GRASS ROOTS OPINIONS

RICHMOND, LA., BEACON NEWS: "Whether one realizes it or not, advertising is perhaps the most wonderful development of the modern commercial age. It is the maker or breaker of business, big or little. It is the one factor of successful sales that is most apt to be overlooked by the merchants and businessmen of small towns and cities.

"Advertising is...the power that will make little concerns grow into larger success. It is a science that requires study and be it said, character. It cannot succeed if it is based upon untruth; it must build upon faith and integrity."

KNOXVILLE, IOWA, EXPRESS: "The railroad workers we fear are fighting a losing battle. Yule Decorations Come Easy With Holiday Kits

THE decorations you plan for door, mantle or picture window—and the thought that goes into them—can be a measure of the Christmas spirit that pervades your home during the holiday season.

If they're gay and original, they'll lift your own and your



friend's spirits and provide a bright topic of conversation besides. This year, fortunately, home decoration kits for Christmas have been made available that lessen the chore of both creation and production immensely.

With one such kit, evergreen branches, pine cones, candles, or almost any material can be sprayed with a liquid adhesive and sprinkled with tiny red and white pellets to impart the effect of fallen snow and holly berries. Called "Holiday Sprinkles," it's a kit that is available at low cost in department stores, and at food and variety chain stores.

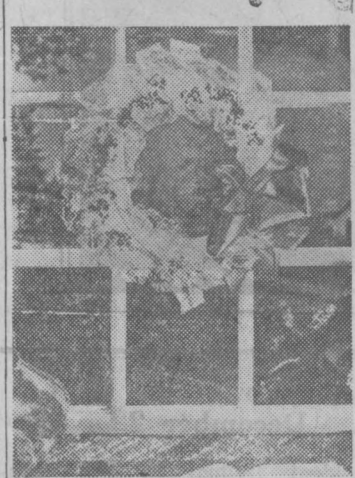
An ordinary door wreath, or a simple arrangement of needled branches can be given a professional glitter if treated in

this fashion. Similarly, an arrangement of boughs, cones and tree balls for table or mantle can be sprayed and sprinkled and made to appear as though created by your florist.

The adhesive and pellets can, moreover, be applied directly to wood or glass and later removed with common soap or detergents and leave no scars. Thus, a design or message can be written on a picture window, a mirror or glass table-top to help impart a Christmas atmosphere—and be quickly removed after the holidays.

Fortunately, too, both spray and pellets are both fireproof and non-toxic. Small children, or pets, who like to gobble up everything in sight during the holidays won't be injured if they should swallow a few.

As for stretching your imagination on Christmas decorations—the task is lightened immeasurably by a folder of instructions and suggestions for creating various items right in the package. You can deck the halls with holly almost painlessly.

God, Our Help

Lesson for December 27, 1959

AT SUNSET, not a ray of hope. Alone, behind high walls, guarded by four squads of soldiers under special orders, his friends not knowing whether he was alive or dead. But by midnight—the man was free, talking with his friends. (Naturally, hunted by the police . . . but they never found him.) What was the explanation of it? Nobody has ever quite succeeded in explaining it. The man himself said an angel did it; but an angel is hard to explain. Dr. Foreman too. The real explanation, every one felt, was in one single word: GOD. The man's friends had been praying to God, and God sent the angel. God had much more for Simon Peter to do.

In Great Crisis

Did God help people in "Bible times" only and not since then? By no means. God himself cannot be seen, remember; so it is always possible for some one to doubt—to say, "Well, I didn't see God there." Nevertheless all through history there have been special occasions, crises as they may be called, when believers have been quite sure that God must have been specially interested and active.

For instance, in World War II, on D-Day, innumerable slips occurred during that great invasion of the Normandy coast. One writer who was there said that everything that could go wrong went wrong, and some things that couldn't. But in spite of it all, the Allies got their foothold in the enemy's land. What accounts for that? Or take the German guided missiles. If they had been just a few weeks farther ahead with production, England might have been completely smashed and the war would have had a different ending.

What held the Germans up? Hitler, of course; but what made Hitler (ordinarily a shrewd man) so stupid?

"Out of Weakness"

For some people it may be easier to believe that God takes care of nations and of great events, than that God takes care of me. Let us not deny his presence in the great crises. Last June a streamliner with 180 passengers on board ran over a suitcase filled with enough dynamite to blow the train in two—and the fuse was lighted! But the fuse went out, and the train was not hurt. When the passengers learned about it, isn't it likely that most of them said, "Thank God!"

Some of them said it (perhaps) who hadn't thanked God for anything in years. Yet God can be in simple ordinary lives, giving help to the weak and the unimpaired, just as truly as he helps a Saint Peter or the British Empire. An immigrant woman abandoned by her GI husband, with three hungry children on her hands, said once: "Sometimes I go to bed and I don't think I can get up again. But God, he wakes me up with a song in my throat and I begin again." Sometimes the only way we discover God is to reach a point of weakness where we know that without him we are done for.

Workers Together

We said that God had more for Simon Peter to do. This midnight miracle was the last of its kind in Peter's life so far as we know. He lived for years after this, a hard-working missionary, no doubt often in danger, but kept and strengthened by what we absurdly call the "ordinary" Providence of God. Then came a day when Roman guards came for him once more, and this time there was no angel to help him. So he was crucified. Had God forsaken him at last? No; his work was done. If you are, as he was, a "worker together with God" you may be sure that until your work is done you are immortal.

We are at the gate of a New Year. What will it bring? Great dangers, great distress, great responsibilities? Whatever it may be, God knows what he is doing. We may see no angels, but with the eye of faith we can see the good hand of God guiding us, protecting us, giving us the help we need, when we need it.

How to Make Your Home Say "Merry Christmas"

Christmas, with its magic of colored lights, is one time when the individual really comes into his own. With the same basic materials, and the same general ideas to express, it is a source of continual wonder to see the vastly different effects which can be created. And, it is not necessary to go to a great deal of expense to create something which is lovely to look at and which says "Merry Christmas" to all who see it.

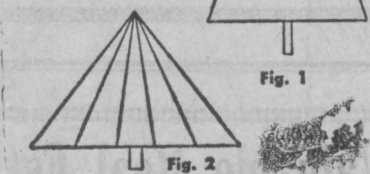
Keeping a few simple rules in mind and giving your imagination free rein, you can make your Christmas decorating a project in which the whole family can share, giving everyone a feeling of satisfaction in his own individual contribution.

Selecting and Caring for Tree
For many of us, the tree itself will always be the central figure in any decorating scheme. Selecting it, bringing it home, visualizing it in its dressed and lighted glory—all add to the sense of anticipation.

Select a tree that is full and beautifully shaped. As soon as you bring the tree home, stand it in a pail or tub filled with water until you are ready to set it up and trim it. This will prolong the life and appearance of the tree, keep the needles from falling and minimize the danger of fire.

Trimming Your Tree

Lights can do a great deal to improve the shape of a tree. If your tree is long and slender, string the lights around it; if it is short



and squat, string them in vertical rows, from top to bottom. (See Fig. 1 and Fig. 2.) Don't guess at the number of lights you need for your tree. Professional decorators use this formula: Multiply the height of the tree by the width of the branches at the base, then multiply by three. A tree seven feet tall, and five feet wide at the base thus would have 105 lights. Using this rule and spacing your lights evenly, you will always have an excellent balanced effect. (See Fig. 3.)

Don't limit yourself to conventional Christmas lights. Lamps which simulate ice crystals or snow balls are now available and produce a very interesting appearance. Consider also the flashing, twinkling or bubbling lights which give the effect of motion and are particularly appealing to children.

Start at the Top

Trees should always be trimmed from the top down. First the Angel, Star, Spear or other tree-top piece should be

put in place. Then the lights should be strung, top to bottom. Reflectors and halos add much to the brilliance of lights.

Now you are ready for the "string type" decorations. With this much done, you can begin to place your most interesting ornaments, selecting spots where they will show to best advantage. When all the ornaments have been placed the tinsel can be arranged, each piece hung individually on the branches. Angel hair or a spray of artificial snow may be added at the very end.

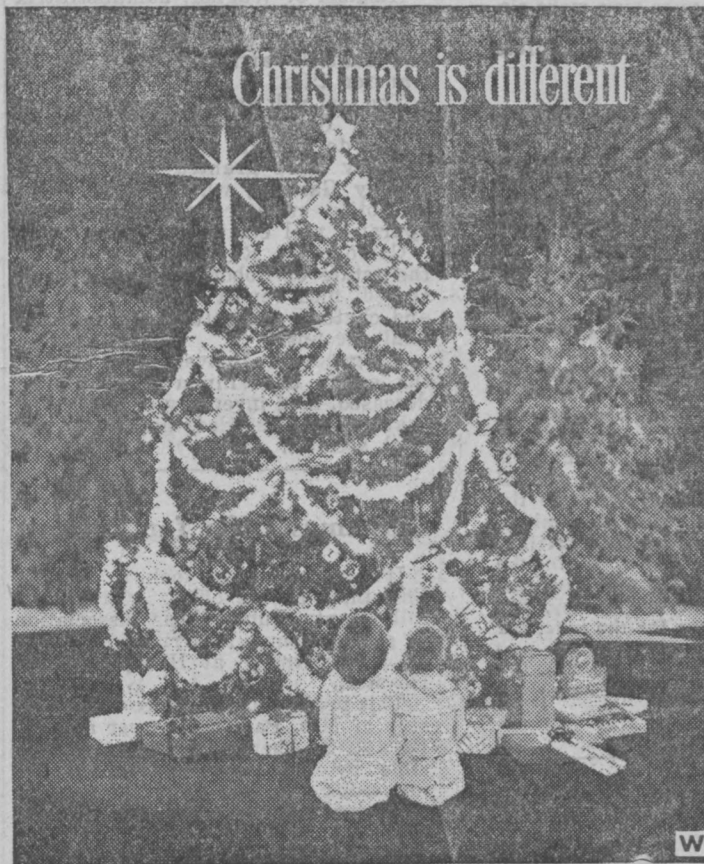
The top-to-bottom procedure should be followed throughout. It is the easiest, the fastest and, above all, the safest way. That word "safest" is one which you should be conscious of throughout the Christmas season. All light strings should be inspected carefully and all sets with worn or exposed wires replaced with new U/L approved sets. Protect against short circuits or blown-out fuses by making sure you have at least one set of lights with a safety fuse plug (such as those manufactured by NOMA LITES). This set should be connected to the wall socket or other source of current; other light strings can be attached to it. Should a fuse blow, it can easily be replaced at the socket, with a twist of the fingers.

Christmas All Over the House

Even the loveliest tree has its effect heightened if the rest of the house is decorated attractively and in good taste. Practically every home offers a wealth of simple materials which can be used for novel, imaginative decorative pieces. An ordinary vase can be filled with greens and white branches with ornaments and placed anywhere. Three graduated embroidery hoops decorated with tinsel can be suspended by ribbons around a half-inch wooden dowel inserted in a plastic styrofoam base. A set of vari-colored lights wound around the dowel glow through angel hair; a few small ornaments strung from colored ribbon complete this lovely miniature "tree." Another effective idea is to form a cone of heavy Christmas gift wrapping paper and place it over a dowel. The paper should be heavy enough to keep its cone shape, and translucent enough for the light to shine through.

The traditional Christmas greens provide many beautiful arrangements. Laurel and Pine branches wound around a stair-rail can be decorated with lights, canes and a few simple ornaments for a glowing effect.

Greens banded on a mantle have their beauty heightened by proper placement of lights. A madonna figure combined with spruce branches and creche lighted from behind makes a foyer table truly lovely. An attractive dining room decoration can be fashioned from greens arranged on a tiered plate or lazy susan with lights and ornaments. A set of lights intertwined with Pine or other greens on top of a bookcase makes a beautiful illuminated display. Window wreaths, laurel swags across your drapes and other greens also become much more interesting and original when lights are cleverly used.



Keep in mind, too, the candeliers, lampposts, angels, snowmen, Santa Claus figures and other "ready-made" decorations which are available. They can be combined with greens, ornaments, ribbons and other materials with very good results. This idea is particularly adaptable in window treatments where both imagination and a safe, convenient light source are most desirable.

Your House a Christmas Card

We have all experienced that warm glow of good feeling and fond memories which can come from just glancing at a house which seems to wish the whole world a "Merry Christmas."

Here too, safety must be the watchword. All outside wiring must be rubber-insulated and heavy-duty—#12 or #14 cord is best. A permanent, protected outdoor type receptacle is the most satisfactory current source. Lacking that, you can use a porch or garage light. Should that not be convenient, an indoor light socket can be used safely in this manner—get a board about six to nine inches wide, cut to fit snugly under any window. Drill a hole in the board, put it in position and close the window so that it meets the board. The outside wire can then be run through the hole and connected to an indoor socket. Brace lock the window with a stick (See Fig. 4)

One of the most attractive, and least expensive, means of outdoor lighting is to run strings of lights along the eaves or roof edge. Ordinary drive rings, available at any hardware store, can simplify the job enormously. U-shaped, the drive rings can be affixed to the under-edge of the roof, and the lights threaded through them. The same technique can be used in outlining doors and windows with lights. The drive rings will keep them in position, prevent sagging or uneven effects. (See Fig. 5.)

Important to any outdoor decorative scheme is the front door. Beautiful wreaths or sprays can be purchased but, with a little ingenuity and dexterity, you can "Do It Yourself." Pine, Fir, Spruce or other branches and a string of lights can be twined around either a wire clothes hanger forced into a round shape or into chicken wire cut to form a foundation for a spray. Large outdoor candles, snowmen or candeliers complete a pretty, welcoming Christmas doorway.

Your permanent evergreens and shrubbery also lend themselves beautifully to Christmas decorating. To protect an expensive Fir tree or Blue Spruce build a simple "teepee" to carry the light strings. Drive stakes into the ground around the tree, inside the spread of branches, at regular intervals. Lead rigid wire up from the stakes to a padded wire collar placed around the tree stem, several inches below the top. The lights can be strung around the wires and need not touch the branches at all. (See Fig. 6.)

Many people prefer a single color for their outside lighting, but try using one white light at the top of the tree or other prominent place. And, don't forget spotlights which can be placed conveniently on your lawn to illuminate and focus attention on a creche, elfin figures, or other interesting features.

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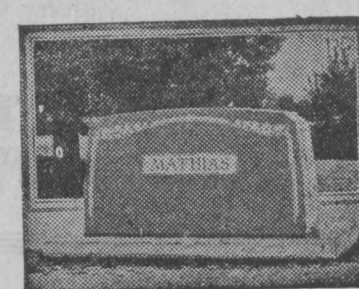

PERFECT ROSES are the gardener's masterpiece.
