
Farmers who wish to plant wheat on regular barley base acreage, how-ever, should ask the ASC county committee for a special barley base for this purpose when they sign up in the programs.

Present bridge is a 2-lane bottleneck without shoulders, connecting 4-lane roads from east and west. One jam or breakdown-and everything stops.

National 2-lane safety standards call for 6,000 vehicles per day. Present 2-lane bridge is averaging 19,000 per day in summer; more than 6,000 in winter months-and growing every year.
