FACTS AND OPINIONS

Ralph T. Moore writes, in the Oregon Voter: "Why can't we pull up our socks, make up our minds, and say to the Russians that they may go so far and no further, and then grimly stick with it? History proves that you can't do business on ordinary, decent terms with a dictator. You have to pursue the Teddy Roosevelt course, tread softly but carry a big stick...One cannot but feel deep sympathy and a strong sense of loyalty to our young President as he copes with these tremendous world problems. He will need the wisest counsel he can muster plus the backing of us all. But, we fervently hope that his love of peace does not betray him into disastrous appeasement."

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has issued a leaflet on family fallout shelters. According to it, for persons beyond a five-mile radius of any direct nuclear bomb hit, availability of an adequate shelter would increase their chance of survival from 1 in 10 to 8 in 10.

From a column by Donald I. Rogers in the New York Herald Tribune: "To be fair, it must be stated that the TVA rates are lower than some rates charged by the privately-owned utilities, but this is easily accounted for by the fact that TVA pays only token taxes, that it borrows from the Treasury at less than cost and that it is able to charge off much of the cost of hydro-electric dams to flood control and navigation."

Full and vigorous Administration support for prompt Congressional action on the railroads' legislative program has been requested by the president of the Association of American Railroads. In a letter to Secretary of Commerce Hodges, he listed eight essential and urgent proposals, along with others of a less urgent nature. The Secretary has been designated by the President to study the nation's transportation problems, and to formulate his suggestions by November 1.

In North Carolina, according to Thurman Sensing of the Southern States Industrial Council, the number of people on the free food dole shot up from 1,000 to 147,000 in the first six months of this year. And, he adds, the story is similar in other states.

Football is in the air again—literally. Thousands of them are being tossed and kicked by hundreds of thousands of American boys. The American Medical Association offers some suggestions that can help to reduce the danger of serious injury, and even death, from this rough personal contact sport. Proper physical conditioning prevents injuries by hardening the body and increasing resistance of fatigue. Careful coaching leads to skillful performance, which lowers the incidence of injuries. Good officiating promotes enjoyment of the game as well as protection of the players. The right kind of equipment and facilities serve a major safety purpose. And adequate medical care is a necessity in the prevention and control of athletic injuries.

The question of, "Is your seat belt fastened?", so long associated with the airplane, has been adopted by the Long Island Lighting Company in a new automobile safety program for its employees. Convinced of the very real safety benefits afforded by the belts, the company's aim is to make their use second nature on the part of both drivers and passengers.

Hare, of the object and substance of this Bill of Complaint and warning her to be and appear in this Honorable Court in person or by Solicitor on or before the 8th day of November 1961, next, and file a Plea, answer or other defense within fifteen days thereafter, showing cause, if any, why a decree ought not to be passed as prayed.

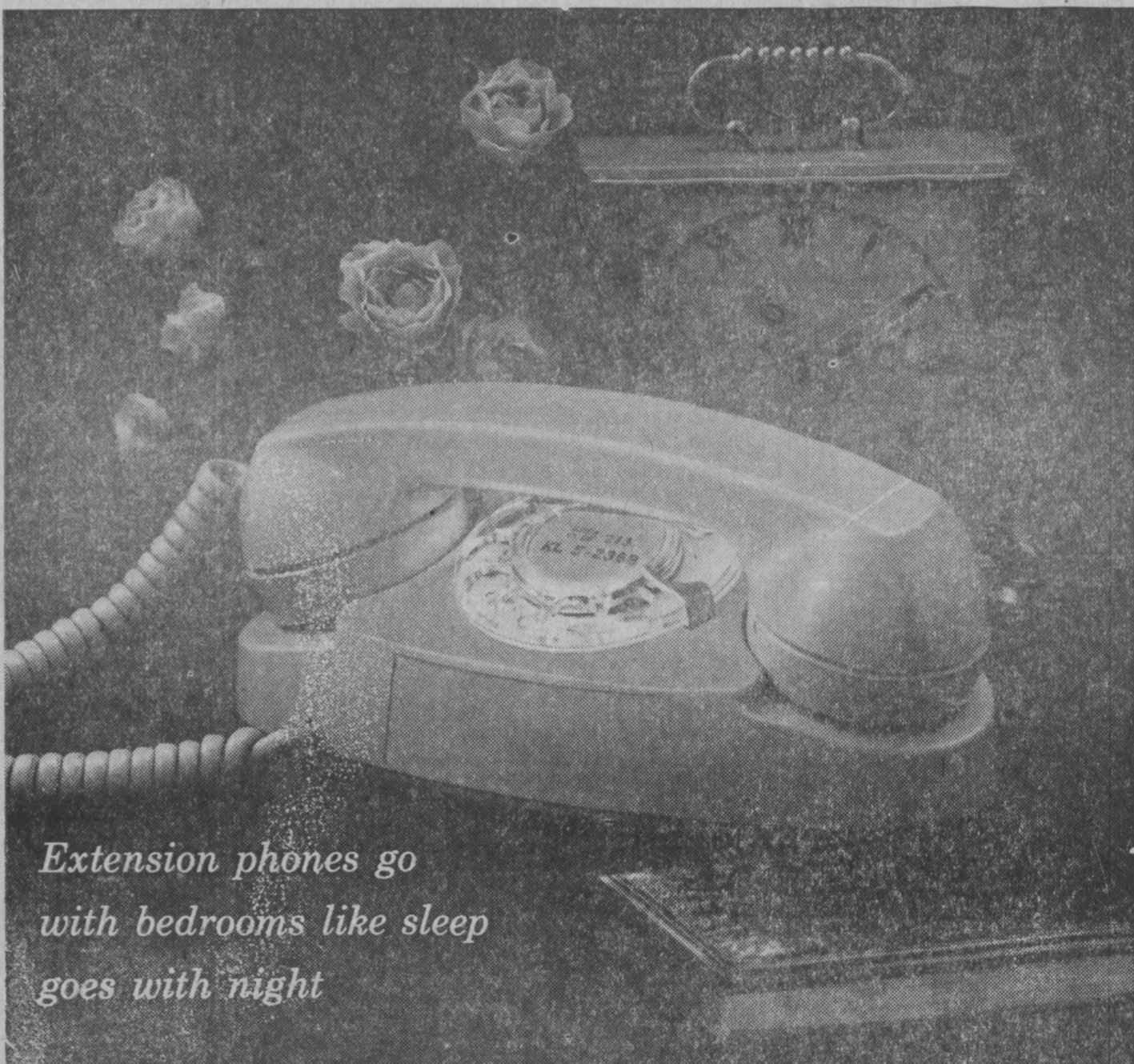

Women Have Better Vision When It Comes to Color

Women in general have a better color awareness than men, says Rita Long, New York color stylist. That's why Miss Long believes that a woman's role in selecting exterior colors for a new or existing home should be a major one.

Here are some of her suggestions:

The color scheme of a house should always be related closely to its natural surroundings. "But that doesn't mean you can't use lively colors," Miss Long says.

"For a desert house, for instance, I might choose sand beige siding, a cactus yellow door, sage green trim, and a roof of white asphalt shingles." White asphalt shingles, she explains, are an especially good choice in hot climates because they keep the house cooler by reflecting the sun's rays without glare.

For a house on a rocky hillside, Miss Long suggests white siding, a barn red panel door and shutters, medium green asphalt shingles to blend with sur-

rounding trees, and a long, low planter of natural stone to tie the house into the landscape.

It's best to choose the roof color first, then plan the other exterior colors around it, Miss Long advises. Asphalt shingles will last for many years, whereas the siding and trim can be painted every few years.

In selecting the color for siding, be sure it's appreciably darker or lighter than the roof, Miss Long warns. For instance, if you choose a light gray roof and want blue siding, pick a dark blue. "You need contrast in value as well as in hue," she explains.

"Don't be afraid of color," says Miss Long. "Look how lavishly nature uses it!" But be guided by the natural colors in your area. With asphalt shingles available in many colors, ranging from light to deep tones, and the wide palette of exterior paints now being sold, your house can be completely individual yet look as though it belongs in its surroundings.

EFFICIENT USE OF CORNER SPACE

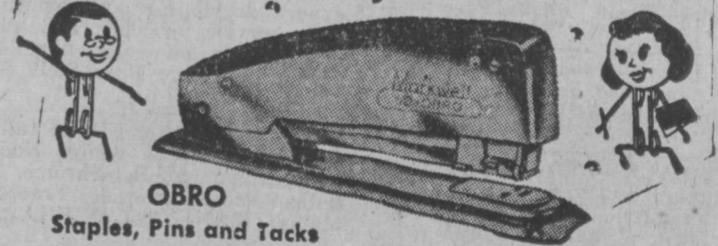

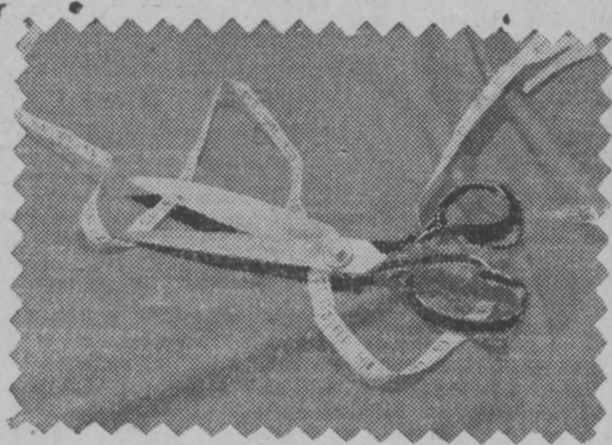

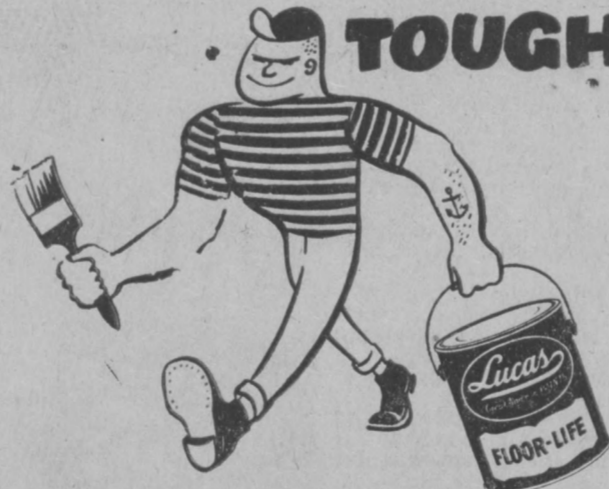
