PROPOSED AMEND-MENTS EXPLAINED Sen. Weant Describes Nature of "Questions"

The coming election, to be held on Tuesday, November 8, will bring not only the opportunity to vote for Presidential and Congressional candi-dates to the Maryland Constitution. Because it is impossible to set forth the full Amendments on the voting machine, I, as your State Senator, thought it would be helpful to ex-plain Amendments in the columns of this paper during the coming weeks plain Amendments in the columns of this paper during the coming weeks prior to the election. It is our inten-tion to consider the Amendments each week until all have been covered. There are fifteen such Amendments and one question on referendum which will be considered by the voters of Carroll County.

Question No. 1—State's Attorneys: This Amendment is to Section 11 of Article 5 of the Constitution. It is intended to clarify the provisions concerning the filling of vacancies in the office of State's Attorney in the several counties.

eral counties. The Constitution now provides that a vacancy be filled by the judge or judges resident in the county "and" having jurisdiction in the Circuit Court of the county. This language leaves doubt as to

the procedure in these counties not having a resident judge. While Car-roll County has such a judge, there are counties on the eastern shore which do not have a Circuit Court Judge numbered among their residents.

The proposed change is that the vacancy be filled by the judge or judges resident in the county "or", if there be no resident judge, the judge or judges having jurisdiction in the Circuit Court of the County.

This Amendment was proposed by Chapter 14 of the Acts of the Mary-land General Assembly of 1959. Question No. 2-Condemnation in Question No. 2—Condemnation in Baltimore County: This Amendment is to Section 40A of Article 3 of the Constitution. It is intended to change the procedure for the con-demnation of private property locat-ed in Baltimore County, by the Coun-ty Council of Baltimore county. At the present time, compensation

At the present time, compensation for the property must be agreed upon between the parties, or awarded by a jury, and either paid or tender-ed to the party entitled to compen-sation, before the property may be

taken for public use. The proposed change requires that the Court provide for the appointment of an appraiser to value the property. THE BUBLE SPEAKS BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Bible Material: Micah 3; 4:1-5. Devotional Reading: Psalm 12



"STICK to the Gospel and leave politics alone," is advice often given to preachers. Whether it's good advice depends on what is meant by it. If "Leave politics alone" means that a church should not become a political party, then it is good advice. But if it means

that the preacher must never mention anything so worldly and controversial as housing for the poor, wage levels, dirty politics, dishonest police, incompetent judges, or bad leadership in high Dr. Foreman

places, then "Stick to the Gospel" is bad advice.

Upside Down Morals

Not only that, but a preacher shamed or scared into silence about the live issues of his time and community is false to his Bible. The prophets of old were bold preachers. They pointed their fingers at sin wherever they saw it. And when they saw the supposed leaders of their country setting bad examples, when they saw bad foreign policy, when they saw the weak oppressed and the shady characters given the medals, the prophets did not pull their punches or preach soothing sermons about heaven. They preached some of their most powerful sermone straight to the top-flight citizens of their time.

One of the great evils that Mican (for instance) nailed down, was what we call upside-down morais, preached and practiced by influential people. It is much worse when such people get twisted-up about right and wrong, than when obscure people do. A bum in a slum can try to tell you that wrong is right and you pay him no attention. But when rich or famous or oowerful people take a wrong slant, you get mixed up. You think. "Well, surely a man as smart [or

rich, or concated, or successful] as he is, can't be wrong!

Robbing the People

Another cvil Micah spoke of sharply and plainly can be called in plain language robbing the people. Unfortunately this can be means that a wealthy corporation can get wealthier simply by overcharging the consumer-and overcharge is a polite word for stealing. There is a large area in our southern mountains which for years was bare as the Sahara desert, a desolate desparate sight in the midst of green hills and mountains on all sides. A great corporation was letting copper furnes go out from its chimneys unhindered, killing all green things for miles around. It took a long time before the government stopped that. Another mill, manufacturing asbestos, exposed its emplovees to asbestosis, an incurable disease of the lungs caused by asbestos lint in the air. Many workers died, but it was all perfectly legal . . . till finally the state stepped in and required safety devices that stopped the legal killings. But where was the church? Not a voice was raised, so far as this writer ever heard, against killing either the green countryside or human beings. There were no prophetic preachers, no prophetic churches, to call a spade a spade.

Preaching for Money

The prophet Micah calls out for judgment another kind of leader who only leads on to ruin. That is the kind of prophet (meaning preacher) who preaches to please those who pay him best. This is the worst kind of bad leadership. For the minister of the Gospel is supposed to a man of God, but when he preaches only what his wealthier contributors will approve, then he ceases to be God's spokesman and wears some man's collar. In the very early days of Christianity. just after the New Testament was finished, there was a book which gave regulations and advice for church officers. It seems there were many traveling evangelists and missionaries, then as now, asking for money. This little book gave a rule which was very useful: If the visitor begs for others, he may be genuine; if he begs for himself, throw him out. The preacher out for himself first of all sets an example that pushes his people farther on the road to min.

There's a new look-the first in thirty years-in egg packaging. The new look is more than a superficial change however, it is a cellophane overwrap of egg cartons which promises homemakers convenience, cleanliness, and fresher eggs.

Food shoppers in Texas, where the cellophane cgg overwrap was given its first thorough testing, indicated their preference for the new package with egg sales increases of 12 to 50 percent in food stores which introduced the new wrap. The overwrap, sparked by the Texas housewife's appreciation of a tamperproof package, is now being initiated in all parts of the country.

University laboratory tests proved that reduction of carbon dioxide and moisture loss would protect egg freshness and flavor. The tests showed that the "breathing" egg shell, evolved for the needs of the baby chick, caused the loss of qualities which make eggs better for eating and cooking.

The breathing also causes eggs to pick up foreign tastes and odors. The cellophane overwrap prevents this and also gives pro-tection from the ravages of a broken egg enroute from market to kitchen.

As so many kitchen artists know, in souffles it's the altitude that separates the women from the girls. Truly fresh eggs and a confident touch can make the difference between an indifferent souffle and an Everest. The beauty of this one is that it makes a hot day main dish without a need to light the oven.

6 eggs, beaten

chopped

1 sprig parsley, finely

TOP-OF-THE-RANGE SOUFFLE

1 1/2 cups milk 2 tablespoons butter 3/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Heat milk and butter in double boiler. Add seasonings to eggs and beat very light. Add hot milk to eggs and beat thoroughly. Return to double boller and cook over simmering water for 30 minutes. Serve hot. Garnish with chopped parsley. Serves 4 to 6. Serve with well-seasoned mushroom sauce or thin White Sauce, adding toasted nuts which can be toasted in the fat used in making the sauce.

ORDINANCE NO. 181

AN ORDINANCE relating to public health and safety, providing for the prevention and removal of nuisances and and establishing a date by which all properties must connect to the sanitary sewage system.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown that all improved properties within the Corporate Limits of Taneytown shall be connected to the sanitary sewage system of Taneytown on or before the 30th day of September, 1960.

SECTION 2. That in the event of a failure of any property owner to so connect to the aforesaid sanitary sewage system the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown shall have the power and authority to order the connection made by any competent contractor of its choice and shall have right to impose the costs thereof as a charge against and a lien upon such property which costs shall be due, payable and collectable in the same manner as are the ad valorem taxes of the City of Taneytown.

SECTION 3.' And be it further enacted and ordained that from and after the effective date of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to have or maintain within the Corporate Limits of Taneytown, any form of outdoor toilet or privy and any person, persons, firm or corporation who or which shall violate the provisions of this ection shall, upon conviction thereof before any proper Trial Magistrate or other proper judge or officer, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), and costs of prosecution.

SECTION 4. And be it further enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown that this ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after the date of its passage provided a copy of this Ordinance shall be inserted in The Carroll Record on two successive weeks prior to the expiration of such thirty (30) day period.

Passed by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown this 8th day of August, 1960.


