

SPANIARDS ROUTED.

The 600 American marines encamped on the shores of Guantanamo bay, Cuba, have been reinforced by Cubans and won a signal victory Tuesday.

Admiral Sampson has notified the Navy Department that 1,500 Cubans from the commands of Garcia and Itabi have reinforced at Guantanamo.

The dynamite cruiser Vesuvius has had at Santiago her first test in actual warfare. She fired three shells, each containing 200 pounds of gun-cotton, at a Spanish fort.

The cruiser New Orleans attacked and rendered useless a new battery which the Spaniards were erecting at Santiago.

The Spanish government has authorized Gen. Blanco to entertain proposals for an exchange of Lieut. Hobson and the other prisoners taken when the collier Merrimac was sunk at the entrance of the harbor of Santiago.—Sun.

TWO MARINES KILLED.

It is reported that the six hundred marines who have established a camp on the shore of Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, were again attacked from the bushes by Spaniards Sunday night.

A Spanish correspondent in Havana reports that three soldiers were "slightly wounded" Tuesday at the Zocapa battery, near Santiago de Cuba, by the fire from American warships.

Lieut. Victor Blue has made a detour of 70 miles for observation of the harbor of Santiago. He reports the Spanish fleet all there.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

Thomas Gracey, aged about twenty-two, and Stively Dickerhoof, aged thirty-five, two Baltimore and Ohio trackmen working at Baird's Station, just below Pawpaw, W. Va., late Saturday afternoon were instantly killed by lightning.

MARINES HAVE A FIGHT.

Eight hundred and fifty American marines landed on the eastern side of the harbor of Guantanamo, thirty-five miles east of Santiago last Friday, under the guns of the battleships Oregon, Marblehead and the Yosemite.

The landing was begun at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The hats of the Spanish on the beach were burned for sanitary reasons. Not one of our men was injured. The Spaniards fled soon after our fire opened.

The shores were lined with the guns and rifle pits of the Spaniards. A small Spanish gunboat ran down from the city of Guantanamo, four miles up the bay, to aid the batteries, but she did not stay long. Scarcely had she arrived within range before she turned and fled back to the city without firing a shot.

Dispatches of Sunday say: The first American blood has been spilled in battle with the Spanish army on Cuban soil.

The marines landed on the transport Panther, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Huntington, fought for 13 hours, from 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. They were attacked by a large force of Spanish regulars and guerrillas at the entrance to Guantanamo harbor.

Reinforcements were finally landed from the American fleet. The Spanish loss is believed to have been heavy.

We lost four killed and one wounded. Our advance pickets are unaccounted for.

Among our dead is Assistant Surgeon John Blair Gibbs, of Richmond, Va., lately practicing in New York city.

A YOUNG MAN'S WAR.

The average age of the volunteers who have enlisted for this war is only twenty-four. The army we are sending against Spain is, perhaps, the youngest that ever went to battle. The youthfulness of the volunteers from the North and West who have passed through Atlanta has been a subject of much remark, and the Georgia volunteers are mostly very young men.

The enthusiasm and vigor of youth are of great value in war. Our boys are going out with light hearts and with the flush of confidence on their cheeks. They will gain experience rapidly and many of them will distinguish themselves.

The youth of the country has responded nobly to the call for troops, as American youth always has. In every one of her war young men have won glorious names and brightened the page of American history.—Atlanta Journal.
