficult matter to clearly see, and properly mark, the names on the ballot in the poor light of the little booth in the polling room.

Many such, no doubt, will remain at home, preferring to lose their vote, rath-er than cast it by mistake against their convictions. 

The state officers to be elected are a Comp-troller of the Treasury and a Clerk of the Court of Appeals. A judge will al-so be elected, in the Judicial Circuit, to succeed Judge Charles T. Reifsnider. There will also be a county ticket. The ballot will like-ly contain two or more broad columns of names, and each name must be
