





It is a good plan to clip the lower ends of the roots before setting, as they start new growth more readily. Clipping early runners is not necessary and should not be done by inexperienced growers. In northern latitudes plant early in May if possible and cultivate well with a view of getting a good growth of new plants before the hot, dry weather of late summer stops growth and prevents late runners from taking root. Early rooting runners make the best plants for next year's fruiting. If plants are prevented from rooting in early summer, they are more liable to injury from the white grub, insects or right, and a light covering is safest.






