#### THE SEASON OF LENT Reasons for Special Worship

Outlined Lent is an annual season of fasting

and prayer, consisting of forty week days, in preparation for Easter which commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Jesus Christ.

Lent is derived from the Anglo Saxon word, lengthen, lencten meaning spring. Lent is a spring festival of the Christian Church. It begins with Ash Wednesday and extends to Easter Sunday. This is a period of forty days, excluding Sundays, given to fasting and prayer. Some religious denominations emphasize this sacred season of the Church more than others. This is especially true of the ritualistic churches.

The significant experiences of the Master included in this sacred season are His trials, betrayal, denial, sufferings, and death. Lent represents the period when indignity after indig-nity was heard upon Him by the soldiers, rulers, and high priests— Annas, Caiaphas, Pilate and Herod; when Judas betrayed Him, and Peter denied Him

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. It is so called because of the Lent. It is so called because of the former custom of sprinkling ashes on the heads of penitents. Included within Lent are Passion Week, the week before Holy Week; Holy Week, the week before Easter; and Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter, commemorating Christ's entry into Jerusalem, and the strewing of palm leaves and branches before Him, as recorded in John 12:12-13.

Lent recognizes man's needs of pentitence, prayer, devotion, humility, self-examination, and self-denial; in other words, the qualities designated in the Beatitudes given in the fifth chapter of Matthew, the possession of which makes him the salt of the earth, the light of the world.

REVIEW OF LOCAL BILLS H.B. 317: Authorizes County Com-missioners to levy for an pay salary of Circuit Court Judge, and to pay for expenses incidential to that office. Bill has passed and has been signed

by Governor.

H.B. 414: Permits the use of sneak boats on the Carroll County side of the Monocacy River for duck hunting. Sneak Boats are already permitted on the Frederick County side. Bill has passed both Houses and is ready for

governor's signature.

H.B. 428: Requires all persons who build or improve properties to extent of \$1000.00 or more to notify Board of Assessors. Bill has passed both houses but has been recalled to per-

mit amendment to penalty section.

H.B. 805: Authorizes County Commissioners to levy up to 5c per \$100 assessment for aid to Volunteer Fire Companys in Carroll County. Present limit is 3c per \$100. Will require Fire Departments to submit detailed financial statements and statement of as-sets and liabilities. Bill introduced

S.B.: 123: Authorized Circuit Court to fix fee for service of Court Audi-tor. Old law provided for compensation at the rate of \$4.00 per day. Bill has been signed by Governor.

S.B. 210: Authorizes referendum on question of women's jury services in Carroll County. The referendum will be held at next General Election in November, 1956. Bill has been signed by Governor. S.B. 254: Authorizes increase in

Taneytown tax rate from 75c to 90c. Subject to referendum in Taneytown at next regular election or at special election. Bill has been signed by S.B. 309: Authorizes imposition of

tax on cigarettes (2c per pack) and on other tobacco products. This tax will raise a large portion of the mon-ey needed to finance our school build-ing program in Carroll County. Bill has passed both houses and awaits governor's signature.
S.B. 337: Amends disorderly conduct

#### BACK IN 1925

Remember the prices that obtained back in 1925?

You could get a new small car for \$500. You could get a good cigar for a nickel. And you could buy a reliable watch for one dollar.

Those days are gone, no doubt forever. But there are a few-a very few -commodities in general use which still sell at around the 1925 price.

Gasoline, the oil industry's principal product, is one of them. Exclusive of the taxes, over which the industry has no control, and which are up 250 per cent, gasoline now costs only slightly more than it did in 1925. And, measured by the barometer of performance, it costs substantially lessfor two gallons of today's motor fuel do the work that required three in that earlier era.

Various forces have helped to bring this about. For one, consumption is far greater, and the more we use of anything, generally speaking, the cheaper the price. For another, the oil industry has always been a leader in scientific research designed to produce new products, better products, and lower-priced products. And for still another, intense competition is a hallmark of the oil industry-in refining, selling and every other phase

of operation. Very likely that has been the greatest of all the forces. In any line of endeavor, competition is the consumer's best friend.-Industrial News

#### 'COMICS'; IS SELF-POLICING REAL?

Six months ago when 24 of the 27 publishers of "comic" books undertook to clean up the industry and set up their own self-policing organization we acclaimed the move and wished it well. Self-policing as a remedy, we said, "is immeasurably better than letting the abuses run on and better than censorship, whether by government or pressure group." But later, commenting on a report by the president of the Comics Magazine Association, we warned: "If the publishers he represents do not live up to this hopeful statement, there are thousands of areused Americans ready to tell him

Sad to say, there are already rumlings. New York's Joint Legislative Committee to Study the Publication of Comics has praised the industry's goal and its code of standards. But it has found that: "Comic books currently upon the stands and bearing the authority's seal of approval contain an abundance of the same type of materian termed objectionable by the authority and purportedly eliminat-

Some of such material it describes: A person is kicked in the jaw; a man prepared for a bath of molten steel; a dead body thrown into the river; a horse urged to stomp a man to death. Hardly edifying for young or old.

The committee observes that the voluntary character of the publishers' association makes it impossible for the association's own censor to insure that no objectionable publications reach the newsstands. If this is true, then the member publishers had better start obeying their own code and make some real reforms within their own doors. For is self-policing should fail, they would not like what an outraged public opinion could force upon them.-The Christian Science

## The Cost: A Cross

Lesson for April 3, 1955

DEOPLE who don't know the least thing about Christian religion do know this much, that it has something to do with a cross. You can't go into a church without seeing one. Many churches are even constructed in the shape of a cross. You can see one above the door or on the steeple. At this

time of year it is a rare newspaper which does not carry somewhere the picture of a cross to go with Good Friday meditations or a Good Friday editorial. But if the cross is

known even to persons altogether Dr. Foreman outside the Christian faith, it is infinitely better known to those on the inside. The deeper one penetrates into the meaning of the Christian faith, the more luminous the cross becomes. One might say that the cross is both in the preschool and the post-graduate courses in Christian growth and knowledge.

Sacrifice Unlimited

The familiar cross of Christian art and architecture is a prettified version of an ugly thing, a cruel instrument of torture and death used by Romans only in case of executing slaves and the vilest criminals. Jesus was neither the first nor the last to be crucified. There are people who would call the cross itself an 'historical accident." That is to say, if Jesus had lived in other eras or in other climates, he might have been killed by being frozen to death or buried alive or hanged or gassed. But that is neither here nor there. The meaning of the cross is not in the shape of a certain wooden thing that was used to kill people in a painful and horrible way. The meaning of the cross is simply this, in two words Sacrifice unlimited. Paul put it as simply as possible: "Christ died for all." He taught all, He set an example for all, He challenged and inspired all—that is, all who as He said "had an ear." But the cross reminds us that He died for all. "For their sakes," Jesus himself said, "I dedicate myself." How far would that dedication go? Many a person will say sincerely, 'I will do anything in reason, to help you." Christ went farther. It was not "reasonable" that He

of all persons should give up His

life for lesser men; but the kind

of dedication that was His, did not stop at the limits of the re-

One might suppose that the Christian church would have liked to hush up the story of the cross, especially after the resurrection. It was a very ugly fact and as such was a handicap to the early Christians. Both among Jews and non-Jews, the cross was a kind of real curse. When the Christians preached Christ crucified, many a listener's reaction was: "Ask me to take for Master and Lord an executed criminal? Never!" But the Christians went right on with the story of the cross. The gospels give that story more space than any other event in Jesus' life. And the Christian church has never forgotten nor tried to forget it. For what it means to us is that God in Christ was far more than the fabled Greek gods who sometimes took human shape, sometimes shared with men their Olympic wisdom, but never suffered for them. It is known to Christians that the cross measures the immeasurable love of God for us and for all men.

#### What Christians Forget

What Christians too easily forget is something Jesus set in the center of his teaching. He spoke of His own cross, but He in the same breath would speak of the cross of His followers. The cross does not stand alone for one past event. It is intended to stand as a prophecy and pattern for every Christian's life. One modern translator of the Bible, coming to the verse, "Let him take up his own cross and follow me," boggled at that word "cross" and translated it "Let him take up his own yoke

' No, there's no bypassing the intention of Jesus, one who meant what he said. And what he said amounted to this: For the Christian, one who wants to be a follower of Jesus, there must be no limit set on love's devotion.
