About Soils and Fertilizers.

analysis of the soil, would show the tiller of the ground just what the needs of his soil were; and what applications of plant food were required to supply the deficiency. But chemists tell us now, there is no deficiency; that most all soils contain enough plant food to last 100 years cropping. The food is in the ground but not in an available condition.

Analysis, then, does not help to solve the puzzling problem. The husband-man, with the aid of the scientist, is left to find out by observation and experiment, what ingredients he must apply to his land to get the best results. Science combined with experimental farming, has pretty fully demonstrated that of the nine or ten essential substances found in every fertile soil, the ingre-

Every nanufacturer of a commercial fertilizer, who puts his product upon the market, must have branded on his bag or barrel the analysis of his goods, showing the amount of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash; thus recognizing the belief that these substances are the true ones to restore fertility to an exhausted soil. The practical question for the farmer is to find out the best and most economical way to supply the essentials above

There are two sources from which to obtain fertilizers for the farm, the homemade product, and the manufactured article known as commercial fertilizer. Which of the two is the cheaper? The home-made, by odds, if there is judicious management on the farm. The chemist who can pick everything to pieces, and reveal the hidden mysteries of nature, tells us that 90% to 95% of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash is left in the manure after the food passes through the animal.

Below is a table giving the relative values of manure from different foods after consumption.

From a ton of Wheat Straw, \$ 2.68 Corn, Clover Hay, Bran, 14.59 Linseed Cake. 19.50 Cotton Meal, 24.50

The above values are approximate and liable to vary, but they do represent about 90 or more per cent. of the first cost of the articles named in the table, except perhaps corn which is poorer in nitrogen than others, nitrogen being the most costly of the three essentials. To realize these values, however, the farmer must save both liquid and solid

excrements, allow neither to go to waste. The liquid portion is richer in nitrogen and phosphates than the solid because the kidneys eliminate from the body those substances containing an excess of nitrogen and phosphates. Beside get-



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

Inspection after each of eleven winter seasons did not reveal a case of heaving by frost Where an ice sheet covered the plants however, the clovers, alfalfa, timothy and redtop were killed out, while brome grass and the weed quack grass had withstood this adverse condition.

The fattening of hogs on apples may be considered a successful method, if being certain that this fruit possesses a value for that purpose that has been overlooked, and the destruction of insects by hogs in consuming the faller apples has given a new value to or chards. The animals should be allowed in the orchard from the time the fruit begins to fall until it is time to gather apples for the winter, and they will in most cases be found in good condition for conversion into pork. When it is necessary to put them into the pen, boiled apples mixed with small quantities of corn, oats, peas or buckwheat meal will make them lard well and fill the farmer's barrel with sound, sweet pork of the first quality -Philadelphia Record.


