This is a plea from Taneytown High School students to save our school. We, the students, can do very little to save the place which has grown dear to each one of our hearts so we must call on you - the citizens of

Far too long this town has been asleep. We do what the Board of Education dictates but this consolidation is the last straw. Far too long the honorable clubs in Taneytown have concerned themselves with trivial matters but it is

time to wake up and take action — fast. We elected a town council and I, as a student, do not know of one important thing that they have done besides spread mosquito repellent and remove the snow from the main street last winter. That was quite nice of them but they can really shine in the next few months if they will back Taneytown in keeping our school.

Some of our citizens are blinded by tales of T.H.S. They say "Well, my little Some of our citizens are blinded by tales of T.H.S. They say "Well, my little Billy flunked out of college — it's all that dum school's fault." I'm sure you have heard that because I know I have. It is an utterly ridiculous viewpoint. Look at all the students from Taneytown who are making a success at college. In a recent edition of this paper there were over thirty students who had gone to college and are getting through. Those who flunk have caused it themselves by having too much social life. The thirty students represents what a good faculty T.H.S. has.

What about our faculty? FSK (Francis Scott Key) students say they have the BEST faculty in the COUNTY. I have just heard that one of their math teachers was asked to leave. The teachers at THS are very good. They show a sincere interest in the students and although ALL schools have a few bad

a sincere interest in the students and although ALL schools have a few bad teachers, Taneytown, on the whole, presents a neat program of studies. Taneytown is mainly an academic school but our sports also play an important part

of our life.

Since this is an article which we all hope will spur you into action, I will take this opportunity to look inside the THS building. There you find a well-rounded program. In FSK you do not find the music dept. putting on operettas and parts of well-known operas. Our senior and junior classes right now are preparing CARMEN and THE STUDENT PRINCE. In FSK they do not even put on a traditional Class Night and their Jr.-Sr. Proms cannot even look Taneytown's in the face. We have clubs, sports, yearbooks, newspapers, and a literary magazine published by the English Dept. We pride ourselves in having a strong Student Council which takes action on all problems in the school. We have had a lot of improvements in the past few years and now we have two laboratories—one for chemistry and one for physics. Can you imagine little Jr. high students working in those labs? The social life cannot be left out of any school system and Taneytown is no exception. We have dances, pep rallys, sports, programs and on special holidays we have special assemblies. Our rules for the school are strict; in fact we are about the most law-abiding school in the county. At FSK they are allowed to smoke on school ground (A violation of state law). This just cheapens the schools in Carroll County ever since it has come into existence.

If you would visit THS now, you would find a bitter, challenging student body. Everyone of us refuse to go to FSK. Most of the students are thinking about going to Westminster High. Since I am a senior this does not effect me but I cannot stand the thought that I will have graduated from a school that will not exist any more. The eleventh grade is the hardest struck class. Can you imagine working for eleven years to build up a good reputation. Can you imagine working for eleven years to build up a good reputation in the school and then in your 12th year you are moved to a school, out in the middle of nowhere, where you will be nothing—not even on the yearbook staff! It is a horrifying thought and it just cannot be done. Besides that—the road over to FSK is sickening. On a Sunday drive, take time to ride over to road over to FSK is sickening. On a Sunday drive, take time to ride over to FSK and just see all the curves and hills in that road. Then think of your child when snow is lying on that road. If this consolidation goes through, it will be a bitter fight between the FSK and the THS kids next year. We have never gotten along with FSK and it is degrading to think that our students have to go over to that place in no man's land.

And what about our social life at FSK. It could not be possible to stay after school for sports or for anything upless each child had a car. If there were

And what about our social life at FSK. It could not be possible to stay after school for sports or for anything unless each child had a car. If there was a dance we would have to trot in the middle of the night to that wilderness. And then if we were not sixteen, you, the parents, would have to get up at eleven o'clock and go get your children? Now, I ask you, is this the kind of life you want for you and your children?

We have the best band in the county and this is not said out of prejudice. Our band has beaten Westminster, Gettysburg, Littlestown and bands all over this section of the country. And what about our THS uniforms? You, the people, worked hard to give us those uniforms and now they will be thrown in the gutter, so to speak.

Please, dear citizens, help us. My class does not want to be the last class to march away from T.H.S. This is a growing town of over 2000 citizens. We need a school — and the school needs you right now. You Pay higher taxes than Union Bridge and Uniontown (FSK area) put together. This is your town. — handle as if it WERE your town. Get out and fight for your rights and more important — for your children's rights for a good education.

#### FACTS AND OPINIONS

Ralph T. Moore writes, in the Oregon Voter: "Why can't we pull up our sox, make up our minds, and say to the Russians that they may go so far and no further, and then grimly stick with it? History proves that you can't do business on ordinary, decent terms with a dictator. You have to pursue the Teddy Roosevelt course, tread softly but carry a big stick...One cannot but feel deep sympathy and a strong sense of loyalty to our young President as he copes with these tremendous world problems. He will need the wisest counsel he can muster plus the backing of us all. But, we fervently hope that his love of peace does not betray him into disastrous appeasement."

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has issued a leaflet on family fallout shelters. According to it, for persons beyond a five-mile radius of any direct nuclear bomb hit, availability of an adequate shelter would increase their chance of survival from 1 in 10 to 8 in 10.

From a column by Donald I. Rogers in the New York Herald Tribune: "To be fair, it must be stated that the by registered mail to the Respondent TVA rates are lower than some rates charged by the privately-owned utilities, but this is easily accounted for by the fact that TVA pays only token taxes, that it borrows from the Treasury at less than cost and that it is able to charge off much of the cost of hydro-electric dams to flood control and navigation."





They have learned that there are easier ways to earn a living and they have also learned that there is little social prestige in being a farmer. In this generation of Americans both money and prestige are the symbols of success. A boy or girl filled with ambi-tion know that the farm can offer them very little in the way of success. We know of one farmer who offered his son his fifty thousand dollar farm fully equipped if the son would promise to stay on the land. The son refused. He wants to be a chemical engineer and is well on his way to becoming one. A new set of problems are going to be-devil all of us if the current trend gains in mo-mentum. The trend of city dwellers moving out of the city into the country and the rural dwellers going into the cities. It is no use for people to wail about the good old life of the farm. It is going and no amount of wishful thinking will bring it back. For the present social and economic revolution has not yet ended and there are many more changes facing Am ericans before we can settle back





#### **Christians Grow** Lesson for October 8, 1961

CHRISTIANS aren't such a peculiar breed that they stand outside the laws which God has written into nature, the laws that govern all human beings whether Christian or not. The Christian child has to learn his lessons and



a Christian. The boy who goes out Dr. Foreman for the basketball team had better be a good player or he won't get on the team, and that holds for Roman Catholics

or Quakers just the same as for atheists. There are certain laws of growth which are in force at all times and for all persons. The Christian grows, and can grow, only in the way that others do, when it comes to physical, mental and social growth. But what about spiritual growth? How can we,

or can we make progress as

"Learn from Me"

Christians?

First of all, and most foundational of all, the Christian becomes more of a Christian,—he becomes more Christian in every aspect of his life—, by learning from Jesus. This means at least that Jesus is THE TEACHER, the number One teacher, of the growing Christian. If we take seriously the claims of Jesus as we read them in the New Testament, if we take seriously what the church says about the divine authority of our Lord, then the only logical conclusion is: If we take any other authority ahead of the authority of Jesus, we are insincere at worst, inconsistent at best. Now we can't learn from Jesus, we don't rate the name of "disciple" - which is to say, "learner"-if we never read or stop to think about what Jesus

said. The study of the four Gospels is absolutely indispensable for Christian growth

Copy Whom? Of course, learning from Jesus is not only learning to do as he says, but also and always learnhe lived. Even those who are not Christians understand this. Christianity is fully possible, Bernard Shaw said once, only in a nation of Christs. Quite right; and that is precisely what Christians should be aiming at-a nation of Christs. But after all, some one will say, Jesus lived long ago and in vastly different circumstances

from ours How can we follow,

At this point we have a valuable hint from what seems at first a conceited remark by Saint Paul, but is not really conceited: "Copy me," he writes to the Philippians (Moffatt's translation.) The Christians to whom Paul was then writing had no written gospels, and even if they had, they might have felt a little baffled. How could hey-Roman citizens, slaves, Greeks copy Jesus who was neither citizen nor slave nor Greek? Paul gives the answer. "Copy me"; for us this would mean. Imitate the most Christlike persons you know, living in your own time and place. Why Christians Don't Grow

It is a pathetic, tragic fact that most Christians are stunted. Christianity has not spread in the world as one would expect; and one big reason is that we don't have enough good samples of genuine all-round Christians. We are scrawny in spirit for the same reason that some sick people are underweight in body: we can't or won't take proper nourishment. There is still much that I could say to you. but the burden would be too great for you now," Jesus told his disciples. "I could not address you as spiritual men," Paul writes to the Corinthians, "but as

babes in Christ." Not even an inspired apostle, not even our Lord himself, can cram truth down into the mind of one who is not ready for it, or who rejects it. There is a mental disease, or symptom known as aboulia, in which the patient just does not want to do anything whatever. Set the patient, hungry from two days' fasting, down in front of a bountiful meal, and the patient sits there without moving; will starve there if not helped. Spiritual aboulia is worse, for it starves the very soul


