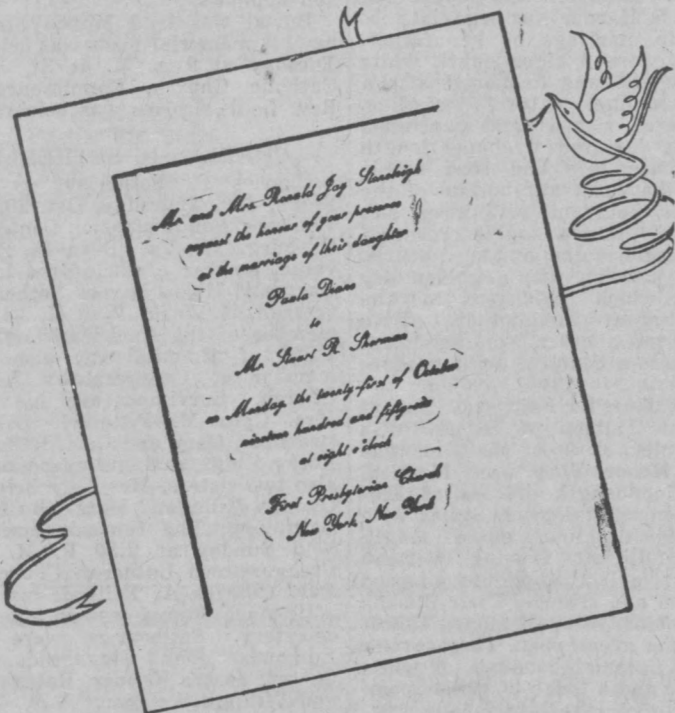

MY VIEW ON:

EDUCATION

In order to provide a first-rate public school system, Carroll County must offer the facilities and benefits necessary to attract dedicated teachers. As Commissioner, I would carefully study the budget requests and development plans presented by the Board of Education to insure continued improvement in the most efficient way possible.

WATER AND SANITATION

With continued population growth the lack of adequate sewage-disposal and water facilities can become a health hazard and an inconvenience. The cost of constructing facilities can probably be paid, in part, with Federal Aid; the remainder should be met by those served on a long-term basis, so as to prevent financial hardship. Intelligent planning will minimize future problems.

ROADS

The system of paved roads in Carroll County must be expanded and improved as much as possible with the revenue available. The Commissioners should closely supervise the operations of the Roads Department to see that waste is avoided. The County should continue to use Federal Aid wherever feasible. Long experience has proven the wisdom of competitive bidding on all major county expenditures.

INDUSTRY

Industry should be encouraged to come to Carroll County on a selective basis. Incentives which would be grossly unfair to local business must be avoided. Rapid influx of industry without careful planning would only multiply other problems and mar the County's beauty.

TAXES

It is impossible to foresee the financial situation of Carroll County for the four years, but, if elected, I shall see that every dollar received is spent wisely and in the best interest of Carroll County.

A MEMO TO THOSE WHO THINK

Am I wrong? At a recent candidates night, one candidate for County Commissioner stated that he did not believe it to be a conflict of interest to give contracts to a firm in which he has a financial interest.

I think that any man who acts as a sales agent, who uses the influence of his position or who pressures in any way so that the county does business with a firm in which he has a financial interest, this man is wrong.

Did you know that one county official is an official of a tire firm doing a substantial amount of business with the county. Did you know the County Road Department will seed private roads after dedication rather than making this a requirement for dedication? Did you know that one man now seeking office during his previous tenure in office gave large amounts of county business to his own firm? Do you know that one man now seeking office sells truck bodies? That another sells seeds?

I ask every voter to read the League of Women Voters Guide. I ask every church leader to discuss the issue of a man serving two masters. If we elect men who have had a past record of serving themselves first, then we will deserve the kind of government we will receive.

Hobgoblin Treats by Betty Crocker

After the witches hobnob with the goblins — and all bags are bulging — welcome the little folks home with a few tricks and treats of your own. Real neat, Mom, are Halloween Donuts, dotted with orange peel and frosted in chocolate. With hot apple cider and cinnamon sticks for stirrers. And for this impromptu family party, a surprise for the table: The two-faced Jack-O'-Lantern, with one happy face, one scary, carved on front and back of the pumpkin. Of course, bob for apples. Extra donuts for prizes. Or the pumpkin-faced popcorn balls described below. And it's a whee of a Halloween spree!

HALLOWEEN DONUTS

- 2 cups Bisquick
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
2 to 3 teaspoons grated orange peel
Chocolate Icing (below)

Heat deep fat to 375°. Mix all ingredients except Chocolate Icing; beat vigorously 25 to 30 strokes. Turn dough onto floured surface and knead about 10 times. Roll out 3/8 inch thick. Cut with floured donut cutter and place in hot fat. Fry until golden brown, 1 to 2 minutes per side. Remove from fat and drain on paper towels. Glaze with Chocolate Icing. Makes about 12 donuts. Some "do's" on donut making. Dip cutter in flour each time you cut a donut. Transport

cut dough to hot fat via a spatula. And to control temperature, use a deep fat thermometer. Now, for the icing. Chocolate Icing: Melt 1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate and 1 teaspoon butter over hot water. Remove from heat and blend in 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 2 tablespoons boiling water. Beat only until smooth, but not stiff.

As "door prizes" for neighborhood children, popcorn balls are fun — pumpkin style. Make the usual way — except add red and yellow food colorings to syrup to tint orange. Form into pumpkin shapes and add small gumdrops for eyes and nose; corn candy for teeth; green gumdrop for stem. If you run out, turn oranges into pumpkin faces, using cloves for eyes, nose and teeth. And Halloween's a bag of tricks at your house!

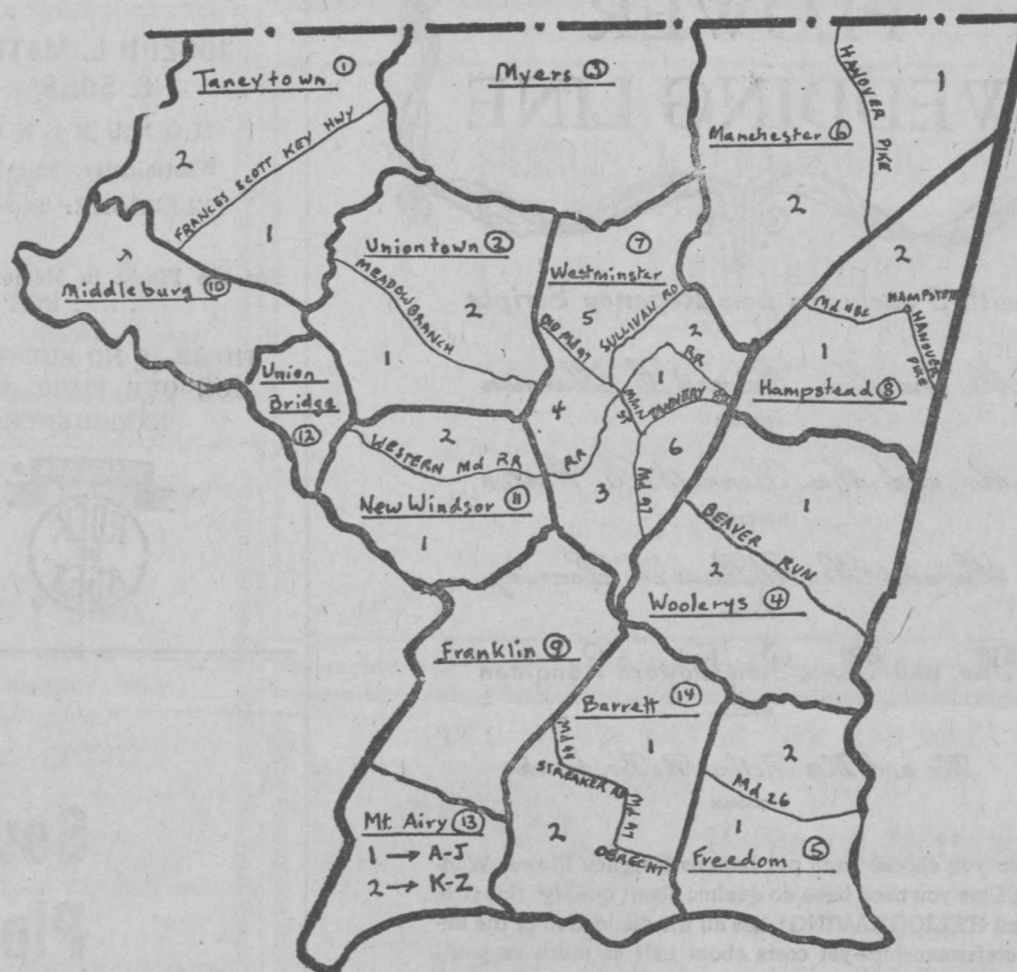
