Spraying is not neglected, the trees observed on our "round" being coated with an appli-cation of Bordeaux Mixture. The plum trees are a curiosity, the impenetrable bloom being followed by clusters of the miniature fruit, so thick that apparently not a blossom was blighted. The peach trees also give promise of an abundant yield of that delicious fruit, and our friend's less fortunate neighbors can rest assured that there will be no necessity for going far away to obtain their supply of fruit the

coming summer.




