STATE LIVE STOCK BOARD.

At the meeting of the State Live Stock Board in Baltimore, State Veterinarian Clement called its attention to the fact that the United States government had issued a supplementary proclamation relating to Texas fever in cattle. This prescribes that animals infected with the boophilus bovis ticks shall be considered as infectious cattle subject to the regulations governing the handling of cattle from the quarantined Southern area.

KEPT HER HUSBAND'S REMAINS TWO YEARS.

Mrs. Joseph E. Bivins died last week at her home, in Cordele, Ga. Mrs. Bivins was the lady who won national fame a few years ago by her devotion to her first husband, Dr. Marvin, who was one of the wealthiest citizens of Cordele. When he died Mrs. Marvin refused to allow his body to be carried out of the house. She had it embalmed, and said that she would never allow it to be carried from the house while she lived.

LYNCHERS IN JAIL FOR LIFE.

Samuel Williams and William Wood, farmers of Washington County, Alabama, have been found guilty of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment for participation in the recent lynching of a man named Chambliss, charged with murder. It was proved that Williams and Wood led the horse from under the victim.

John Hollinghead turned State's evidence and implicated about twenty-five persons prominent in the county. Some of them are in jail, others out on bond, and some have fled.

These are the first convictions of the kind ever found in Alabama.—N. Y. World.

Massachusetts Monument.

Another monument will soon be erected on Antietam battlefield. It will mark the part taken by the Massachusetts troops in the battle. The Governor of Massachusetts and the council of Boston have approved the design chosen by the commission having in charge the selection and erection of a suitable monument.

The monument will be built of Massachusetts granite and will be 21 feet long and 15 feet high, erected on a mound standing eight feet above the surrounding ground.

On the bronze tablets to the right and left will be placed the numbers of the regiments engaged in the fight and their legend. At the rear of the centrepiece will be a map of the battlefield engraved on bronze, with the location of each regiment plainly marked. In the center of the monument the coat-of-arms of Massachusetts will be placed.

The design is strikingly handsome and will appeal to all lovers of art. Contracts for the monument will soon be given out by the commission, and it is expected to have it completed and erected early next year. When completed it will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies.

The commission has chosen a most desirable position for the monument, it being fixed at the fork of the two government roads near the Nicodemus house and the famous old Dunkard Church. A path will be constructed around the base of the monument, and granite posts with brass rails will surround the plot.
