



Beyond the glorious mountain scenery there are attractions and points of beauty all over the Heights. A gravity railroad winds around for a half mile, a spin that is the delight of the little ones. Single swings and double swings, The hills surrounding the scene see-saws and the like are swung all of John Brown's exploits, where about. The dancers trip the light Rustic bridges span the gravtly railrocks, one of which has been christened the Devil's Cave, the other the Devil's Kitchen. The scent of berries grow along the sides, and in the old forest trees the chipmunk makes his cave. Over the other bridge there are rugged rocks set up like tomb stones, and this spot has been called the Indian's graveone. There grow luscious blackberries and the golden rod. 



THE WOODPECKER.

Four Characteristics of the Little Drummer of the Woods.

If we had a woodpecker in our hands, we should see in the beginning that its bill is not slightly hooked, with the upper mandible turned down at its end and overlapping the under mandible, as in the crow and other birds that "pick writing from a very well known spirit up a living," but that both mandibles off at the tip. Perhaps the tip of the bird's tongue will be seen appearing through its nearly closed mandibles, and our attention is at once attracted by its peculiar shape. We discover that it is remarkably long, and when fully extended reaches almost if not quite an inch beyond the point of the bill. It is not flat, like the crow's, but round and pretty tableau. fleshy, and has a sharp, horny point, which, by looking at it very closely, we see has a series of barbs on both sides.

In the meantime our hands have doubtless been pricked by the bird's tail feathers, each feather being stiff, bristly and pointed at the end. Some of the larger woodpeckers-the pileated and ivorybill, for instance-have this singular kind of tail feather highly developed. The main stem or shaft of the feather is much larger than usual, and each barb growing from this shaft is curved downward and inward and is strong and pointed. Comparing this feather with the flat tail feather of a crow, we see at once how different it is
