#### Taneytown Jaycee Survey **Shows Citizens Behind** Fight For School

Upon special request, the Taney-town Jaycees have released some preliminary results of the public opinion survey now being conducted in the Taneytown Area. Interested parties have been anxious to see what a strictly impartial survey might disclose in respect to the percentage of persons opposed or in favor of the Carroll County Board of Education's decision to consolidate Taneytown High with Francis Scott Key High School. The survey committee de-cided to make public these figures at this time since the State Board of Education is slated to make a decision concerning our appeal on February

According to the incomplete and unofficial compilation of results based on 835 persons interviewed thus far, over 88% of the citizens stated that they were against the consolidation action taken by the County Board. The question, which was one of

over 40 asking opinions on many phases of community life in Taney town, was worded as follows: "Ar town, was worded as follows: "Are you for or against the consolidation of Taneytown High School with Francis Scott Key High School?" Based on the returns thus far, 739 stated that they were AGAINST the consolidation. Only sixty one, or about seven per-cent, (7%), said they were FOR consolidation, and the remaining 5% had no opinion, were not concerned, or did not anwere not concerned, or did not an

were not concerned, or did not answer the question.

Jaycee officials could not say exactly how many homes or the total population which this represented, but stated that it would appear that at least 75% of the persons living within the city limits would be included, in addition to a goodly number outside the town limits. ber outside the town limits. Com-plete and official figures and analy-sis will not be available for another month or so, they said.

### FACTS AND OPINIONS

President Philip A. Fleger of the Edison Electric Institute reports: "During 1961 the total electric utility industry achieved new records in power production, capability and sales—despite a business recession in the first months of the year and a lower than expected increase in business activity during the later months. This continued growth maintained the United States' commanding lead over all other nations in the world in electric power. During the year, too, investor-owned electric companies announced plans for an \$8-billion, 10-year program to strengthen and add to their nationwide network of transmission lines. This will more than double the present company investment in transmission facilities."

During the 1962 fiscal year, says the Tax Foundation, total government spending in this country will come to \$173 billion. That amounts to about a third of the gross national product (which is the value of all the goods and services we produce) and represents \$3,050 for every American

Supreme Court Justice Douglas recently lashed out at what he termed "the powerful lobby of the rural coops" for its support of a dam on the Potomac. In his words, "This river bend dam will inundate some of our loveliest valley and river bottom lands in the area and substitute for their beauty the stinking banks of a muddy reservoir." He also said that the Potomac could be cleaned up for what it would cost to build the dam. Justice Douglas is almost as well know for his interest in the preservation of our scenic natural reas a jurist.

According to recently released statistics, one out of every two drivers on the road today will either be killed or be involved in a major traffic accident during his lifetime.

From the Portland Oregonian: "What many people apprehend, and what this newspaper predicts, is that if health care for the elderly is brought under Social Security, this will be only the beginning. The eventual result will be a governmentmanaged health insurance plan for everyone, as in Great Britain."

Internal Revenue Commissioner Caplin, writing in The Exchange, the New York Stock Exchange's official publication, renews the call for voluntary reporting of dividends and interest income. At the same time, he stresses the service is convinced that the overwhelming majority of taxpayers are honest. In his words, "They must be, when it is recalled that they voluntarily assess themselves to pay \$91 billion of the \$94.4 billion total levied from all sources by the Federal Government in fiscal 1961—the largest amount ever collected by any government in the history of the world."

Capital spending of U.S. oil companies will increase 6 per cent this year, according to Petroleum Management. Estimated outlays by domestic companies at home and abroad will reach \$8.1 billion, as compared with \$7.6 billion last year.

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

In an effort to close the barn be-fore the horse is stolen, the Mary-land General Assembly is now con-sidering a Maryland Securities Act sometimes known as a Blue Sky Law. This bill provides new and comprehensive security control and regulations. It is recommended by the Gubernatorial Commission to Study the Administration of the Maryland Blue Sky Law. The Commission, appointed the comprehension of the Maryland Blue Sky Law. ed pursuant to Joint Resolution 18 of 1961, was charged with considering the adequacy of the Maryland Blue Sky Law and the method of its administration. The Commission in its report stated that it found the provisions of the Uniform Securities Act to be vastly superior to the existing Blue Sky Law. Therefore recommended enactment of the Uniform Act, as modified for use in Maryland. The Act prohibits fradulent practices in the purchase and sale of securities, requires registration of broker-dealers and agents, registration of se-curities sold locally, provides for ex-emptions from the Act, and for its enforcement. It is hoped that this bill, if passed, will eliminate many of the abuses that are sometimes found in security transactions. 



Lesson for February 25, 1962

HAT is the most valuable feature of American life? It as not the supermarkets, the big double-lane highways, it isn't the cars or even the schools. Many, even Christians,



would say it is not even the churches that are the best American possession. What is it (the reader is invited to think) which could get along

Attack on home

Today the home is under attack. Not directly; no one would get a modent's hearing if he advertised muself as opposed to good homes. But indirectly, in countless ways, marriages cau be, and often are, poisoned in advance. It is well known that one marriage in four, the country over, ends in divorce; and that though divorced persons often re-marry (for the stark and simple reason that they already have cheated wife or husband) they are not likely to make much more of the second try than the

the of the deadliest ways to poison a marriage beforehand is to come to it no longer a virgin; and this holds true for man and woman alike. From the very beginning, the Christian church and the Jewish synagogue have held up one standard for marriage:

Continence before, and chastity (faithfulness each to each) during marriage. Whatever breaks down that standard does something to break down marriage itself. A "home" where husband and wife are both survivors of many affairs with other people, a marriage that knows nothing of faithfulness, a marriage ready to break in two the minute a homesomer man or a more alluring woman comes on the scene,-such a "home" is likely to have little or no regard for any children and ma resent them.

## Mind and body

The laws of any place fall behind the best ideals of the best people. Any good lawyer will admit as much. But even the law, clumsy and "external" as it must be, knows that adultery is wrong. But by the time adultery gets into the courts, or becomes a tragic basis for divorce, it has been going on for a long time. Jesus put it quite bluntly. Any man who looks on a woman with lust in his heart, has already committed adultery with her. There are only three requirements for any act, good or bad: desire, capacity, opportunity. And an act of adultery exists for a longer or shorter time in a mind first. A clean life is not one that lacks legally punishable acts. A clean life is one in which the law is not needed; it is a life that supplies its own dis-

Our special problems

In America at this time and for a generation or more before now, the Christian ideal of continence before marriage, chastity during it, itself has been eroded by constant attack. Consider the books and magazines for sale at your nearby drugstores; consider the themes of popular moving pictures and novels; consider the moral standards of Hollywood and of their influence on our national life. Consider the way women and girls dress. To maintain a clean life in the midst of surrounding such as are common in America is extremely difficult, more so than for most previous centuries.

Yet there is one thing it will help us to keep in mind. That is, that at the time the Christian church began, standards of relations between men and women, in the Roman Empire, where the infant church was born, were just as low as they are in America today, if not lower. Yet the ideals of Christ outlived the empire. The future of America is not with those large areas of corruption; it is with the small groups that intend to remain clean.
