PUBLIC LOCAL LAW.

CHAPTER 637.

AN ACT to refund to the Emmitsburg Railroad Company a sum of money erroneously paid into the State Treasury. Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to issue his warrant upon the Treasurer, to pay to the Emmitsburg Railroad Company the sum of thirty-seven dollars and fifty-eight cents, being money erroneously paid into the State Treasury by it for State taxes for the years eighteen hundred and ninety-seven and eighteen hundred and ninetyseven and eighteen hundred and ninety





One of the first features to be noticed in regard to farm flocks is the great variety to be found. If one travels far enough, and look with sufficient care, he will meet with every breed in the Standard from Asiatics crossbred. Every man who takes an interest in fowls is to some extent a fancier, and when he sets out to improve his flocks he is likely to choose breed which accords with his taste, without always considering location and other conditions. However, utility is the chief criterion in selecting a breed for the farm, as by far the greater number of improved flocks show. Good table fowls and egg producers are in the majority, as is to be expected, while handsome plumage and fancy points are not popular, though
