PRESIDENT WINS ROUND AGAINST INDUSTRY

U. S. Steel Corporation raised its prices. The President, at a press conference, made a tirade against the Company's officials. Among other things, he accused them of contempt for the welfare of the people. The response was instantaneous. The Justice Department, headed by one of the President's brothers, Robert, swung into action. So did the Federal Trade Commission. So did the Secretary of Defense, with remarks about Defense purchases. "Investigations" were threatened. Then came the night riders. At 3:00 A.M., 5:00 A.M., 6:30 A.M. — all through the night and early morning hours, Government agents, without warrants — only orders from Attorney General Kennedy — knocked on doors and roused people out of bed to find out what testimony they could give about the conduct of U. S. Steel Corporation officials. Next day, one of these officials felt forced to stand up to a battery of microphones and news cameras to defend himself. All through the day, U. S. Steel Corporation officials were subjected to attack. Threats of punishment for steel companies in general were mingled with promises of reward for those who without question would do the President's bidding. This is a technique common in iron-handed dictatorships elsewhere in the world — I never expected to see it used here.

The technique is irresistible, of course. The steel company had to surrender, had to call off its price increase. There was jubilation at the White House. The President had won a victory. He had proved that political power, ruthlessly used, could smash any private citizen or company who got in its way — and those who hate private enterprise and industry and love Big Government were made happy.

But before we join the unrestrained dancing in the streets, let us have a sobering thought about what this may mean for freedom and for the legal rights of citizens. Let us pause to reflect that nothing like this has happened before — the launching of a government attack against a particular industry because it refused to follow a course of action dictated not by law but by the whims of economic theorists.

The steel company tried to justify its attempt to raise its prices by calling attention to increasing production costs, including four wage increases since its last price increase four years ago. But in this piece I'm not trying to justify the price increase. That's beside the point. It is conceivable that one could approve a denunciation of a price increase and at the same time refuse to countenance the use of punitive force of the Government with its powerful far-flung Justice Department to coerce anybody who was making an economic decision — when there was no evidence that there had been violation of law. Here, I believe, is a threat to the foundations of our institutions.

Let me add right here that, from an economic standpoint, the consumer's interest and that of the nation lie with the healthy functioning of a free economy. The question remains with us: Is the price of steel hereafter to be determined by bargaining in the market place between makers and buyers, in the traditional free-enterprise way, or is it to be decided and enforced by the Government? — U. S. Senator J. Glenn Beall.

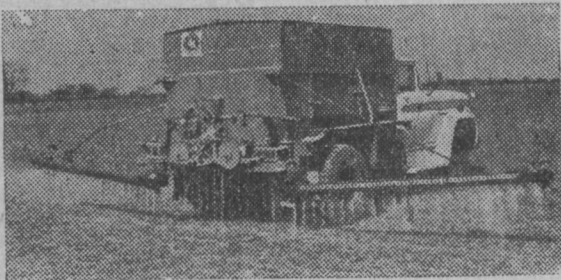

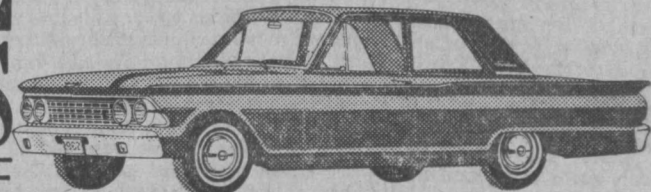

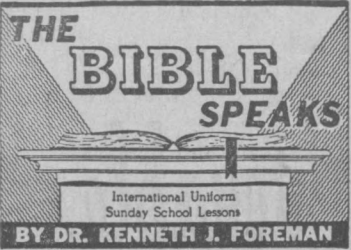

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Bible Material: Genesis 12:1-9; Exodus 3:1-6; Hebrews 10:19 through 12:29

Facets of Faith
Lesson for April 29, 1962

THE beauty of a jewel comes from the fact that it has many facets. The light is reflected from each of these facets, or surfaces, at a different angle. If a diamond were cut flat and square like a tiny window-pane it would not be nearly as beautiful as it is. Now faith is a jewel; and it likewise has many facets, or aspects, and all the more beautiful for this reason. Like all jewels, also, faith has many imitations.

Accept no substitute

What are some of the imitation faiths being offered the public today? One variety of "paste" or imitation faith, is faith without an object,—not faith in anything or any one, just "plain faith." This may even be a circular faith, faith in faith. This is not worth a dime, it is the most perishable of all the imitations. Another substitute is credulity,—the habit of believing anything and everything, believing whatever any one asks you to believe. Of such faith suckers are made! Another much-advertised substitute is faith that goes against facts, faith that believes the obviously and undeniably impossible. This is a very deceptive imitation, because true faith does go beyond what average cautious people call "possible." This imitation variety prides itself on absurdity; the more absurd the faith, the more credit the believer claims! If I believe that with God's help I can set aside more money than I ever have done, for His cause and service, that is real faith. But if I believe that after I have spent every cent of my weekly income I will have a ten-dollar bill left to offer God or to use myself, that is not true faith at all.

How faith keeps warm

True Christian faith, as has been said before, is faith about Christ, faith in Christ and faith with Christ. Now there are certain features or facets of this, to which the Bible passages marked for this week direct our eyes. One is that it is easier to have faith when others all around us are men and women of faith, than when one is all alone. A certain missionary was in solitary confinement in China, with no communication permitted between him and any other persons except the police. Friends and relatives of his in America were praying for his release. He also was praying for it. There was true faith in his heart and in the hearts of his friends; but it was harder for him than for them, because they lived (comparatively) in a climate of faith, whereas he was in the midst of people who only derided his religion.

Looking to Jesus

The writer of the letter to the Hebrews says some strange and unexpected things. Once in the twelfth chapter he says "... looking to Jesus ..." Now we should expect him to say, "looking to Jesus, the object of our faith;" but he does not. Instead, he says "looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith." In other words Jesus is the one who begins our faith and the one who completes it. He is, in short, the model for all men and women of faith. This means that Christians should study the gospels over and over again, to learn the qualities, the seeds and the secrets of the faith which the Master held. With him, faith had a new beginning; with him, faith found its perfection.

Faiths discipline

Great poetry and trashy doggerel are both made of words; but the great poems are not mere jumbles of words and noises. They are patterned; that is, the poet cannot put down anything that occurs to him. Some words fit, others don't. Some words ring like bells, others clatter like squeaky wheel-barrows. So it is with all art. The artist must exercise control. It is only very cheap "art" that can be produced by throwing words, or paint, on paper or canvas at random. How much more this is true of the most difficult art, of life itself! The writer to the Hebrews reminds us that without discipline we never attain to a God-like life. God's commands may sometimes not agree with our own wishes; but to obey him is the way of discipline, the way marked out by faith, that leads to the life that is life indeed.
