#### **God and Nations**

Lesson for June 26, 1955

GOD is not an American citizen. He is not even Americanized. He is not and never has been a citizen of any country in the world. And yet, strange as it seems, all down through history he has been thought of as if he belonged to one 8

particular race or nation. A Scotch woman. in the era when France and the United Kingdom were more or less always at war, was reminded by her pastor that



Dr. Foreman maybe there were God-fearing French women who

were praying for victory for their nation too. "Oh," said the old lady, "who could understand those jabbering bodies?" The simple truth is that God is the God of all nations. The Bible is as clear on this as it can be.

#### God Controls

Three mistakes are commonly made at this point. One is that God is not interested in nations, only in individuals; that He cares a great deal what individuals do. but is quite indifferent to the doings of nations. The truth is that God is as much interested and concerned about what men do by the million as what they do one by one. He is as much concerned with acts of Congress as he is with acts of congressmen; as much concerned with honesty in treaties as with honesty in personal contracts. Another mistake is to think of God as wanting to control the affairs of nations but not being able to do so, almost as if he read the headlines with as much alarm as you and I do. Another mistake, just the opposite, is to think that God controls nations the way a checker-player controls his men. They move when and where he moves them, they have no choice. Now the truth is that God does control nations, or else the Bible is all wrong. He

does not dictate all their actions, for God is never the author of sin. But when we read what is going on in the world, we must not read with despair, for God never lets nations out of his

#### God Judges

If God literally dictated and brought to pass every happening in history, then God could be the juage only of himself. But he does judge the nations, as he judges individuals, for what nations do of their own free will and consent. Nations, as nations, can make right choices or they can make wrong ones. It has been often remarked that the mortality rate among nations is 100%. As the Bible sees it, the death of a nation is the judgment of God upon it. Now the point so often overlooked, indeed the point the average citizen of ancient Israel and Judah conveniently overlooked, is that God judges all nations alike. He is not like a referee who calls fouls on one team and never sees a foul if his favorite team makes them. He is not like a parent who brings some of the children up carefully and spoils his favorites. No person can be just, and God cannot be just, if his justice is only for some and not for all. We all know what to think of a judge who "fixes tickets" for his friends who violate traffic regulations. God, the Judge of nations, never fixes anybody's ticket. Let us put this into plain English in terms of our own American situation: If an act of another nation is "bad," really bad in the sight of God, then the same kind of act on America's part is just exactly as bad, maybe worse if (as we claim) we know God's will better than anybody. Or if what our nation does at any time is "good," really good in God's eyes, then the same act done by another nation is good too, and we ought not to resent it.

#### God Rewards >

The prophet Zephaniah says what all the other prophets write in their own way, namely that God rewards nations that follow his laws. God does not of course reward nations in heaven, as he does people one by one. The reward of a nation is continuing peace and happiness-and sometimes power-on this planet. The reward of nations is to become the safe home of men and women who know and love and serve God. The reward of nations is to be the living evidence of the justice of a God who loves justice. #### Serve Chowder For Hearty Supper On Wintry Days

ON COLD, blustery days, there's nothing nicer for supper than a hearty creamy soup full of vegetables and wonderful flavor. With this you might serve crusty rolls or bread, a light salad and fruit. Supper is then complete with a minimum of effort.

Here's a chowder which you can cook from canned corn, and then too there's a quickie suggestion using two canned soups. Use either of them as your time and appetite

#### CORN CHOWDER

- (Serves 8) 1 cup finely diced potatoes
- ½ cup finely diced onion ½ cup finely diced celery
- 1 cup water 1/3 cup flour
- 1 quart milk
- 11/4 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika Few grains pepper
- No. 303 can corn 4 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons bacon fat

Place potatoes, onion, celery and water in saucepan. Cover and cook until vegetables are tender, about 10 minutes. Mix flour and 1 cup milk into paste. Scald remaining

& cups milk and stir into flour paste.

Cook, stirring constantly until sauce thickens. Cook very slowly for 10 minutes, then add salt, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, pepper and undrained cooked vegetables and corn. Heat thoroughly. Add butter and bacon fat. Serve sprinkled with paprika.

- (Serves 5-6) 1 can condensed cream of
- celery soup
- 1 can condensed cream of chicken soup
- 2 cans milk

1 avocado, peeled and sliced small ½ cup ripe olive chunks

Heat together soup and milk until heated through. Just before serving add avocado and ripe

#### Launder Bedding To Keep Sanitary

Most women wouldn't think of using sheets and pillowcases one week after another without laundering, but how much laundering do pillows and mattress pads get? These don't show average soil so they're frequently neglected.

Pads and pillows themselves do come in for their share of imbedded soil and are often far from germ-free. They really aren't hard to launder if we just put them on a regular cleaning schedule.

Bleaching Pads Mattress pads frequently get yellowish spots on them which are perspiration stains. Sometimes they cannot be removed entirely, but a chlorine bleach will lighten them considerably, as will drying

in the sunlight. To bleach them use a tablespoon of bleach for each quart of cold water. Rinse several times to remove all the bleach and thus prevent further staining

Mattress pads should be laundered at least once a month. If you have several beds in the home, plan to do one pad each week with your regular laundry, or even two, and they can be kept fresh and sanitary on this schedule.

Feather Pillows If you're not used to washing pillows, then you'll be amazed at how simply this can be handled. Feather pillows with good ticking can be washed in the machine right in their own ticking. With an automatic dryer, it will take

about two hours to dry them. After one hour of the drying cycle is over, remove the pillows and shake thoroughly, especially if the feathers tend to gather in

the corners of the pillowcase. Pillows should not be bone-dry. They can finish drying on a flat surface in the room.

If you have foam rubber pillows, they can be washed, but do use the manufacturers' directions. After drying, clean lint and fuzz from the lint tray in the machine.

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
