Letter From County Commissioners To The **Board of Education**

The following letter was forwarded to the Board of Education office before the Board's meeting on Tuesday, De-Mr. Samuel M. Jenness Superintendent of Schools Westminster, Maryland Dear Mr. Jenness:

On Friday, December 8, 1961, you were present in our office when a large group of people from Taneytown appeared before us protesting against the consolidation of the Senior High

the consolidation of the Senior High School at Taneytown with the Senior High School at Uniontown, known as Francis Scott Key High School. With this group appeared their counsel, Mr. Allen A. Resnick, of Baltimore, who left with us a three page letter reciting the basis of the protest, and requesting that this protest, and requesting that this Board "put itself on notice with the

School Board, as being opposed to the closing of Taneytown High School".

On numerous occasions heretofore all three of the individual members of our Board have been approached by citizens of the Taneytown area, the heavement in the contract of the second that the contract of the second that the secon who have continuously opposed the removal of the Senior High School at Taneytown to the Francis Scott Key School, but the appearance of the group on Friday represented the first concerted act in an effort to have our Board give notice of its position on this question.

It is our understanding that the matter of the conduct of the schools is committed by law to the Board of Education, which acts in many instances on the recommendation of the Superintendent, and that legally a Board of County Commissioners has no voice in the solution of the many problems that arise in the field of public education, except limited discretionary powers in making provision for the necessary funds to operate the schools the schools.

However, in the instant case, we are unanimously of the opinion that had we known a couple of years ago, when we were asked to provide in the neighborhood of \$100,000.00 for the renovation and enlargement of the Taney-town High School, that the Board of Education of Carroll County then had in contemplation the consolidation of this school with the Key School, it is highly probable that we would have been extremely reluctant to spend that amount of County money on a high school so soon to be aban doned as such through the proposed

Further than this, it has been repre-Further than this, it has been represented to us that a substantial majority of the citizens of the Taneytown area are opposed to losing their Senior High School, and in the conduct of that Portion of the affairs of County Government that is committed to us as a Board of County Commissioners, we consistently try to yield to a majority opinion, whenever it is possible to do so.

We, of course, do not pretend to have any competence beyond that of average citizens in the fold of of the conduct of th

average citizens in the field of administration of public school affairs, and since it has not been represented to us that the proposed consolidation would result in any economic benefit to our citizens, it naturally follows that we must assume that the reason therefor is based upon the theory that children receive a better education in a large school than is avail-

able to them in a small one.

As citizens the members of this Board have been accustomed only to living conditions in this rural area of Carroll County, where during the lives of all three of us we have gone from the little red schoolhouse of one or two rooms to enormous and costly consolidated school buildings. Yet we have not been made aware that the quality of education available to those pupils who attend high school is sufficiently better than it used to be to justify further enforced consolidation, over the objections of a substantial majority of the citizens

Therefore, while disclaiming any intention on our part to interfere to any extent in the orderly conduct of the educational features of our public school system, we nevertheless have been asked by this group of citizens to make an expression of our opinion. and in doing so we must say that we unanimously believe that in the long run the interests and general wel-fare of the people of our County will be better served by allowing Taney-town to retain its Senior High School until such time as public opinion in-digetes otherwise. dicates otherwise.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CHICAGO, ILL., NEWS - JOUR-NAL: "Only ten short years ago, all levels of government in the U. S. were spending considerably less than half of what they are spending now. Our money is gone, our debt is growing, and our freedoms are dwindling away as a centralized government reaches out greedily for ever-increasing power over the lives of all of the citizens....Let us remember the truth—that power tends to corrupt, and that absolute power tends to corrupt to the fullest degree."

LAKEVIEW, ORE., LAKE COUN-TY EXAMINER: "Great as our need is today for timber, water, meat, and minerals, the need will be far greater tomorrow, for the jobs as well as the resources themselves. We can get ready for that only by continuous development, conservation, and search. We cannot get ready by fencing off parts of the domain, by hamstringing true multiple-use.

"Instead, our role must be encouragement to the timberman, the stockman, the developer of water, and the prospector. Beautiful as a few million untrammeled acres may be to the occasional seeker of solitude, the resources of the areas involved can be far more beautiful, and to far more people, if developed into payrolls, tax installments, useful articles of manufacture, and greater national strength and status."

CHESTER, S. C., REPORTER "The twentieth century political liberalism (so-called) in the United States thrives on depression. Being political, its base is governmental action, including a wide variety of federal paternalism."

BROOKFIELD, N. Y., COURIER: "When the white man discovered this country, the Indians were running it. There were no taxes. There was no debt. The women did all the work.... And the white man thought he could

improve on a system like that!" HAVRE DE GRACE, MD., DEM-OCRATIC LEDGER: "Too many people in government are telling businessmen what to do and how to do it. A great many....couldn't run a peanut stand and make it a profitable operation."

LOUISBURG, N. C., TIMES: "Because of the almost confiscatory rate of taxes, many businessmen have been discouraged from fighting so vigorously to expand their businesses. A reduction in taxes would tend to right this wrong. It would provide an incentive for expansion. It would put more money into circulation by allowing private people to keep more money, by creating more jobs as businesses were expanded, which in turn would put even more money into circulation."

PETALUMA, CALIF., ARGUS-COURIER: "A pretty good example of labor union monopoly has turned up in New York City. There, all the milk drivers and inside workers in all plants.. struck over a wage increase and arrangements about overtime. Almost overnight, milk became as scarce in New York as black ink in the Federal budget."

Tears at Christmas Lesson for December 24, 1961

CHRISTMAS is not always what we expect it to be. We have been to church, we have received presents and given them, we have toured the stores, all decorated



for the season, and we have seen who knows how many lighted trees and Christmas stars. Maybe we went home for Christmas, or if we are older, the younger members of the family

Dr. Foreman came to see us. Surely there is little left out of what it would take to make a happy Christmas. And yet the passing of the Day does leave heartaches amidst all the happiness. This is nothing new; it has been so since the first Christmas.

Disappointments Put yourself in the place of some of the persons who figure in the Christmas stories in Matthew and Luke. Joseph, we know, was a carpenter, no rich man, but not on the bottom of the heap either. We can imagine that he must have wanted, for Mary's first born, the pest of everything. But now the little baby has to be born in a stable, surrounded really by the worst of everything. What may nave galled Joseph, and Mary too, was the thought that if it had not been for the wicked Romans, this long winter journey to Bethlehem would not have been necessary. The child was robbed of all that Mary and Joseph had planned for him,-and yet he was by legal descent heir to the throne of David. The Romans had long since abolished that throne. Heirs to vanished thrones got no favored treat-

ment from the Romans. Mary must have been sorely disappointed no less. That her Son was born to be a king, she had no doubt; but a king's first appearance should surely be more dignified if not more splendid Everything the baby's eyes fell on,-the manger, the cattle. the

crowds.—suggested poverty, struggle he lot of the dispossessed. We know that when Mary went up for the purification ceremony a few weeks later, her offering was one which was allowed only in the case of people who were extremely poor.

Our Own Disappointments

If some recording angel went about the country on December 26, asking the same question of every Christian: Did you have a perfect Christmas? he might seldom get the answer Yes. Yes, it would have been perfect if she had been here. Yes it would have been perfect if I could only forget the terrible state the world is in.

There is joy in Christmas, and it ought not to be a season of tears. But beneath the carols there are the hearts heavy with frustration, disappointment, bereavement, and the sadness of those who realize that after all these centuries peace is harder to find than ever, men of good will too few. Christmas may remind us that in this life we cannot put off joy until all causes of sorrow and regret have been abolished. Jesus our Lord was born where and as he was, because of the military power of a pagan people. The first Christmas had its shadows, and they were deep.

Joy and Tears

The Christian's joy is not built on a make-believe. There are people who can persuade themselves that there is nothing wrong with the world, nothing really bad in it. But this is not the Christian view. We do not deceive ourselves by mere happy-talk. We must not turn the Christmas-carol record up so loud as to drown the sounds of weeping in the darkness. Christmas is not a season to forget the woes of the world, it is a time to resolve afresh to do what we can to make those woes fewer. Christians can join in every good work for the benefit of the oppressed and the lonely and the victims of man's inhumanity to man, because we believe that God is still on the throne. Christmas should remind us that it is possible to rejoice even in the midst of frustration, disappointment and regrets, possible to cherish hope even long deferred. And Christmas-tide may even rebuke us: For the troubles of the world, are we not partly to blame? Can we honestly say that we have never caused a single tear in the sorrowing world? Is our Christianity all a matter of carefree carols, or of outstretched helping hands?

Outdoor Decorations Should Not Harm Evergreen, Skrubs

It won't be a chilly Christmas for many outdoor evergreens and shrubs this year, with outside home decorations expected to be even more popular than in past

It's nice to have bright decora-tions outside, tree experts say, but too many home owners give their home grounds evergreens a hot foot while stringing them with overly-powerful Christmas lights for a blinking, brilliant colorama.

They offer this advice to protect trees while utilizing them to the best advantage in achieving that beautiful outdoor display:

Use only electrical fixtures designed to be strung on outdoor

Use bulbs no stronger than 15watts. They're bright enough to be gay and colorful, yet don't generate enough heat to burn foliage, even on direct contact.

Check periodically to determine if needles or foliage are turning brown in vicinity of lights. If so, rearrange the lights. Not even a beautiful light display is worth marring valuable evergreens that are a source of beauty the year
