





POKER AND GLASS.

No Reference to the Game of Pairs, but to a Form of Art.

For a long time poker work, or pyrography, has been a fashionable art, but until recently it has been generally applied to wood only. Now, however, glass pyrography is being taken up, and thus quite a new field is being opened in this fascinating branch of decorative work. In the newer form of pyrography the burning process is exactly the same as in the old poker work on wood, which is now so well known, only the platinum point is made many degrees hotter for the glass-indeed it can scarcely be too hot to accomplish the desired result, and therefore it needs to be of special hardness. This being the case, art dealers now sell points made on purpose for glass pyrography.

The glass used is the ordinary plate, and through it the design can readily be traced with the hot point by those who have not the skill to draw offhand, which saves all trouble of transferring the pattern. Another advantage which glass has over wood is that it has no grain, and therefore the lines of the novice are not marked by that unevenness which characterizes the work of a tyro in the art of wood burning.

Glass pyrography may be adapted to the decoration of mirrors, screens, panels, etc., and if carefully done will be found an excellent imitation of engraved work of the finest kind, and the effect, if a good design be chosen, will be most delicate and beautiful. Just a white frosted design on the clear glass looks very well, but the worker will soon be ambitious of better things.

A pretty piece of the work shows a loose bunch of oxeyo daisies and field grasses burned into ordinary clear plate glass. The design when first executed had a frosted appearance, but this was removed by carefully scraping off all roughness with a sharp knife, thus leaving the daisies and grasses in clear outline. The work in that state was beautiful, but it was made more so in the following manner: A layer of gold paint was carried entirely over part of the design, all the etched lines being filled with it. To effect this a pad of soft cloth was used damped with turpentine to remove all the gold on the flat surface between the lines. An ordinary paper stump with rag over it was used to clean off the rest. HE SLEW CHIEF TECUMSEH.

While nearly every one has heard due to the bravery of a man who afterward became the vice president of the United States. Richard M. Johnson was a native of the Blue Grass State and the fact may account for his fondness for a fight. He was born in 1781, while Washington was their swaddling clothes into the dress of full fledged and independent sovereignties. The white man ruled only in the east, and out on the vast prairies of the west roamed the Indians, and the settlers on the outskirts of civilization never knew at what moment they might be at-

tacked and destroyed. Such continued to be the state of affairs for some years, and when

Johnson was in congress in 1812, and the English and Indians had combined to attack the new republic. Johnson went home to Kentucky and raised a battalion of three companies, and after they had been consolidated into a regiment was made the colonel and served for ten months. He returned for a short space to his congressional duties, but at the command of the secretary of war soon raised a regiment of a thousand volunteers and went to attack the enemy in the west, joining his force to that of General William Henry Harrison, who was then governor of Indiana and the leader of the American troops. It was then, on Oct. 5, 1813, occurred the famous battle of the Thames.

The English forces were posted between the river and the marsh. while the Indians were on a high ground in the swampy land. Colonel Johnson ordered his men forward, and the English let them get almost within a few yards before the command to fire was given. Then the bullets laid the front rank low. A desperate battle took place, but the conflict lasted only about 18 minutes, the Americans being victorious. Tecumseh was found on the field dcad, and it was asserted that Johnson was the one who shot him, as he was killed by a man on horseback, and Johnson was the only one mounted, his command being' infantry. It was also known that Johnson had been engaged in a hand to hand fight with one of the most desperate of the chiefs, and it was thought that Tecumseh would be the very one to single out the leader to meet his tomahawk, a foe worthy of his steel. Johnson himself was badly wounded.

Although the death of Tecumseh at the hands of Johnson has been a much disputed point, he has always been given the credit, and in elections it was something which largely added to his popularity-nothing strange in an age when the statesmen were required to fight on the frontier of a new world

THE OLD MINER'S STORY. Arizona Crickets Seem to Travel Eight

Miles an Hour. The truth of the following tale cannot be vouched for. It ought to be true-probably is, as it was told the other day to a small party in an up town club by an old mining engineer from Arizona who has here-

tofore always borne a reputation for veracity. "You know," he said, "that one of the most troublesome qualities about giant powder which we use in our work is the fact that the concussion caused by one explosion explodes any other powder which happens to be near at hand. Fatal accidents are often the result. And yet this same quality allowed me to ascertain what I often desired to know-just how fast crickets migrated. They travel eight miles an hour, gentlemen. I found it this way. Last summer an old miner and myself were making our way across one of the plains near Prescott to a claim some miles distant. Night came on before we reached our destination, and we were compelled to build a fire on the trail and we carefully laid on the trail about der.'

100 yards from our fire. "Toward 10 o'clock we began to be disturbed by a great number of those big Arizona crickets, which were following the trail across the plains. They came by thousands, solemnly walking in single file. We knew that it was no use to disturb them, and so let them go by undisturbed. An hour passed and still they came.

"At length I reached out to throw a stick of wood into the fire, and as I did so I brushed a cricket into the flames. Instantly there was a loud explosion that scattered the ashes companion and I jumped to our feet and gazed down the trail. It was simply a line of fire as explosion followed explosion. It kept up until we could no longer hear the reports, but we could trace the devastation by the fishes of light. The last died away in about 20 minutes. We hurried back to where we had left our powder and found but a small stick, crickets had dined on it as they passed. The fire and concussion had

done the rest. "On the next day we kept along the trail and found it strewn with the legs and heads of doad crickets. The last corpse was found just eight miles from where we had camped. An hour had intervened between the arrival of the head of the line and the disaster. Hence my conclusion that crickets travel eight miles an hour."-New York Evening Sun.
