### Dr. James Teeter to Give Talk on Kenya

The public is cordially invited to the First Church of God at Frizellburg, Md., Sunday, November 6, at 7:30 P. M. to hear Dr. and Mrs. James Teeter describe their recent trip to Kenya East Africa. The Doctor James Teeter is a physician from Waynesboro, Penna. He also cooperates with the Christian Medical Society, which is an international and interdenominational organization of physicians and dentists. This organization sponsors a program called "Short Term Mission Assignments." In this program, a Christian physician or dentist is sent to the needy areas of the world to give assistance to the full-time missionaries stationed there. This program serves two vital purposes. First it permits the full-time missionaries to take a brief vacation and then the visiting doctor can teach his specialty to the medical missionaries.

Dr. and Mrs. James Teeter have been participating in this Christian work each Summer since 1963. They served as short term missionaries in Ivory Coast Africa in the summers of 1963 and 1964. Then in 1965 they went to West Pakistan. This past Summer they spent several months in Kenya East Africa. While there, they worked with missionaries from the African Inland Mission. They served in two different hospitals in Kenya. This Sunday, Dr. Teeter will show slides and make appropriate remarks about life in Kenya as well as the needs of that East African Country.

With all my heart, I wish you every morning. A smile that shall last until the next day's dawning. I wish you health—life's greatest wealth; I wish you always near so that I may help to cheer. Each future day and in some way—help to bring you happiness!

Glancing around toward the patio before closing the front door today of my apartment there were the bent heads of the orchid mums in my garden, as though they were telling me (not liking to do so), "goodbye!" I did not feel sad as I started for "The Maryland General Hospital" until I observed those precious flowers bent over! I quietly closed the door, picking up the suitcase knowing I had not forgotten one item as I packed the contents the night before for my stay at the hospital.

I walked slowly over the small curved bridge to await the McMahon bus to take me at 9:40 A. M. to Baltimore, which has a daily schedule from Ruxton. While standing there, the dear little post mistress, Mrs. Elsie Potts, who has been there for many years ran out to me (as we have become real friends) holding out an addressed postal card saying, (which was addressed to her) "Please let me know just how you are making out for I'll be anxious to hear!" I called back taking the card, "Oh! how sweet you are!"

That bus is the most convenient one for it takes the passengers all around a certain section in downtown and then going Northward on Loourd St. to the Greyhound bus station which is their starting point. I asked to be left off at the bank to pay the telephone bill! I then was going to take the 104 Shuttle bus right there which would take me to the hospital but the suitcase was getting heavy and I stepped into a taxi which I realized would take me to the door of the hospital.

I was admitted, as they were expecting me, and I had a lovely large room with a powder room and up to this very moment I feel as though I am in a hotel away on a vacation! This is the first time in my life and I am really resting and somehow lying in bed is wonderful, just relaxing at this time. I did not say a word to the neighbors when leaving but left a bag of vegetables in between the storm and inside doors of my neighbor's connecting my front door and step. The day was a beautiful one as I stepped out of the sunshine into the hospital for me porter to take the suitcase. Then came the preliminaries and much else—I think you know what I mean in the admitting office. After I was taken to my room, No. 218, then the rush started! One after the other with the wonderful advance service and then the "House Doctor" came in to write down my history and all he would say was, "wonderful! wonderful!" but that was after I told him about my beloved dad, who was a Spanish Nobleman and the "House Dr." too came from Spain! To know of my ancestors saying the Life of King Alphonso. The cute part is, there is a Plastic strip around my left wrist (as they place on new born babies) with my name and address and now I am wondering, like that song, "Who's Baby I Am Now?"

And just below my window there are beautiful voices—a quartet singing, "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life"—you know, Victor Herbert's!

And the nurses are precious—both night and day and we have become real friends! Two are the wonderful friends sign, that of "Acquarius," (which I will be writing about soon, due to requests). I suggested the sides of my bed to be removed and that was granted immediately after I signed my name that I would be responsible if I fell out of bed! When the man was brought in to do this he was introduced to me as L.B.J. "Same initials but a different name?" sez I, "That's it and I have never gotten anything else since the President has been in office!"

Such service in this hospital—upon my arrival in my room—one right after the other performing their special duties. "Buckingham Palace" could not be superior than this... "Maryland General Methodist Hospital!" when it comes to service!

The other guests in the rooms have called upon me. Talk about Southern Hospitality! I have always stated, "It starts right here in Baltimore!" Am writing this Column in parts. Congressman H. R. Gross of Iowa recently observed: "Congress has authorized another huge, multibillion-dollar foreign aid program, included in which is provision for hundreds of millions of dollars to be 'loaned' to foreigners. And, believe it or not, although American taxpayers who put up this money are faced with bone-chilling high interest rates when they have to borrow, foreigners will get their money at an interest rate of 2.5 per cent! And for the first 10 years of a 40-year loan, foreigners will pay only 1 per cent interest for the use of your money!"

The leader of more than five million Negro Baptists, Dr. J. H. Jackson, president of the National Baptist Convention, defended his concern for equality, but said, "any group of people who turn their backs on law and order are not working in the interest of freedom."

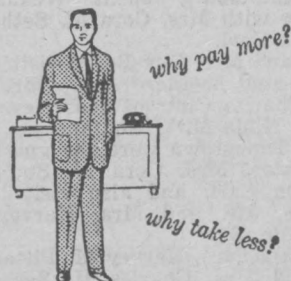

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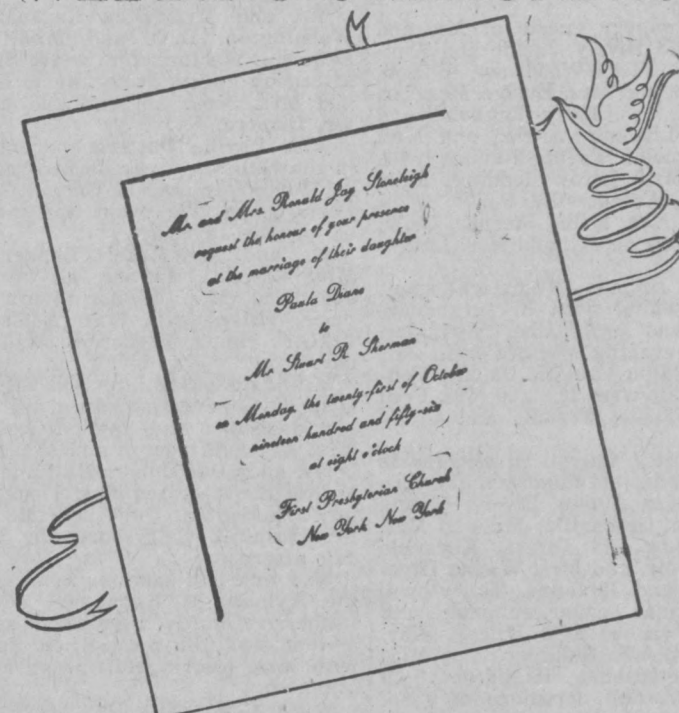

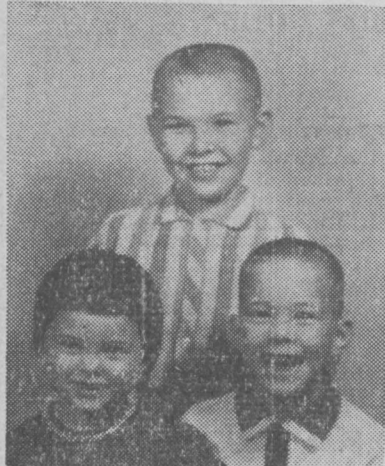

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### WFMD-FM ON THE AIR SEVENTEEN HOURS DAILY

Frederick, Md. — The Monocacy Broadcasting Company has announced that it is putting its FM radio station on the air each day for seventeen hours of varied programming, instead of the ten hours which has been the broadcast time up to the present. Known officially as WFMD-FM, this station is the sister station of WFMD-AM, which has been broadcasting from Frederick since Jan. 1, 1936.

"Happy Johnny" Zufall, long a well-known figure in the radio and broadcasting field in Maryland and Pennsylvania, has been the morning radio personality on both WFMD-AM and FM for many years and will continue in this role. The added broadcasting time by station WFMD-FM has been secured by re-assigning Bob Helder to the FM station, where he will continue to air the pleasant and popular tunes that have been his forte on the AM station for the past decade.

"Big Bob," as he is known, will add to the beautiful musical sounds with interesting features from the Associated Press during the day creating a listenable mixture of entertainment, fact, and public service. Music in the evening, over WFMD-FM, will sustain the pleasant atmosphere induced by good music and will, also, include hourly newscasts from the various CBS Newsrooms.

The decision to put WFMD-FM on a full broadcasting schedule was made because of a lack of such an advertising, entertaining and educating medium in mid-Maryland. With well-known broadcasting personalities on parade via the new full time FM radio station in Frederick, radio listening will be of such varied content that there will be something to appeal to listeners of all inclinations. WFMD-FM takes its place with WFMD-AM and creates another first in Frederick County.

### BARLEY NOT INCLUDED IN '67 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

Since barley will not be included in the 1967 Feed Grain acreage diversion program, growers of malting as well as of other types of barley will be able to produce as much or as little of the crop as they wish and still qualify for barley price support. Gary R. Brauning, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

The announcement that there would be no barley diversion provisions or payments under the 1967 feed grain program was made early in August so that growers could make their production plans; barley, like wheat, is a fall-seeded crop in many parts of the country.

Farmers who participate in both wheat and feed grain programs next year may again plant wheat on regular barley base acreage and on feed grain base acreage of their wish. The farm's "feed grain base" for 1967, includes only corn and grain sorghums.

## THE WAY I SEE IT

Observations on the World of Sports —John Breth

Now they tell us, THE ORIOLES not only had those big bats and strong arms going into the World Series, they also had a complete "book" on the featherweight hitters from Los Angeles.

A "cloak and dagger" operation was responsible for a good deal of the success the down-rated Baltimore pitching staff had against the Dodger hitters.

The chief spy for Baltimore was Harry Craft, former manager at Kansas City and Houston, who has the title of "Field Coordinator" for the Orioles.

At the time of the All-Star break, with the Orioles eight games in front in the American League, field manager Hank Bauer and general manager Harry Dalton decided it was time to start thinking about a World Series.

Their guess was that Los Angeles would win the National League pennant, which was pretty good guessing at the time.

The Dodgers were floundering along in third place, five games back of the front-running San Francisco Giants, with Pittsburgh in the second slot.

The Orioles assigned Craft and two other front office assistants, Al Kupski and Jim Russo, to scout the National League contenders with special emphasis on the Dodgers.

When those three men finished their work toward the end of the season they turned out a compact three-page report which manager Bauer was able to distribute to his team before the Series opened in Los Angeles.

Craft watched the Dodgers in 17 games and stayed with them for the last eight days as they struggled to the pennant. He concluded they were "slap" hitters who beat the ball into the dirt and tried for leg hits.

Craft concluded the Dodgers could be handled if the Oriole pitchers threw hard and kept the ball down.

They did.

The results speak for themselves, three shutouts.

The only two Dodger runs came in the first game, one on a walk with the bases filled and the other on a home run by Jim Lefebvre.

That may have been the only time the Baltimore pitcher gave a Dodger hitter a fat one to swing at.

Quarterback JACK KEMP has led the Buffalo Bills to two straight titles in the American Football League's Eastern Division and to a pair of successive league championships. But he has fallen out of favor with the football fans in Buffalo, New York.

The cheers have turned to boos and the fans are screaming for him to be benched. Short memories seem to be part of the football fans' make-up.

Another timely example of that has been the cat-calls heard this season at the home games of the New York Giants in the National Football League. Chief target is head coach Allie Sherman, who guided the Giants to three division titles, the last of which was three years ago.

Kemp's success is more recent than that, of course—he was voted the Most Valuable Player in the AFL last year. From the fans' point of view, however, that's old news. They are buying tickets to see winning football now, not to reminisce about last year's exploits.

This also has to be the credo of the coaches, and Buffalo's head coach, Joe Collier, right now is wrestling with the problem of what to do about Kemp for next Sunday's key game with the New York Jets. That game could have a great deal to do with deciding the outcome of the Eastern Division race.

Collier must decide whether to go with Kemp as his starting quarterback or call on the Bills' number two man, Daryle Lamonica.

Kemp has greater experience under fire in such crucial situations. In the past, when the chips were down, most times he came up with the key play. Buffalo's success in the past two years is evidence of that. This year, however, he has been nowhere near his old form.

Lamonica has not seen much service this year, but he did a big job for Buffalo last week, bringing the Bills back from a 17-point deficit to get a 17 to 17 tie with the San Diego Chargers.

Collier is getting a great deal of advice from the fans, most of whom want Lamonica to start. Many have been hammering away at that theme for a couple of years in Buffalo, despite Kemp's success. But now with Buffalo's grip on the title in jeopardy, the cry of the fans has become a roar.

It is not likely that pressure from the fans will influence Collier's decision. He will make it on his own, based on his own evaluations. A great deal of responsibility is on his shoulders, but the man he selects will have even more.

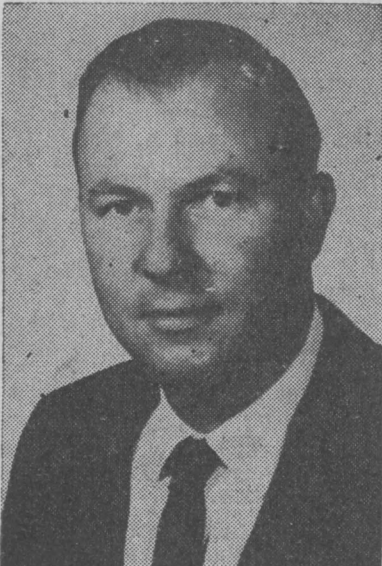

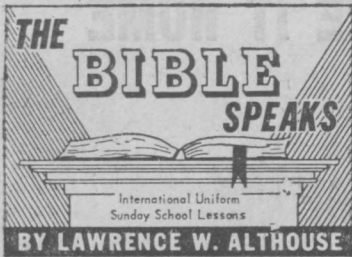

## Painless Invitation

Lesson For November 6, 1966

Background Scripture: Jeremiah 7, 26.

Devotional Readings: Psalms 24:1-6.

Are you one of those who delights in practicing the art of painless invitations? It's really quite easy, you know. All you have to do is say something like this: "You must come over for dinner..." and then add quickly, "...sometime." You see, one harmless-looking word gets you off the hook.



A German exchange student who was a seminary classmate used to say that Rev. Althouse, Americans are particularly adept at this art of painless invitations. "We'd like to have you for dinner," people would say to him, "...sometime." It always sounded like a most gracious invitation, but because it was left indefinite, nothing ever came of it. The words were superficial and insincere; good intentions that cost nothing.

### If Took Seriously

Some of us carry this art of painless invitations over into our religious life too. We utter all kinds of invitations and promises, none of which are expected to be taken seriously.

This Sunday, for example, you are likely to pray: "...and forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." We certainly don't mean that, do we? Certainly you want considerably more grace and forgiveness from God than you extend to others, don't you?

Perhaps you'll stand in your pew and sing, "Take my silver and my gold, not a mite would I withhold." Surely you don't mean it! The dollar bill of yours on the plate already seems to be so great a sacrifice. Perhaps we would be more honest if we were to sing: "Lord, in spite of all we say and do, this is really what we think of you!"

Just think of all the painless invitations we give God in an hour's time on a Sunday morning:

"Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"

"I believe in God, the Father Almighty..."

"...as it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be, world without end..."

"Draw me nearer, nearer blessed Lord, to the cross where thou hast died..."

If he took us seriously — what a frightening thought!

### Where Your Mouth Is

Elwood P. Dowd, the humorous eccentric in the play *Harvey*, constantly amazed people by taking seriously their insincere invitations. He took them at face value and transformed painless invitations into uncomfortable confrontations. When someone would say, "You must come over and see us sometime," Ellwood would pull out his little date book and ask "How about Tuesday evening?"

It is amusing to think of Ellwood P. Dowd taking painless invitations seriously, but there is nothing at all amusing in contemplating that God might take us seriously too. The words we speak so effortlessly in our churches or in the privacy of our own rooms, they are dangerous invitations.

The Prophet Jeremiah was much disturbed with the same situation in Judah. The people trusted in deceptive words of worship and ritual. God didn't want words from his people, he wanted realities. What he wanted was not pious words but righteous lives. "Amend your ways and your doings," he demanded. Back up your words with deeds.

There's an old saying about insincerity: "Put your money where your mouth is." God doesn't want painless invitations, insincere rituals and words of worship. He wants to see our commitment as well as hear it. He wants us put out lives where our words are.

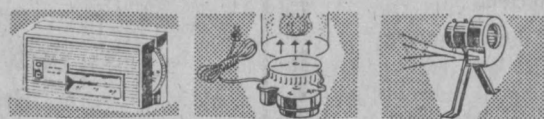

The General Assembly shall enact no law authorizing private property to be taken for public use without just compensation, to be agreed upon between the parties, or awarded by a jury, being first paid or tendered to the party entitled to such compensation, but where such property is situated in Baltimore County and is desired by this State or by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, the General Assembly may provide that such property may be taken immediately upon payment therefor to the owner or owners thereof by the State or by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, or into court, such amount as the State or the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, as the case may be, shall estimate to be the fair value of said property, provided such legislation also requires the payment of any further sum that may subsequently be added by a jury; and further provided that the authority and procedure for the immediate taking of property as it applies to the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore on June 1, 1961, shall remain in force and effect until including June 1, 1963, and where such property is situated in Baltimore County and is desired by Baltimore County, the County Council of Baltimore may provide for the appointment of an appraiser or appraisers by a Court of Record to determine the amount of such valuation, to the party entitled to compensation, or into court, and securing the payment of such sum that may be awarded by a jury, and where such property is situated in Montgomery County and in the judgment of and upon a finding by the County Council of said County that there is immediate need therefor for right of way for streets or highways, the County Council may provide that such property may be taken immediately upon payment therefor to the owner or owners thereof, or into court, such amount as a licensed real estate broker appointed by the County Council shall estimate to be the fair market value of such property, provided that the County Council shall secure the payment of any further sum that may subsequently be awarded by a jury. In the various municipal corporations within Cecil County, where in the judgment of and upon a finding by the governing body of said municipal corporation that there is immediate need therefor for right of way for municipal roads, streets and extensions of municipal water and sewerage facilities, the governing body may provide that such property may be taken immediately upon payment therefor to the owner or owners thereof, or into court, such amount as a licensed real estate broker appointed by the particular governing body shall estimate to be a fair market value of such property, provided that the municipal corporation shall secure the payment of any further sum that may subsequently be awarded by a jury. Section 40A shall not apply in Montgomery County or any of the various municipal corporations within Cecil County, if the property actually to be taken includes a building or buildings.

And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland, at the next general election to be held in this State in November 1966, shall be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article XIV of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment" as now prescribed by law, and, immediately after said election, all returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article XIV of the Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article XIV.

CHAPTER 372

AN ACT to propose an amendment to Section 21 of Article IV of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Judiciary Department," subtitle "Part III Circuit Courts," increasing the number of Judges of the Second Judicial Circuit who may reside in Cecil County, and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the State for their adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two houses concurring), That the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section 21 of Article IV of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Judiciary Department," subtitle "Part III Circuit Courts," the same, if adopted by the legally qualified voters of the State, as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland, and to read as follows:

21. From and after January 1, 1953, there shall be in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh circuits at least one judge for each county, who shall be a resident of the county in which he shall hold office, and who shall be elected by the voters thereof, to be styled judges of the Circuit Court, to be elected or appointed as herein provided. The number of judges for any of the circuits or for any of the counties may be increased or decreased by the General Assembly from time to time, and any vacancy created shall be filled as provided in Section 5 of this Article except that in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh judicial circuits there shall never be less than one judge for each county and in all of the circuits there shall never be less than four for each circuit. The senior judge in length of service shall be the chief judge of the circuit; the other judge or judges shall be associate judges. In the first and second judicial circuits no two of said judges of the Circuit Court shall at the time of their election or appointment, or during the term for which they may have been elected or appointed, reside in any one county, except in Cecil County wherein two said judges may reside at one time PROVIDED THAT EACH OF THE OTHER COUNTIES WITHIN THE SECOND JUDICIAL CIRCUIT SHALL HAVE AT LEAST ONE JUDGE RESIDENT THEREIN. In the first and second judicial circuits, in case any candidate or candidates for judge at any election shall receive sufficient votes to cause such candidate or candidates to be declared elected, but the election of such candidate or candidates would cause more judges than herein permitted to reside in any county of the circuit, then and in that event there shall be declared elected only that candidate or those candidates residing in said county, in the order of the votes received, whose election would provide the permitted number of judges from said county, and also that the candidate or candidates residing in some other county, and not similarly disqualified, who shall have the next highest number of votes in said election. If, by reason of such a condition or by reason of an equal vote for two or more candidates a sufficient number of judges duly qualified as to residence shall not be elected at any election, then it shall be the duty of the Governor to order a new election for such unfilled office or offices. From and after December 1, 1954, there shall be not less than two judges resident in Anne Arundel County, and not less than three judges resident in Baltimore County. From and after December 1, 1960, there shall be not less than four judges resident in Prince George's County. From and after December 1, 1966, there shall be not less than five judges resident in Montgomery County.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article the vacancy in Montgomery County created by the adoption of this amendment shall not be filled by appointment as provided in Section 5 of this Article, but at the first biennial general election for Representatives in Congress, after the adoption of this amendment a judge shall be elected by the qualified voters of Montgomery County to fill such vacancy in such county. Any other vacancy in the office of Judge of the Circuit Court for Montgomery County and any vacancy in the second judicial circuit shall be filled as provided in Sections 3 and 5 of this Article, except that the person initially appointed to fill the vacancy in the second judicial circuit shall be a resident of Kent County.

The said judges shall hold such terms of the Circuit Court in each of the counties composing their respective circuits, at such times as are now prescribed or may hereafter be prescribed by rules or regulations by the Court of Appeals or otherwise by law. One judge in each of the first seven circuits shall constitute a quorum for the transaction

of any business; and the said judges, or any of them, may hold special terms of their Courts, when in their discretion, the business of the several counties renders such terms necessary.

All provisions of the Constitution of Maryland and all Acts of the General Assembly relating to the Court of Appeals or any other courts, and all rules heretofore adopted by the Court of Appeals, not inconsistent with the provisions of the sections amended or added by this amendment, shall remain in full force and effect unless and until amended or repealed by proper authority. All salaries now fixed by law for the associate judges of the Circuit Courts shall continue to apply to all judges (including chief judges) of the Circuit Court. No member of the General Assembly at which either of these amendments was proposed, or at which the number of salaried judges for any of the eight circuits or for any of the counties may be or may have been increased or decreased by the General Assembly from time to time, if otherwise qualified, shall be ineligible for appointment or election as judge of the Court of Appeals or any other court by reason of his membership in such General Assembly.

In the event and to the extent of any inconsistency between the provisions of any section amended or added by these amendments and any of the other provisions of this Constitution or the provisions of any existing law, the provisions of the sections amended or added shall prevail, and such other provisions shall be repealed or abrogated to the extent of such inconsistency, except Section 35A of Article III of this Constitution; provided, however, that in the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of the sections thus amended or added and any of the other provisions of the sections thus amended or added and any of the other provisions of this Constitution, the provisions of this Constitution shall prevail.

AN ACT to propose an amendment to Section 52(8) of Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," to change the time of consideration of supplemental appropriation bills by the General Assembly of Maryland, and providing for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for their adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two houses concurring), that the following Section 52(8) be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," the same, if adopted by the legal and qualified voters of the State, as herewith provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland and to read as follows:

52. (Supplementary Appropriation Bill. [Neither House shall consider other appropriations until] Either House may consider other appropriations but both houses shall not finally act upon such appropriations until after the Budget Bill has been finally acted upon by both Houses, and no such other appropriation shall be valid except in accordance with the provisions following: (a) Every such appropriation shall be embodied in a separate bill limited to some single work, object or purpose therein stated and called herein a Supplementary Appropriation Bill; (b) Each Supplementary Appropriation Bill shall provide the revenue necessary to pay the appropriation thereby made by a tax, direct or indirect, to be levied and collected as shall be directed in said bill; (c) No Supplementary Appropriation Bill shall become a law unless it be passed in each House by a vote of a majority of the whole number of the members elected, and the year and number recorded on its final passage; (d) Each Supplementary Appropriation Bill shall be presented to the Governor of the State as provided in Section 17 of Article 2 of the Constitution and thereafter all the provisions of said section shall apply.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland, at the next general election to be held in this State in November 1966, shall be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment" as now provided by law, and, immediately after said election, all returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two houses concurring), That the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section 1 of Article VI of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Treasury Department," the same, if adopted by the legally qualified voters of the State, as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland and to read as follows:

1. There shall be a Treasury Department, consisting of a Comptroller chosen by the qualified electors of the State, at each general election at which the Governor is chosen, who shall receive such salary as may be fixed by law; and a Treasurer to be appointed by the two Houses of the Legislature, at each regular session thereof, in which begins the term of the Governor, on joint ballot, who shall receive an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars; such salary as may be fixed by law; and the terms of office of the said Comptroller and Treasurer shall be for four years, and until their successors shall qualify; and neither of the said officers shall be allowed, or receive any fees, commissions or perquisites of any kind in addition to his salary for the performance of any duty or services whatsoever. In case of a vacancy in either of the offices by death or otherwise, the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall fill such vacancy by appointment to continue until another election or a choice by the Legislature, as the case may be, and until the qualification of the successor. The Comptroller and the Treasurer shall keep their offices at the seat of government, and shall take such oaths, and enter into such bonds for the faithful discharge of their duties as are now, or may hereafter be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland, at the next general election to be held in this State in November 1966, shall be submitted to the

legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment" as now provided by law, and, immediately after said election, all returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

CHAPTER 431

AN ACT to propose an amendment to Section 15 of Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," to provide that the General Assembly shall be empowered to set its own compensation, and providing for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for their adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses concurring), That the following section be and it is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section 15 of Article III of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Legislative Department," the same, if adopted by the legally qualified voters of the State, as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland and to read as follows:

15. The General Assembly may continue its session so long as in its judgment the public interest may require, for a period not longer than seventy days in each year, and on and after January 1, 1965, 1967 each member thereof shall receive a compensation of Twenty-four Hundred Dollars (\$2,400.00), per annum, payable in twelve equal installments of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per diem for each day of unexcused absence from any session; and he shall also receive such mileage as may be allowed by law, not exceeding Twenty Cents per mile; and the presiding officers of each House shall receive an additional compensation of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per annum. SUCH COMPENSATION AS SHALL BE PROVIDED BY LAW BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY WHICH SHALL NOT BE DIMINISHED OR REDUCED DURING ANY TERM OF OFFICE. When the General Assembly shall be convened by Proclamation of the Governor, the session shall not continue longer than thirty days, but no additional compensation other than that mileage and other allowances provided by law shall be paid members of the General Assembly for special session.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland, at the next general election to be held in this State in November 1966, shall be submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment" as now provided by law, and, immediately after said election, all returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution, and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

CHAPTER 489

AN ACT to propose an amendment to Section 4 of Article VII of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Sundry Officers," providing for the abolition of the office of Commissioner of the Land Office, and providing for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Maryland for their adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, (Three-fifths of all the Members elected to each of the two Houses concurring), That the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section 4 of Article VII of the Constitution of Maryland, title "Sundry Officers," the same, if adopted by the legally qualified voters of the State, as herein provided, to become a part of the Constitution of Maryland and to read as follows:

4. There shall be a Commissioner of the Land Office, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, who shall hold his office during the term of the Governor, by whom he shall have been appointed, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. He shall perform such duties as are now required of the Commissioner of the Land Office, or such as may hereafter be prescribed by Law. He shall make a semi-annual report of all the fees of his office, both as Commissioner of the Land Office, and as Keeper of the Chancery Records, to the Comptroller of the Treasury, and shall pay the same semi-annually into the Treasury. The office of the Commissioner of the Land Office shall be abolished at the end of the term of the present incumbent.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State shall be, at the next general election, to be held in this State in the year 1966, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on the said proposed amendment shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as now prescribed by law, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said Article 14 of the Constitution and further proceedings had in accordance with said Article 14.

J. MILLARD TAWES, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MARYLAND, by virtue of the power and authority conferred upon me by the Constitution of Maryland, do by this, my proclamation, order that the bills proposing the foregoing amendments shall be published in at least two newspapers in each County where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, once a week for four weeks immediately preceding the General Election to be held on November 8, 1966, at which Election the proposed amendments to the Constitution shall be submitted, in the form prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State for adoption or rejection.

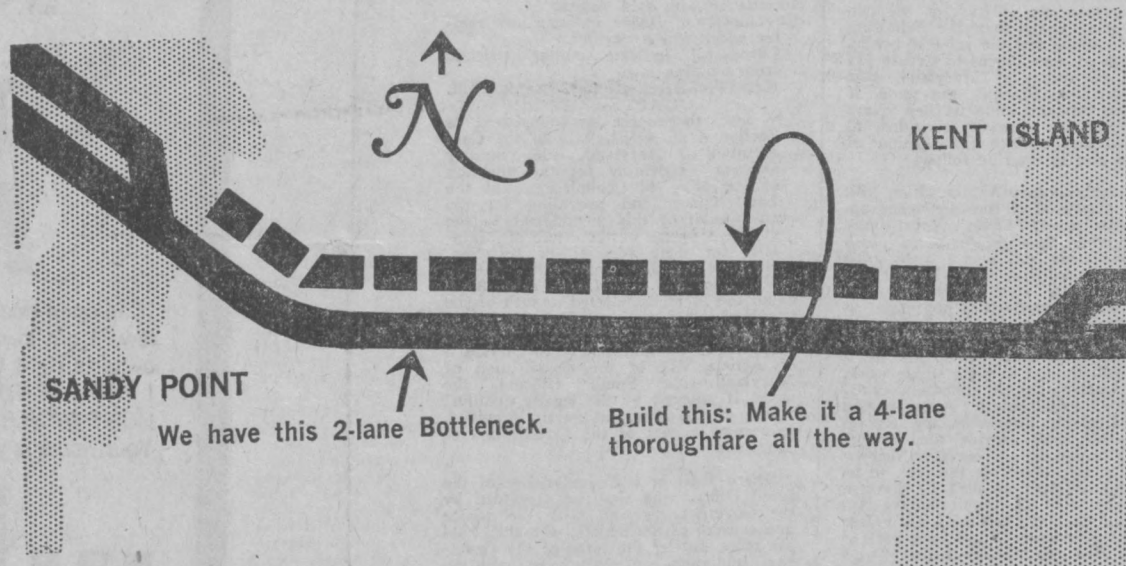
