

As a rule, they are no more jealous than are the children cipal reason for this is that the several wives are often sisters. A young man takes by force, by mutual agreement or by barter, the oldest daughter of a family. If he proves himself a good hunter and a kind husband, the wife persuades her sister to join her wigwam and share her husband's affections. Frequently, when a girl is left an orphan, she is taken into a family and trained to become the supplementary wife of her benefactor in after years. In the hut each wife has her own assigned position, always resting in exactly the same spot, with all her belongings about her. The wealth of the household is not common to all occupants. Each woman has her own basket of meat fragments or shellfish, her own bag with implements, needles, sinews and bits of fur and each wife has her own assemblage of children.

The work of the man is strictly limited to the chase. Profit in Sugar Beets.

For sugar beets, any land that is in a fair state of cultivation will raise 16 to 20 tons of beets with an average of 14 per cent. sugar worth under the Michigan state law \$4.66 per ton. Here is our method of raising this amount of tonnage to the acre. In the fall plow 10 inches wide, 7 or 8 of a soft, clin inches deep. In the spring use a spring-tooth harrow or any tool that style of gown. will work the soil fine. In a week work it again, followed with a smoothing harrow. Sow the rows 20 inches apart, 10 pounds of seed to the acre. When beets form the fourth leaf cut out with a hoe so as to leave one beet out with a hoe so as to leave one beet 6 or 8 inches apart in thinning. #### Testing Seeds.

Seeds should be carefully tested before planting, or heavy losses may oc-cur through their failure to germinate. There is less danger of not be ing true to name than of being old and showing low percentage of germination. Count out 50 or 100 seeds of each kind you are going to plant and put them in small flower pots, labeling each one carefully. Place these a warm greenhouse, hotbed or kitchen window and take note of how many germinate. You can judge how thickly to sow the seed in order to secure a suitable stand of plants.

#### Forcing Vegetables.

Good soil for forcing vgetables may be made by mixing one load of wellloads of rich loam. If it is a little pasty or heavy add some sharp sand to make it more porous and give bet-ter drainage, which will prevent it be-coming sour are hard. This soil will do for forcing nearly all kinds of vegetables and flowers.

#### A Hotbed.

A plot of ground 3x6 feet, covered with a hotbed sash, may be made the most profitable piece of land on the whole farm. The amount of food which it may be made to furnish for the support of the family is surpris-ing. A hotbed is too often regarded as a luxury, but it is within easy reach of the most humble farmer.

#### Early Rhubarb.

Rhubarb may be forced in an ordinary house cellar. I ney may be placed in barrels cut in halves or on the cellar floor and some loam packed pround the roots. A little light and watering is the only attention re-quired. Try it.

Before beginning to milk brush all the loose hair and dirt from the cow's side and udder. If the udder is soiled. have a pail of water and cloth at hand and give it a thorough cleaning.

Education in Porto Rico.


"Throughout the island of Porto Rico, with a million people and only about 500 scholars," said Gen. Eaton, "there was no system for plan of education save what had been in vogue under Spanish rule, changeless for 400 years. Eighty per cent. of the people were illiterate, consequently schools or education were of little interest to a people whom Spain wished to live in ignorance. The text books were crude affairs from Madrid-half catechism, half doubtful history and anxious axioms. There was not a map of the United States in the schools and scarcely one on the island. Although only 1,400 miles from New York and Signature 600 from Florida, the average Porto Rican child read in his history book that the United States was a nation of comparatively little consequence with proud Castile, whose inhabitants were principally haughty millionaires. whose business was the crushing of the poor."


