### CIVIL DEFENSE ALERT TO BE HELD APR. 17-18

#### Carroll County will Participate in National Exercise

Final plans for Carroll County's participation in the national Civil Defense exercise Operation Alert were announced recently by W. Warfield Babylon, county Civil Defense

The exercise will be held on April 17 and 18 and will be participated in by all states and by all cities and counties in Maryland. The Maryland Civil Defense Agency, of which Sherley Ewing is director, is coordinating the attention activities.

the statewide activities. On the opening day—April 17—a statewide air raid drill will be conducted. At 11:30 A.M. the alert signal will be sounded. At this time all radio and television stations will be reduced off the air by the Federal ordered off the air by the Federal Communications Commission and only stations that operate on Conelrad (640 or 1240) will return to the air. This Conelrad drill will be conducted from 11:30 to 12 Noon.

Mr. Babylon cautioned that in some parts of the county it may not be possible to hear the Conelrad signal and that people should not be alarmed as this is only an exercise. Persons who are unable to hear the conelrad signal are unable to hear the Conelrad signal are urged to notify their nearest CD official so that this information can be plotted for future

time all traffic should stop and people should determine where they could find the best available shelter.

Mr. Babylon said that following organizations in Carroll County would assist with the stopping of traffic at 1:30: State Police, City Police, and Auxiliary Police. It is expected that 125 volunteers and 15 regular police officers will participate.

In addition to the traffic drill the exercise will include another phase which will involve the plotting of simulated bomb hits in various parts of Maryland. Mr. Babylon will get from the state CD headquarters at Pikesville a sealed envelope which will indicate simulated bomb hits. This envelope is to be opened at 1:50 This envelope is to be opened at 1:50 P.M. and then Mr. Babylon and his staff will determine if there has been enemy bomb damage in Carroll county. He will then advise state CD headquarters by phone or radio the extent of the damage in the county.

After this the county will determine what recovery steps it should take if there is damage in the county or if there is no damage or slight damage the county's role would then be the state or nearby states. In addition to this the county may be ex-

#### JOHNNY AND ARITHMETIC

Is fourth grader Johnny learning his arithmetic any better than - or even as well as-his parents did?

He should do better than his parents -there's little room for argument on that score. Arithmetic long has been the most poorly learned and least liked subject in elementary school. If you doubt this, just look at the way high school students avoid mathematics.

Now comes news of a new program that is proving that Johnny can learn arithmetic better and faster than children ever have in the past, enjoy it in the process. The program, already in use in some 1,500 schools, was devised by two college professors of mathematics and education, Maurice Hartung and Henry Van Engen, who believe that grade schools should emphasize basic mathematics ideas that will carry over to high school courses. Most important, the program's ultimate goal is to teach children to succeed with story type problems.

Teachers know that the biggest weakness both of children and adults is problem solving. They can "figure" very well when they are told to divide or multiply but if they must decide for themselves which process to use, they are lost.

In Chicago, recently, 54 out of 55 high school seniors were able to divide 284 by 13; but over 40 were unable to "state what percent of 60 makes, 12". They didn't know they were supto divide 12 by 60. No one told

Meeting this weakness head-on, the Hartung-Van Engen program begins teaching basic mathematics to first graders. They explore the "why's" behind the rules, instead of blindly memorizing what the teacher

taught in seventh or eight grade. They understand what they're doing, are proud of their ability, and their teachers are confident they will be eager beavers for high school math.

In an age when the country needs so many scientist and engineers with good mathematical backgrounds, this is doubly important. Parents owe a vote of thanks to school educators who are using this new method in

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

In 1959, when the law requires children to be in school from ages 7 to 16, enrollment of the Elementary chool is now 432, with 14 teachers and of the High school about 380 with some 20 instructors. An average of 60% of pupils entering the first grade are graduated from high school. Only about half the 500,000,000 children of school age in the world today have the opportunity to go to school at all, and only in this country is education compulsory and universal. In face of this requirement, 10% of the teaching force must be replaced each year because of the natural attrition of normal resignations, and attracting young people to the profession is an important facet of our school prob-

With all the improvement in training, curriculum, and plant today, the teacher remains the key to a good education, for no matter how big or small the building, how few or costly the tools, if the teacher is inspired,

that education parents will call good.

#### **Tragic Failure**

Lesson for April 19, 1959

KING SAUL had the makings of success; but he failed. We must not exaggerate his failure, for there were some who remembered him with pride, and even named sons after him. The great Christian apostle Paul had been named Saul by his family, for example.

Nevertheless, as kings went, and especially when compared with the great King David, Saul missed the mark. As we were saying last week, he was like a man with a good hand who



#### Voice of God

At a time in his life when a throne would have seemed a fanciful dream, the prophet Samuel had taken Saul secretly, and solemnly poured oil on his head, thus enointing him to be the future king of Israel. This was before the great battle of Jabesh that gave Saul his national reputation. Saul himself may not have taken Samuel's prediction seriously, because he went on back to his farming. But after the people voted him in as the first king, Saul would of course remember Samuel and the secret anointing and prophecy. There is no doubt that Saul was convinced that Samuel was a true prophet, that he spoke with the authority of God himself.

Samuel was the one link with God that Saul had. He had no Bible to study, no church to help him, and he himself was anything but a religious genius. David and others seem to have been able to understand God's will by direct revelation; but for Saul, God's voice and will had to come to him through the prophet.

The most serious element in Saul's failure was right here: he

stopped caring what the voice of God said. He figured, perhaps, that since God had given him his start, he would be bound to approve whatever he did. He was never more mistaken. God wants his servants to succeed, but if they aim at the wrong kind of success, or if they adopt wicked ways of attaining good goals, he withdraws his support. God is not going for and against himself at the same time, and he will not encourage men to do so either.

#### Voice of Self

Saul made another mistake often made by strong men. It is worse than an ordinary mistake, it is a calamitous error, a sin that tears a man to pieces quickly. It is the sin of listening to his own desires and ambitions first of all. "If I want it, it must be all right" is a silly remark. You would not believe people could be so foolish as to make it. You would not think that any one would set up his own judgment above that of God; but many do. The way their mind works is familiar to all of us, because we have all some time or other argued to ourselves just the same way. "Look," we say to ourselves, "of course I listen to the voice of God, and I used to hear him speaking in the Bible or in the Church. But lately I have come to believe that the Bible and the Church don't exactly strike my needs. I believe God will speak to me in my own thoughts." (and more of the same.) You see what this does: it either sets up one's own thoughts as better than God's, or else it identifies one's own thoughts with God's will.

#### Voice of the Crowd

The third mistake which Saul made was perhaps one of the most common, in our day or any time. It was letting the voice of the crowd speak for God. Pilate made that mistake, and so have countless others. But you can't get right and wrong figured out by arithmetic. What is right to do can never be found out by counting votes. And yet people keep on making that foolish blunder. They read in the Kinsey Report that certain sex sins are widely practiced among the people interviewed by the author; and leap to the conclusion that what so many people do must be right. And so they conclude that what so many people do can't be wrong. They never do ask the question: What does God have to
