An Attempt to Repair the Ruin of American Forests.

The very necessities of their situation have aroused the people of some of our Western states to action. In Kansas, Nebraska, and other states, liberal premiums have been offered for the encouragement of tree-planting, and already in many portions of the prairie region a perceptible change has taken place, and the eye no longer wanders overgreat space without sight of shrub or tree. Minnesota has her Forrestry Association, and its secretary reports that between seven and ten millions of trees were planted in that state during the year 1877, of which more than half a million were planthad left the saw-buck in the wood ed in a single day, "Arbor Day," as it is called, or tree planting day, the first Tuesday of May having been fixed upon as the day, and every owner of land invited to devote the day especially to the planting of trees. Similar efforts have been made in other states which are similarly situated in respect to a supply of forest. The great railway companies, whose roads stretch across the treeless prairies, have become in some instances large planters of trees, feeling the need of them both as screens from the fierce storms that sweep down from the Rocky Mountains, and as a source of supply for the ties which are constantly needing renewal.



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
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
