



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

In a very short time, they have released five long-play records and all five are in the top 40 on Billboard magazine's current LP chart. "Going Places," No. 1; "Whipped Cream and Other Delights," No. 3; "South of the Border," No. 11; "The Lonely Bull," No. 13, and "Tijuana Brass," No. 40.

Brass, No. 40. The reason they're so "hip" or "boss" is the fact that they have a different sound; a combination of jazz and Dixie. This idea was orginated by Herb Alpert in 1962, who said, "I didn't expect to become popular. I had been very conscious of trying to find something different. I had my feverite jazz musicians and I haven my favorite jazz musicians and I knew I'd never be able to play trumpet better than they did. So I decided jazz wasn't my calling. I wanted to make sure I wouldn't be copying anyone

else.

"After I got the idea, it fell in place quickly. I had a tune that was sitting around six months. I'd been try-

ting around six months. I'd been trying to find a way to do it and it fit exactly this idea. It was the 'Lonely Bull,' written by Sol Lake. He'd been writing for 20 years and this was the first song he made money on."

Alpert, who has played trumpet since he was eight, had produced a hit record, "Alley Oop," by Dante and the Evergreens, before forming a record company with Jerry Moss, who had been a record manufacturer's representative.

A and M Records put out "The Lonely Bull" as the Tijuana Brass' first effort, and it sold a million copies. Since then, "A Taste of Honey" also has sold a million and the five LP's have sold seven million copies.

Alpert's search for songs to record is definitely angled toward the LP, with singles a by-product. 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

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

Coroner's Verdict Lesson for May 29, 1966

Background Scripture: Il Kings 17; 18:9 - 12; Hosea 13; Amos 8.
Devotional Reading: Il Kings 17:32-39.

When a person in our country dies, it becomes the immediate duty of some doctor or officer of the law to make out a statement showing the cause of death. If the death was by violence, usually a "coroner's jury" is formed to



adjudge first of all, if possible, who struck the fatal blows. In our passage we have a strong statement by prophets (and hence representing the justice

Dr. Foreman of God) on the causes of the death not of a person but of a nation. The reader may remember that remark: "Mortality among nations is

The victim in this case was the city and nation of Samaria or Israel. A few years (say six or ten) before it crashed, it was one of the strongest nations along the curve of what is known as the Fertile Crescent or the Middle East. But when it perished as a nation, though the city of Samaria was rebuilt at various times, the nation of Samaria or Israel never rose again. What killed Samaria?

IDOLATRY KILLED SAMARIA

Samaria died because of the nation's idolatry. This is quick to say, but it needs explaining. Idolatry as the Old Testament sees it is not mere wrong opinions, bad theology. Remember that these Samaritans were Jews at that time, and had known or could be supposed to have known the true, invisible yet almighty God, the God whom had delivered them from Egypt and had (through the prophet Ahijah) actually started the infant nation of Israel on its way with the blessing of God. Now the Samaritans wanted a god they could see. They wanted to be like neighboring nations whose temples were magnificent and beautiful. So the nation of Samaria or Israel tried to worship (at least) two gods, the true god and the gold-plated imitations, gilded bull calves shiny but ridiculous. Trying to be like other people — "keeping up with the Joneses" — has often literally killed those who have tried it. Living by the world's low standards, for a man or for a nation, is fatal.

PRIDE KILLED NATION

All the causes of a nation's death are tied together. There is usually more than one cause of death. So idolatry was combined with other sins, not least of which was pride. They were deaf to the prophets, they saw no evil in themselves, though they could see the sins of other nations easily enough. They were like an American audience listening to (say) Billy Graham. Dr. Graham makes no impression on some in that audience. He can draw a very dark picture of life in America and the state of danger we are in (from God's hands and man's). but many listeners will say just what they must have said about Amos and Hosea and other preachers, "it's all exaggeration. That preacher just gets people stirred up for nothing." If asked to name the best nation in the world, wouldn't you maybe pick America? Well, Samaritans picked Samaria, but God didn't. A conceited nation is never as good as it thinks it is.

"GOD REMOVED THEM"

God's judgements on nations are not left to some time-beyondtime, some far-off Judgement Day. God uses such things as foreign armies, disease, arrogance, and much more, to weaken and destroy the nations he judges. It would be the "coroner's verdict" of God that Samaria died by her own hand, perhaps "while of un-sound mind." So the prophet adds simply, God removed it. From that verdict and that sentence what attorney can appeal?
