DINANCE NO. 182

AN ORDINANCE, entitled an Ordinance for levying and collecting taxes for the carrying into effect the By-Laws and Ordinances of the Corporation of Taneytown, to pay current debts and expenses for the ensuing year ending June 30, 1961.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland, that a tax of eighty-five cents (85c) on every hundred dollars of assessable property within the Corporate limits of Taneytown, Maryland, according to the valuation thereof returned by assessors duly qualified and appointed by law, and upon such modification thereof as may be made by the Mayor and City Council of Taneytown, Maryland is hereby directed to be levied for and during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, the same to be collected by law according to the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland pertaining thereto, said tax being levied for current expenses, improvements, repairs, etc., and for the payment of principal and interest upon the Sewer Bonds of 1954 as directed by Chapter 281, Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, 1953, and for such other lawful purposes as may be authorized or required.

Section 2. And be it enacted and ordained, etc., that according to the provisions of an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland at its January 1927 Session, the Clerk and Treasurer, Henry I. Reindollar, Jr., is thereby directed to collect the levy imposed by this ordinance.

Section 3. And be it enacted and ordained that the levy upon the assessment imposed by this ordinance shall be collected promptly by said Henry I. Reindollar, Jr., and deposited with such other monies as may come into the possession and subject to the order of the Mayor and City Council and the full amount shall be collected on or before November 15, 1960.

Section 4. And be it enacted and ordained by the Mayor and City Council that this ordinance shall take effect the day and date of its passage.

News for the Farmer

In a recent interview with Grover Zimmerman, Soil Conservationist for Carroll County, Zimmerman stated that the meeting of the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin, held on October 6-7 at Frederick Maryland was to discuss the sediment problem of the Potomac River. Conservationists have said that the Monocacy is the greatest offender. Many small streams that form this river originate in Carroll County.

Our average rainfall for Carroll County is 44 inches. Of this, 26 inches evaporates, 9 inches is taken up by ground water replenishment, with 9 inches running off the land. It's this 9 inches that conservationists worry about, the other 35 inches is already being used beneficially.

The Carroll Soil Conservation District, operating for the sole purpose of conserving water and soil are recommending that farmers should on a voluntary basis, practice some or all of the following. Contour farming, onger rotations, more long term hay, better pastures, better woodland management, better wildlife, more tree plantings, farm ponds, grass waterways, diversions and more lime and fertilizers. When these practices are applied to the land, more ground water will be replenished, which in turn, will decrease run off and increase the

water. In 1950 with 150 million peo-ple, we used 203 billion gallons of ple, we used 203 billion gallons of water. In these 10 years our population doubled, while the use of water increased 5 times. This use rate is expected to continue, thus, by 1975, our population is estimated at 228 million and the water consumption at 453 billion gallons.

In addition to good conservation measures used, the necessity of storage dams is a must. The Soil Conservation Service has estimated that several hundred good sites are available in the Monocacy river water shed and studies are being made at the present time in Carroll County so that our people may understand the problem and be prepared to help in the establishment of these conservation measures at the proper



Responding to God

Lesson for October 30, 1960

GOD is to be believed in, trusted, adored. This is true, but not the whole truth. If the faith and trust and adoration stop right there, if they never lead to anything else, then they are no longer what they ought to be. A certain man used to go on a binge period-

ically, and at the height of one (or the bottom of it!) used to send his wife a large box of roses with an adoring note. He may have meant it; but he was a bad husband. His "adoration" of his

wife made no real Dr. Foreman difference with his life. He was the same booze-hound after his marriage as before, just the same irresponsible play-boy as always. On the bank of a southern river there is a kind of concrete wall, several yards long but not connected with any kind of building. That wall was originally intended to support an end of a bridge; but the bridge was never built, so the concrete abutment stands there, in the way of the farmer who plows that riverside field. So "faith" in God, if it leads to nothing, is like that bridgepier, only a nuisance. As James put

Response

The life of the Christian is not, so to speak, something which the Christian himself starts and keeps going by himself. It is the teaching of the Bible from beginning to end, that the right life is a life of response. God takes the initiative; we follow his lead. God invites, we accept. God speaks, we answer. Someone has said that the single force back of a Christian's life is gratitude. Some recople get that backwards. Their picture of the Christian life is: first man does something for hat God notices; second, God is attentioned to the man for the fine thing he has done;

it, faith without works is dead.

third God showers blarings on the man by way of thaths to him. No, it is actually the offer way second. First, God dies 75 much for a man (especially through Christ's sacrificial life and death) that the man notices this, second, the man is grateful to God for his inexpressible gifts: third, the man offers God his life in service, not at all by way of rewarding God, not in the least as laying a claim on God, but out of love and a thankful heart.

The first way this response of man will show, is in his sense of responsibility. He recognizes God as the director and guide of his life, he thinks first of alle not "What will people think of me?" but "What will God think of me?" (This does not come suddenly, it is a habit of mind that has to be learned.) Martin Niemoeller, a German minister who had been a naval officer, explained how it was that he could have "bucked" the all-powerful Hitler and so risked death. "It was simple," Niemoeller said afterwards. "I had a higher Fuehrer than Hitler." That is responsibility, Christian responsibility, taking orders from God first, above all others.

As a sense of responsibility grows, character grows with it. A man does not acquire character by thinking about it. The best way to become a Christian character is not to set aside certain times each week for practice, as you might practice beseball or chess.

Responsibility and Service

In Old Testament times, people made sacrifices by destroying the thing they sacrificed, or at least by withdrawing it from ordinary use. Paul sets out (in Romans 12) the new Christian idea. We understand now that to sacrifice something to God means to put it to use for him. When Paul spoke of our bodies as a "living sacrifice," no doubt some of the Christians at Rome may have wondered if he could mean human sacrifices on altars. But of course he did not. Anyone who will take time to read Romans 12 can see how down-toearth all this is. Paul does not concentrate the reader's mind on great crises, extraordinary one-ina-lifetime opportunities for heroism and martyrdom. He speaks of the ordinary everyday wear and tear of living with other people. Do you love and adore God? Then show you mean it by the Christian way you live with other people.

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


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
