The President's Vigorous Message.

President Roosevelt's Message to Congress is characteristically vigorous and convincing. Barring several references to foreign powers, which are held to be nusually pointed and in advance of past expressions along the same lines the message is generally commended The tollowing language is used with ref-erence to several of the leading questions

"I believe that under modern industrial conditions it is often necessary, and even where it is not necessary it is yet often wise, that there should be organization of labor in order better to secure the rights of the individual wage-worker.
* * * Of course, any violence, brutality or corruption should not for one moment be tolerated. * * * There is no objection to employes of the Government forming or belonging to unions; but the Government can neither discriminate for nor discriminate against non-union men who employed under it. Moreover, it is a very grave impropriety for Government employes to band themselves together

for the purpose of extorting improperly high salaries from the Government." "I recommend the enactment of a law directed against bribery and corruption in Federal elections * * * and provision for the publication, not only of the expenditures for nominations and elections of all candidates, but also of all contriutions received and expenditures made by political committees.

If there is no intention of providing and of keeping the force necessary [army and navy] to back up a strong attitude, then it is far better not to assume such an attitude. * * * The goal to set before us as a nation, the goal which should be set before all mankind, is the attainment of the peace of justice, of the peace which comes when each nation is not merely safeguarded in its own rights, but scrupulously recognizes and performs its duty toward others.

When we come to deal with great corporations the need for the Government to act directly is far greater than in the case of labor, because great corporations interstate commerce, and interstate commerce is peculiarly the field of the general Government. It is an absurdity to expect to eliminate the abuses in great orporations by State action. It is difficult to be patient with an argument that such matters should be left to the States, ecause more than one State pursues the olicy of creating on easy terms corporations which are never operated within that State at all, but in other States whose laws they ignore. The national Government alone can deal adequately with these great corporations. To try to deal with them in an intemperate, destructive or demagogic spirit would, in all probability, mean that nothing whatever would be accomplished, and, with absolute certainty, that if anything were er of mischief or of evil there is to inter-

Platt, of New York, of a bill proposing to reduce the representation in Congress of Southern States that have disfranchised the negro voter. Its pas-

Washington, Dec. 2.—Extension of the rural free delivery service has resulted in an increase of 1,125 in the number of postoffices discontinued during the fiscal | go. vear ended June 30, 1904, according to the annual report of J. L. Bristow, Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General, in the direction of the Pike. made public to-day.

During the year there were 2,549 post-offices established and 5,587 discontinued, with a saving in salaries of postmasters aggregating \$171,121. At the close of the fiscal year there were 71,131 postoffices in the United States-265 first-class, 1,204 second-class, 3,896 thirdclass and 65,766 fourth-class.
