

In the Circuit Court for Washington county, last Friday, Judge Edward Stake stayed the proceedings in the case of Harry E. Dayhoff, who sued for a divorce from his wife. The Judge had other remedies are then not needed. If ordered him to pay his wife's counsel fees, \$50, and \$2 a week alimony. Day-hoff refused, and he was attached for contempt. 


