BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education of Carroll County held a regular meeting at 9 A. M. on Tuesday, December 12, with all members present. The Board took action to approve the minutes as presented for the November 7 meeting and financial statement and current transactions in connection with the payment of bills were approved also.

The Board considered and reopened discussion in connection with the issues related to the consolidation of the upper grades of the Taneytown Sr. High School into the Francis Scott Key High School, effective September 1962. A number of pieces of correspondence and other materials related to the issue were read to the Board and considered. Following discussion, the Board passed a motion to adhere to the original plan as announced following the September meeting, directing that grades 10, 11 and 12 from the Taneytown High School (consisting of approximately 150 pupils) be merged into the Francis Scott Key High School as planned. Action on the motion to adhere to the original decision was passed by a vote of five to one with Mr. Merwyn C. Fuss voting against the motion.

The Board approved the employment of Mrs. Martha Wiley to the Taneytown High School, Mrs. Martha Ritchie to the East End Elementary School, Miss Sue A. Shultz to the Francis Scott Key School and Mrs. Louise D. Wright to the Elmer Wolfe Elementary School.

Approval was given for payment of summer school reimbursement to teachers who had attended summer school and qualified for same.

Action was also taken to approve the organization of the central office and employees salaries for the year 1962.

The Board considered the vacant Western Maryland District Tuition Scholarship for one-half year, effective for the second semester and, after consideration, awarded a one-half year scholarship from the 14th District (Berrett) to Ann Hamilton of Westminster.

The Board took recommended action in connection with a number of requests and approved the purchase of one staff automobile from the Westminster Motor Co. at their bid price of \$1458.33 plus trade-in.

Announcement was made to the Board regarding the Maryland Conference on Education planned for January 11 and 12 in Baltimore and several members indicated their plans to attend the meetings.

The Board received copies of the recently completed Annual Report covering the operations of the school in 1960-61. Action was taken approving extra expenses connected with the Taneytown Elementary School and the Westminster Jr. High Annex including provision of additional electrical service at Taneytown and outside lighting on the William Winchester Elem. School.

Approval was given by the Board for the designation of the North Carroll School as headquarters for the U. S. District Attorney personnel should an evacuation of Baltimore be required.

The Board took action to approve the decision of the Superintendent in connection with foot examinations for school pupils.

The Superintendent reported that he was not in a position to report on the budget approval of the school budget for 1962 but that the Board would be informed in a January meeting regarding the action taken on the budget and the effect on the program of education.

Adjournment was at 11:30 A. M.

Long Distance Telephone Call on Christmas Day

How come there are more long distance telephone calls made every business day than there are on Christmas?

Doesn't the younger generation care any longer about "the old folks at home"? For that matter, have the "old folks" forgotten their attachment for children far away at Christmas-time? Don't you believe it!

The telephone company expects this Christmas to be the most hectic day of the year as usual, maybe even more so. And if you are planning to place a long distance call between 7 p.m. on Christmas Eve and about 10 p.m. on Christmas night, whether it's to a town 3,000 miles across the continent or a town 50 miles away, it's quite possible that you'll have some waiting to do.

It is true that the millions of Americans who will call long distance this Christmas will be substantially lower in number than those whose long distance calls go through promptly on any regular business day.

But there is a logical explanation for that. The bulk of everyday long distance calling is of a business nature, mostly between offices in large metropolitan centers. There are hundreds of long distance lines or circuits between large cities like Baltimore, New York, Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles, and they can easily handle the everyday traffic.

Christmas calls, on the other hand, are almost exclusively inspired by sentiment and a very large number of them are to small towns or homes in suburban areas.

That's where the difficulty arises. The lines that connect big cities with small towns or link rural communities are far less numerous, and heavy long distance calling to such areas may require some juggling of circuits—and some waiting.

According to Mrs. Culler, long distance chief operator in Westminster the phone company puts a lot of prior planning into the handling of the one-day-a-year Christmas load.

Immediately after Mother's Day, the second peak holiday of the year in long distance calling, the telephone company's analysts begin a study of calls made on that day and on the previous Christmas.

With information on the points of heaviest traffic and the places where the longest and most frequent delays occurred, company engineers estimate where additional long distance equipment is most urgently needed for the current Christmas.

Anticipating that operators will handle a record number of Christmas long distance calls from this area, Mrs. Culler said a large operating force will be on duty. She also said that many thousands of incoming calls will be made to telephones served from her switchboards.

Mrs. Culler said that her experience has shown Christmas long distance callers can help expedite their calls by making use of the following suggestions:

* Dial your long distance call directly if it is possible to do so. Your telephone directory has information about this.

* Call by number if the number cannot be dialed directly. This saves one whole operation on the call, since the operator does not first have to contact "Information" in the called city or town.

* Call station-to-station. This saves the extra time it takes to get a person-to-person call through, and the cost is lower.

* If you know the calling route or area dialing code of the place you are calling, it will save time if you give information to the operator.

* Give the operator a little extra time to answer you. The chances are that she's working on a call that is difficult to get through, and hanging up to dial again will not expedite the call.

According to Mrs. Culler the reduced holiday rates go into effect at 6 p.m. on Saturday, December 23 and end on Tuesday, December 26 at 4:30 a.m.

Letter From County Commissioners To The Board of Education

The following letter was forwarded to the Board of Education office before the Board's meeting on Tuesday, December 12, 1961:

Mr. Samuel M. Jenness
Superintendent of Schools
Westminster, Maryland
Dear Mr. Jenness:

On Friday, December 8, 1961, you were present in our office when a large group of people from Taneytown appeared before us protesting against the consolidation of the Senior High School at Taneytown with the Senior High School at Uniontown, known as Francis Scott Key High School.

With this group appeared their counsel, Mr. Allen A. Resnick, of Baltimore, who left with us a three page letter reciting the basis of the protest, and requesting that this Board "put itself on notice with the School Board, as being opposed to the closing of Taneytown High School". On numerous occasions heretofore all three of the individual members of our Board have been approached by citizens of the Taneytown area, who have continuously opposed the removal of the Senior High School at Taneytown to the Francis Scott Key School, but the appearance of the group on Friday represented the first concerted act in an effort to have our Board give notice of its position on this question.

It is our understanding that the matter of the conduct of the schools is committed by law to the Board of Education, which acts in many instances on the recommendation of the Superintendent, and that legally a Board of County Commissioners has no voice in the solution of the many problems that arise in the field of public education, except limited discretionary powers in making provision for the necessary funds to operate the schools.

However, in the instant case, we are unanimously of the opinion that had we known a couple of years ago, when we were asked to provide in the neighborhood of \$100,000.00 for the renovation and enlargement of the Taneytown High School, that the Board of Education of Carroll County then had in contemplation the consolidation of this school with the Key School, it is highly probable that we would have been extremely reluctant to spend that amount of County money on a high school so soon to be abandoned as such through the proposed consolidation.

Further than this, it has been represented to us that a substantial majority of the citizens of the Taneytown area are opposed to losing their Senior High School, and in the conduct of that portion of the affairs of County Government that is committed to us as a Board of County Commissioners, we consistently try to yield to a majority opinion, whenever it is possible to do so.

We, of course, do not pretend to have any competence beyond that of average citizens in the field of administration of public school affairs, and since it has not been represented to us that the proposed consolidation would result in any economic benefit to our citizens, it naturally follows that we must assume that the reason therefor is based upon the theory that children receive a better education in a large school than is available to them in a small one.

As citizens the members of this Board have been accustomed only to living conditions in this rural area of Carroll County, where during the lives of all three of us we have gone from the little red schoolhouse of one or two rooms to enormous and costly consolidated school buildings. Yet we have not been made aware that the quality of education available to those pupils who attend high school is sufficiently better than it used to be to justify further enforced consolidation, over the objections of a substantial majority of the citizens affected.

Therefore, while disclaiming any intention on our part to interfere to any extent in the orderly conduct of the educational features of our public school system, we nevertheless have been asked by this group of citizens to make an expression of our opinion, and in doing so we must say that we unanimously believe that in the long run the interests and general welfare of the people of our County will be better served by allowing Taneytown to retain its Senior High School until such time as public opinion indicates otherwise.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CHICAGO, ILL., NEWS-JOURNAL: "Only ten short years ago, all levels of government in the U. S. were spending considerably less than half of what they are spending now. Our money is gone, our debt is growing, and our freedoms are dwindling away as a centralized government reaches out greedily for ever-increasing power over the lives of all of the citizens... Let us remember the truth—that power tends to corrupt, and that absolute power tends to corrupt to the fullest degree."

LAKEVIEW, ORE., LAKE COUNTY EXAMINER: "Great as our need is today for timber, water, meat, and minerals, the need will be far greater tomorrow, for the jobs as well as the resources themselves. We can get ready for that only by continuous development, conservation, and search. We cannot get ready by fencing off parts of the domain, by hamstringing true multiple-use."

"Instead, our role must be encouragement to the timberman, the stockman, the developer of water, and the prospector. Beautiful as a few million untrammelled acres may be to the occasional seeker of solitude, the resources of the areas involved can be far more beautiful, and to far more people, if developed into payrolls, tax installments, useful articles of manufacture, and greater national strength and status."

CHESTER, S. C., REPORTER: "The twentieth century political liberalism (so-called) in the United States thrives on depression. Being political, its base is governmental action, including a wide variety of federal paternalism."

BROOKFIELD, N. Y., COURIER: "When the white man discovered this country, the Indians were running it. There were no taxes. There was no debt. The women did all the work... And the white man thought he could improve on a system like that!"

HAVRE DE GRACE, MD., DEMOCRATIC LEDGER: "Too many people in government are telling businessmen what to do and how to do it. A great many... couldn't run a peanut stand and make it a profitable operation."

LOUISBURG, N. C., TIMES: "Because of the almost confiscatory rate of taxes, many businessmen have been discouraged from fighting so vigorously to expand their businesses. Prepare Lamb Shanks For Variety

Every homemaker knows how to prepare leg of lamb and lamb chops. These are popular, well-known cuts of meat. However, you should be interested in other cuts of lamb that can add delicious variety to family and company meals. You'll find this meat dish "pretty as a picture" — tender, golden brown lamb shanks, served on fluffy white rice, with rich, well-seasoned brown onion gravy. Every member of the family is sure to like stuffed lamb shanks, also. In this dish the shank bones are removed when the meat is tender and then the cavity is filled with crisp, canned French fried onions.

BRAISED LAMB SHANKS WITH ONION GRAY (pictured)

- 5 or 6 lamb shanks (bones cracked) 1/2 cup salad oil
Juice of 1/2 lemon 1 (10 1/2 oz.) can consommé
1/2 cup flour 1/2 can O & C French Fried Onions
1/2 teaspoons salt 1 cup water
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Have butcher crack lamb shank bones. Rub shanks with lemon juice. Combine flour, salt and pepper, roll shanks in this mixture. Brown slowly on all sides in salad oil. Transfer shanks to large casserole. Combine consommé and water. Pour over shanks. Cover and bake in moderate oven 375 degrees for 2 hours or until meat is very tender. Pour off liquid, add enough water, if necessary, to make about 2 cups of liquid for gravy. Stir in canned French fried onions and heat gravy just to boiling. Note: For thicker gravy add additional French fried onions.

LAMB SHANKS STUFFED WITH FRENCH FRIED ONIONS

- 5 or 6 lamb shanks 1/2 teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons shortening or 1 (8 1/2 oz.) can O & C French Fried Onions
2 teaspoons salt

Brown lamb shanks in shortening. Pour off drippings. Add salt, pepper and enough water to cover shanks. Cover and let simmer until meat is tender, about 2 hours. Let cool and then gently remove the bones. (They will slip out easily when the meat is tender.) Stuff the shanks with French fried onions. Pour broth over shanks, sprinkle any remaining onions over top. Place in oven at 350 degrees for about 20 minutes or until heated through. Canned French fried onions are wonderful for parties and snacks. They're a special treat when used in cooking. They add crunchiness to stuffings and all types of casseroles. Use them in place of bread crumbs or potato chips on top of your favorite casserole whether it is meat, fish, vegetable or poultry. The trick is to top the casserole with French fried onions during the last 10 minutes of baking. This prevents excessive browning, yet heats them enough for extra crispness.

Massage instruments have many uses. They relax tension to encourage better sleep, soothe sore and aching muscles, decrease fatigue, and stimulate circulation.

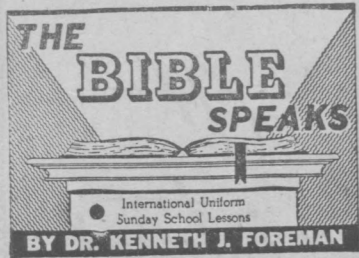

Tears at Christmas

Lesson for December 24, 1961

CHRISTMAS is not always what we expect it to be. We have been to church, we have received presents and given them, we have toured the stores, all decorated for the season, and we have seen who knows how many lighted trees and Christmas stars. Maybe we went home for Christmas, or if we are older, the younger members of the family came to see us. Surely there is little left out of what it would take to make a happy Christmas. And yet the passing of the Day does leave heartaches amidst all the happiness. This is nothing new; it has been so since the first Christmas.

Disappointments

Put yourself in the place of some of the persons who figure in the Christmas stories in Matthew and Luke. Joseph, we know, was a carpenter, no rich man, but not on the bottom of the heap either. We can imagine that he must have wanted, for Mary's first born, the best of everything. But now the little baby has to be born in a stable, surrounded really by the worst of everything. What may have galled Joseph, and Mary too, was the thought that if it had not been for the wicked Romans, this long winter journey to Bethlehem would not have been necessary. The child was robbed of all that Mary and Joseph had planned for him—and yet he was by legal descent heir to the throne of David. The Romans had long since abolished that throne. Heirs to vanished thrones got no favored treatment from the Romans.

Mary must have been sorely disappointed no less. That her Son was born to be a king, she had no doubt; but a king's first appearance should surely be more dignified if not more splendid. Everything the baby's eyes fell on—the manger, the cattle, the

crowds—suggested poverty, struggle, the lot of the dispossessed. We know that when Mary went up for the purification ceremony a few weeks later, her offering was one which was allowed only in the case of people who were extremely poor.

Our Own Disappointments

If some recording angel went about the country on December 26, asking the same question of every Christian: Did you have a perfect Christmas? he might seldom get the answer Yes. Yes, it would have been perfect if she had been here. Yes, it would have been perfect if I could only forget the terrible state the world is in.

There is joy in Christmas, and it ought not to be a season of tears. But beneath the carols there are the hearts heavy with frustration, disappointment, bereavement, and the sadness of those who realize that after all these centuries peace is harder to find than ever, men of good will too few. Christmas may remind us that in this life we cannot put off joy until all causes of sorrow and regret have been abolished. Jesus our Lord was born where and as he was, because of the military power of a pagan people. The first Christmas had its shadows, and they were deep.

Joy and Tears

The Christian's joy is not built on a make-believe. There are people who can persuade themselves that there is nothing wrong with the world, nothing really bad in it. But this is not the Christian view. We do not deceive ourselves by mere happy-talk. We must not turn the Christmas-carol record up so loud as to drown the sounds of weeping in the darkness. Christmas is not a season to forget the woes of the world, it is a time to resolve afresh to do what we can to make those woes fewer. Christians can join in every good work for the benefit of the oppressed and the lonely and the victims of man's inhumanity to man, because we believe that God is still on the throne. Christmas should remind us that it is possible to rejoice even in the midst of frustration, disappointment and regrets, possible to cherish hope even long deferred. And Christmas-tide may even rebuke us: For the troubles of the world, are we not partly to blame? Can we honestly say that we have never caused a single tear in the sorrowing world? Is our Christianity all a matter of carefree carols, or of outstretched helping hands?

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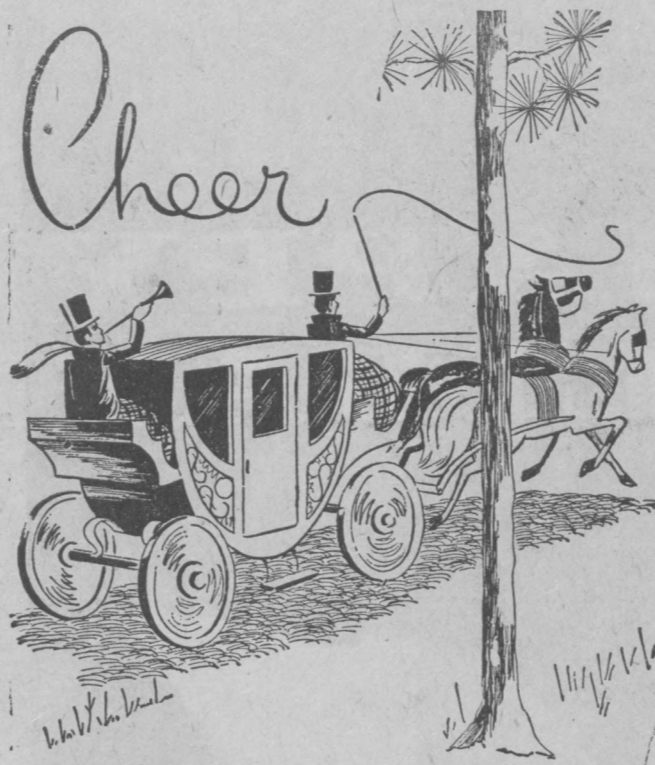

Outdoor Decorations Should Not Harm Evergreen Shrubs

It won't be a chilly Christmas for many outdoor evergreens and shrubs this year, with outside home decorations expected to be even more popular than in past years.

It's nice to have bright decorations outside, tree experts say, but too many home owners give their home grounds evergreens a hot foot while stringing them with overly-powerful Christmas lights for a blinking, brilliant colorama.

They offer this advice to protect trees while utilizing them to the best advantage in achieving that beautiful outdoor display:

Use only electrical fixtures designed to be strung on outdoor trees.

Use bulbs no stronger than 15-watts. They're bright enough to be gay and colorful, yet don't generate enough heat to burn foliage, even on direct contact.

Check periodically to determine if needles or foliage are turning brown in vicinity of lights. If so, rearrange the lights. Not even a beautiful light display is worth marring valuable evergreens that are a source of beauty the year round.
