THE ICE AT THE TWO POLES According to the geologist of the Antarctic expedition in the steam. er Belgica there is a remarkable difference in the distribution of 1.6 around the two poles of the earth. Going toward the South Pole perpetual snow is encountered at the sixty-fifth degree of latitude, and he thinks that the floating ice of that region comes from a layer covering the whole polar crown. The floating ice of the north, on the contrary, comes from true glaciers, which are pushed down through valleys until they reach the water. Up there the glacial caps do not reach the sea.-Phila. What is causing the strange phenomenon is not known, but its continuance is beginning to cause some







SINGLE PIECE SUITS THAT ARE SPUN UPON THE BODY.

A Remarkable Tale of the Remarkable Garments of Silk That Are Worn by Some Remarkable South American Indians.

Probably no country on earth is more futeresting to the traveler on the lookout for queer things and unusual expeclences than the silvas of the Amazon. and here is a story about an Indian tribe of that region told by Arthur Axstell, an American traveler, that can hardly be beaten.

These particular Indians were continually bent on discovery and experimenting, says Mr. Axtell. Somehow they had come into possession of some silkworms. These worms were not known before in that country, and most of them died before the natives found out how to raise them. But they persevered and by feeding them on the tender leaves of some native plants produced a good quality of silk, not so good as the Chinese product by feeding the worms on white mulberry leaves, But nevertheless a strong, serviceable silk, certainly good enough for the dusky bodies of these savages, for this silk has not yet become an article of. commerce.

Their method of obtaining the silk and transforming it into garments was crude. When the moths laid the eggs, the natives carried them in great quantitles in belts about their bodies, thus glving the eggs the body heat. At the larvæ in a recent report, in which he end of winter the eggs were hatched. and the result was an army of caterpillars. These were trained to crawl over the naked bodies of the natives. This was their home. They knew no other and seemed quite contented.

The New Pea Pest.

The new pest, the destructive pea aphis, has in the last two years inflicted enormous losses in various regions where peas are grown for canneries, as Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, New York and Connecticut, Michigan and Wisconsin also have suffered from it. Some of the scientists claim that it is naturally more an enemy of clover than



of peas. An encouraging feature noted in Canada is that wherever the aphis occurred it was attacked by parasitic enemies, the most vigorous of these being the small orange larvæ of a species
