**FACTS AND OPINIONS**

Donald I. Rogers, business editor of the New York Herald-Tribune, writes: "To any and all candidates who this year are seeking election to public office, I hereby serve the following notice: I will cast my vote, positively pledge it, for whichever candidates do not promise me a single, solitary 'benefit', conversely, I will vote against and militate against any who promise to improve my lot. I've been improved all I want to be, and by golly, my lot can't afford any further improvement."

Although they make up less than 14 per cent of the driving population, drivers under 25 years of age were involved in nearly 29 per cent of the fatal accidents last year.

According to The American Medical Association, an independent national survey just completed by sociologists on the faculty of Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, "emphatically proves that the great majority of Americans over 65 are capable of financing their own health care and prefer to do it on their own, without federal government intervention." Among specific findings, the survey reveals that 61 per cent of the people interviewed considered their health was good; 29 per cent thought it fair, and only 10 per cent thought it poor. Ninety per cent could think of no personal medical needs that were not being taken care of.

A decline in consumer optimism and sharp curtailments in buying plans for the balance of this year are reported by a Newsweek survey. With the exception of new autos, buying plans for every category measured by the survey were down for the second quarter, both from the year before and the opening of 1960.

According to the Tax Foundation, about nine out of every 10 persons who file an income tax return make less than \$10,000 a year. It adds that if the government took 100 per cent of all taxable income above \$10,000 the extra revenue wouldn't even pay the interest on the national debt.

The FBI reports a sharp upward trend in serious crime during the first months of 1960. It was led by a 13 per cent increase in robberies followed by a 12 per cent climb in the number of burglaries. Crimes against the persons also increased: six per cent for murders, five per cent for forcible rapes, and four per cent for aggravated assaults.

Writing in National Review Bulletin, Norvin R. Greene says: "It is utterly fallacious to assert that true competition does not exist except when one competitor seeks to undersell or cut prices below the others. The truth is that price-cutting is one of the poorest mechanisms of competition. It usually leads to reduction or destruction of profits and eventually to deterioration in service to the public. There are many other more effective ways of competing. More effective advertising, better selling strategies, superior service to the public, more effective distribution systems, establishment and maintenance of reputation for quality and unquestioned reliability—all these are mere worthwhile competitive factors.

According to recently published figures, our gross public debt exceeds that of all the other nations of the world combined.

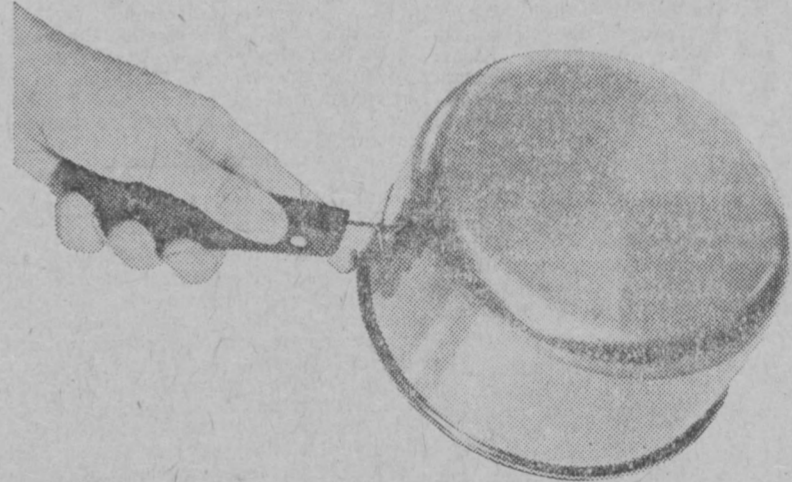

REMEMBER THIS PICTURE . . . ????



Thirty years ago — November, 1930, to be exact — this original painting by Frances Tipton Turner appeared as part of a nationally known brush company's advertising for toothbrushes. Apple Apricot Pie

APPLE APRICOT PIE

- 1 1/2 tablespoons Minute Tapioca
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 1/2 cups (No. 2 can) canned sliced apples
- 1 cup sweetened cooked, dried apricots, drained
- 1/4 cup apricot juice
- Pastry for two-crust 9-inch pie
- 1 tablespoon butter

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt, spices, lemon juice, apples, apricots, and juice. Let stand about 15 minutes. Roll half the pastry 1/4 inch thick. Line a 9-inch pie pan and trim pastry at edge of rim. Roll remaining pastry 1/4 inch thick. Cut in strips 9 inches long and 1/4 inch wide. Fill pie shell with fruit mixture. Dot with butter. Moisten edge of bottom crust. Weave strips of pastry on top of pie to form lattice. Press ends of pastry strips and bottom crust together on rim. Then flute edge. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 50 to 55 minutes, or until syrup boils with heavy bubbles that do not burst.

On To Ruin

Lesson for September 18, 1960

'STICK to the Gospel and leave politics alone,' is advice often given to preachers. Whether it's good advice depends on what is meant by it. If 'Leave politics alone' means that a church should not become a political party, then it is good advice. But if it means that the preacher must never mention anything so worldly and controversial as housing for the poor, wage levels, dirty politics, dishonest police, incompetent judges, or bad leadership in high places, then 'Stick to the Gospel' is bad advice.

Upside Down Morals

Not only that, but a preacher shamed or scared into silence about the live issues of his time and community is false to his Bible. The prophets of old were bold preachers. They pointed their fingers at sin wherever they saw it. And when they saw the supposed leaders of their country setting bad examples, when they saw bad foreign policy, when they saw the weak oppressed and the shady characters given the medals, the prophets did not pull their punches or preach soothing sermons about heaven. They preached some of their most powerful sermons straight to the top-flight citizens of their time.

One of the great evils that Micah (for instance) nailed down, was what we call upside-down morals, preached and practiced by influential people. It is much worse when such people get twisted-up about right and wrong, than when obscure people do. A bum in an slum can try to tell you that wrong is right and you pay him no attention. But when rich or famous or powerful people take a wrong slant, you get mixed up. You think, 'Well, surely a man as smart (or rich, or educated, or successful) as he is, can't be wrong!'

Robbing the People

Another evil Micah spoke of sharply and plainly can be called in plain language robbing the people. Unfortunately this can be done sometimes quite legally. This means that a wealthy corporation can get wealthier simply by overcharging the consumer—and overcharge is a polite word for stealing. There is a large area in our southern mountains which for years was bare as the Sahara desert, a desolate desolate sight in the midst of green hills and mountains on all sides. A great corporation was letting copper mines go out from its chimneys un-hindered, killing all green things for miles around. It took a long time before the government stopped that. Another mill, manufacturing asbestos, exposed its employees to asbestos, an incurable disease of the lungs caused by asbestos lint in the air. Many workers died, but it was all perfectly legal... till finally the state stepped in and required safety devices that stopped the legal killings. But where was the church? Not a voice was raised, so far as this writer ever heard, against killing either the green countryside or human beings. There were no prophetic preachers, no prophetic churches, to call a spade a spade.

Preaching for Money

The prophet Micah calls out for judgment another kind of leader who only leads on to ruin. That is the kind of prophet (meaning preacher) who preaches to please those who pay him best. This is the worst kind of bad leadership. For the minister of the Gospel is supposed to a man of God, but when he preaches only what his wealthier contributors will approve, then he ceases to be God's spokesman and wears some man's collar. In the very early days of Christianity, just after the New Testament was finished, there was a book which gave regulations and advice for church officers. It seems there were many traveling evangelists and missionaries, then as now, asking for money. This little book gave a rule which was very useful: If the visitor begs for others, he may be genuine; if he begs for himself, throw him out. The preacher out for himself first of all sets an example that pushes his people farther on the road to ruin.

New Look In Egg Packaging



There's a new look—the first in thirty years—in egg packaging. The new look is more than a superficial change however, it is a cellophane overwrap of egg cartons which promises homemakers convenience, cleanliness, and fresher eggs.

Food shoppers in Texas, where the cellophane egg overwrap was given its first thorough testing, indicated their preference for the new package with egg sales increases of 12 to 50 percent in food stores which introduced the new wrap. The overwrap, sparked by the Texas housewife's appreciation of a tamperproof package, is now being initiated in all parts of the country.

University laboratory tests proved that reduction of carbon dioxide and moisture loss would protect egg freshness and flavor. The tests showed that the "breathing" egg shell, evolved for the needs of the baby chick, caused the loss of qualities which make eggs better for eating and cooking.

The breathing also causes eggs to pick up foreign tastes and odors. The cellophane overwrap prevents this and also gives protection from the ravages of a broken egg enroute from market to kitchen.

As so many kitchen artists know, in souffles it's the altitude that separates the women from the girls. Truly fresh eggs and a confident touch can make the difference between an indifferent soufflé and an Everest. The beauty of this one is that it makes a hot day main dish without a need to light the oven.

TOP-OF-THE-RANGE SOUFFLE

1 1/2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons butter, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 6 eggs, beaten, 1 sprig parsley, finely chopped. Heat milk and butter in double boiler. Add seasonings to eggs and beat very light. Add hot milk to eggs and beat thoroughly. Return to double boiler and cook over simmering water for 30 minutes. Serve hot. Garnish with chopped parsley. Serves 4 to 6. Serve with well-seasoned mushroom sauce or thin White Sauce, adding toasted nuts which can be toasted in the fat used in making the sauce.

ORDINANCE NO. 181. AN ORDINANCE relating to public health and safety, providing for the prevention and removal of nuisances and establishing a date by which all properties must connect to the sanitary sewage system. SECTION 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown that all improved properties within the Corporate Limits of Taneytown shall be connected to the sanitary sewage system of Taneytown on or before the 30th day of September, 1960. SECTION 2. That in the event of a failure of any property owner to so connect to the aforesaid sanitary sewage system the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown shall have the power and authority to order the connection made by any competent contractor of its choice and shall have the right to impose the costs thereof as a charge against and a lien upon such property which costs shall be due, payable and collectable in the same manner as are the ad valorem taxes of the City of Taneytown. SECTION 3. And be it further enacted and ordained that from and after the effective date of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to have or maintain within the Corporate Limits of Taneytown, any form of outdoor toilet or privy and any person, persons, firm or corporation who or which shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof before any proper Trial Magistrate or other proper judge or officer, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), and costs of prosecution. SECTION 4. And be it further enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown that this ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after the date of its passage provided a copy of this Ordinance shall be inserted in The Carroll Record on two successive weeks prior to the expiration of such thirty (30) day period. 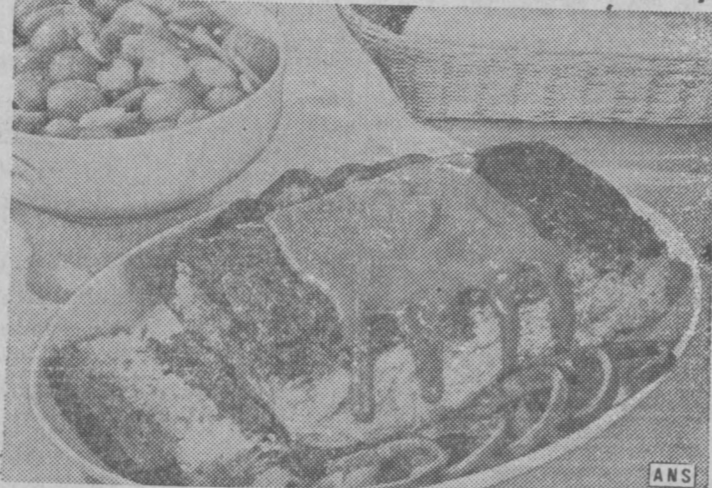

| 1/2 teaspoon pepper      |  |

Start heating oven to 350° F. Cook spaghetti according to package directions. Meanwhile thoroughly mix meat, one beaten egg, salt, pepper, bread crumbs, chopped parsley and onion together. Then add grated cheese from the spaghetti dinner package in with this mixture and blend well. Beat two eggs and blend into mushroom sauce from spaghetti dinner package. Combine with cooked spaghetti, mixing well. Pack half of meat mixture into bottom of a greased loaf pan. Cover with spaghetti mixture. Then pack remaining meat mixture on top. Bake loaf in oven for 50 minutes or until spaghetti mixture is firm. Unmold and cut into slices.

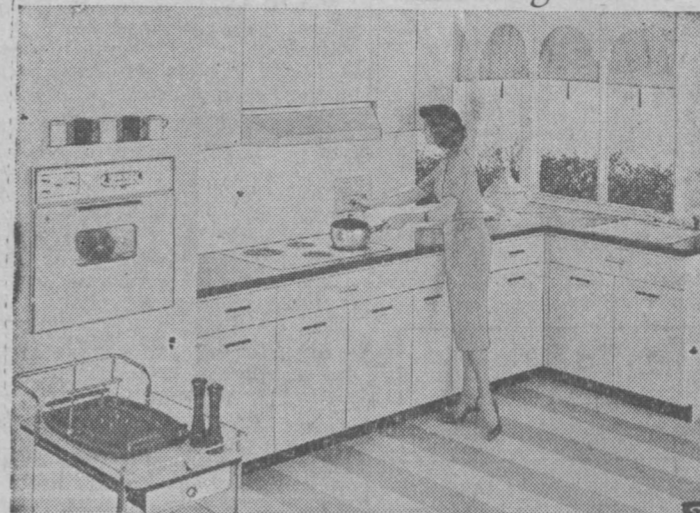

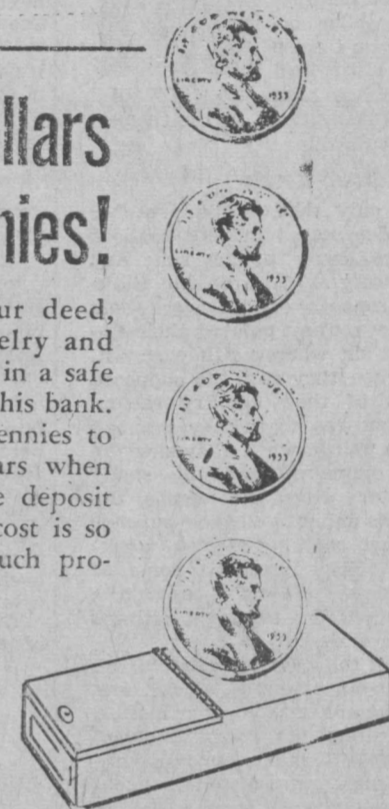
