The postoffices at Johnsville, and

THE NEW ROAD LAW.

What the Counties are Doing for  
Better Roads.

The following circular letter has just  
been issued by the Maryland Geological  
Survey:

"The people of the state are fast awak-  
ing to the fact that the poor condition of  
roads, wherever they occur, has not been  
altogether the result of shortness of road  
appropriations, but, in part, is due to the  
manner in which the money has been  
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To Measure Rural Routes.

Washington, Sept. 19.—The U. S. De-  
partment of Agriculture is measuring their routes,  
in order that the Rural Free Delivery  
may be enabled to adjust salaries and  
other questions on an equitable basis.

The bicycle wheel is attached a pair


