NO MORE DELAY TO BE TOLERATED. Turkey has reiterated her promise to settle the missionary claims, amounting to \$100,000, which the United States is pressing her to pay and this time has indicated that she will transmit the money within the next three or four months.

The indefiniteness of the time is unsatisfactory to the President and Secretary Hay, and their dissatisfaction has been made known to the Sublime Porte through Mr. Griscom, the Charge d'Affairs of this Government, who on Monday presented a note to the Turkish Minister for Foreign Affairs, demanding that a date be specified when payment will be made.

A belief had prevailed in diplomatic circles that the acute situation in China would cause the Administration to forego pressing Turkey to settle the missionary claims, but the temper of the authorities is against the abandonment of its present policy. The Administration appreciates the danger that it will be charged during the campaign with failure to pay proper attention to missionary affairs, and it proposes to prevent any such charge being successfully made by taking strong measures for the collection of the claims pending against Turkey and the protection of American missionaries in China.

The cruiser Albany has left Southampton for Gibraltar and will cruise in the Mediterranean after she has obtained certain stores from the Scindia. It is expected the Albany will meet the Baltimore in the Mediterranean. It is hoped in the meantime that Turkey will settle.

Beans and corn would be valuable food for the maintenance of armies. During the Franco-Prussian War the soldiers were given as a concentrated perfect food sausages made from a mixture of bean and corn meal. The American Indian by reducing corn to the finest powder and mixing with it beef or buffalo meat fibre has a perfect food in small compass to carry with him on his hunts. If the Irish peasant could be induced to substitute corn meal for his potato, he would without doubt be a much better fed individual. Personally, I am fond of corn meal and we have corn bread in our family every day, made after the following recipe .:

"Separate two eggs and add onehalf cup of milk to the yolks, one and one-half cups of corn meal, one tablespoonsful of butter; beat thoroughly, add one teaspoonsful of baking powder and the well beaten whites of the eggs. Bake one-half hour in a hot oven. For those who do not like soft bread the batter should be poured in very shallow tins so that the bread when baked is little more than two erisp crusts."
"If there is so much more of a de-

mand for wheat than for corn, why is not the former grown in place of the latter?"

"Because the corn soil will not profluce wheat. In the West they use corn for fuel and it makes the best kind of fuel."

"Can corn meal be substituted for wheat with satisfactory results?" was asked.

"In some instances, yes. It is excellent for souffles and similar dishes. However, if we find a foreign market for our surplus corn, we must, as I have already stated, try to have the foreigners use corn meal in their food and not ask them to eat our corn bread and pancakes."

Indian griddle cakes-Scald one pint of yellow meal with just sufficient boiling water to moisten. Do not make it soft. When cool add one cup of corn flour, one pint of milk, beat and stir in three well beaten eggs; add one teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Bake on hot griddle.

Indian pudding—Chop fine a quarter pint of Indian meal. Put one pint of milk in a double boiler, add small piece of stick cinnamon; when hot, stir in the meal and suet; take from fire. Add half cup of molasses, half cup washed currants or washed Sultanas; cover and stand aside over night. In the morning add three eggs, well beaten. Turn into a greased mold or pudding bag, leaving room for it to swell, and boil or steam continually for five hours. Replenish the water as it evaporates with boiling water. Serve hot, with foamy sauce.



Blind Workers.

The introduction of seal skinning A Profitable Crop for Farmers of the and barrel making machines caused a strike of nearly one thousand men in St. John, N. B. Three hundred seal skinners went out and six hundred from thirty to fifty bushels, and the coopers. One seal skinning machine will displace the labor of thirty-eight skinners. This estimate is based on the production of one machine. The strikers held a meeting and notified their employers of a resolution that they would return to work if the machinery was removed. The demand was acceeded to and the men resumed work. A skinner is paid at the rate of ten cents per skin. An expert can skin eighty seals a day. Thus one machine would save the employer the sum of \$1,824 a week. The coopers struck because a barrel making machine was introduced. Six hundred men are employed making barrels for seal oil. One machine with tenders will do the work of fifty men whose salary would average \$2.50.

These men might as well attempt to beat back the high tides that roll up the shores in that locality as to try to keep out labor saving machinery. Instead of opposing it, workingmen should welcome it, and then, with all the force and logic that in them lies, work for a reduction of the hours of toil to make up for it. The world moves forward, not backward.

Literature. Mr. James Payn, the English novelist, wrote a series of articles a few years ago for the purpose of showing that a person of average brains and an average education could make as good a living at literature as he was likely to at anything else. They were entertaining articles, but they were not wholly convincing. And the outlook for young Americans who have a notion of trying to get a living by 'pure literature" is, says the New York Times, distinctly gloomier than that of young Britons. As Professor Matthews says, it is not so gloomy as is used to be. International copyright has changed the situation for the better. Whether the fact bodes good or ill, it cannot be gainsaid that Socialism is growing. At the recent state election in Rhode Island the Socialistic party polled 3,025 votes for Governor, a substantial record when it is considered that the entire vote of the state on the April election was 50,-000, and that the whole vote of Rhode Island at the last presidential election was only 53,000, of which the Socialist vote was 558. During the four years intervening the increase in the Socialist vote has been at the rate of nearly 500 per cent., and a like increase in some other states would put the Socialist party in a position of prominence such as it has not occupied since its organization twelve years ago. In the election of 1892 the ocialists polled 21,000 votes in the election of 1896 they polled 33,000 susceptible of unsophisticated misconvotes, a gain of about 50 per cent., which, if not exceeded this year, would give the Socialists in the whole country a total of about 50,000, a figure materially less than indicated by the Rhode Island election.

The Massachusetts cities, Brockton and Haverhill, elected avowed Socialists as mayors last fall. In Wisconsin in 1896 no Socialist ticket was run; in 1898 the Socialist vote was 4,017. In Maryland four years ago there were 587 Socialist votes for President; last year the Socialist vote was 1,381. In California the Socialist vote four years ago was 1,600; two years ago it was 5,900. The Socialist vote of Illinois was 1,147 four years ago; two years ago it was 4,518. In Indiana the increase was from 329 to 1,715. In Kansas, in which there was no Socialist ticket four years ago, there were 642 Socialist votes last year. In Michigan, where there was no Socialist ticket four years ago, the Socialist vote was 1,100 two years ago. In Missouri it was 2,800; in New Jersey it was 5,458. In Ohio last year it was 2.439, although the Socialist party had no state ticket four years ago. In Washington there were 1,323 Socialist votes two years ago, and the only state in which there was no material increase was New York, but on the reduced vote of 1898 the Socialist poll was 1,000 greater than in the presidential election two years preceding. The New York Sun says that the Socialists will poll from 100,000 to 250,000 votes this year. If Socialism means the substitution of co-operation for competition, it is coming even faster than the Sun admits.

American Prunes.

According to a statement made by United States Consul Joseph I. Brit tain, stationed at Nantes, France, the quality of the California prunes is superior to the French, and the duty is not excessive, being but 10 francs per kilograms, or less than one cent per pound. If the prunes are carefully selected and tastefully packed in substantial boxes, and are always as represented by the samples, there will soon be a much larger demand from France. One of the Nantes importers recently received a consignment of California prunes from New York city. He could buy them cheaper in appropriations or a revision of the California, but he wished to have plans on a more modest scale. It is them guaranteed by some one with whom he was acquainted; hence the order was given through the New York house. These prunes were nicely packed, but the dealer says he lost about 20 cases in consequence of the boxes having been made from very thin lumber.
