THE PATTENED INFANTS' AIM. A hody of gentlemen whose maternal interests have been classed as "infant industries," but which long since have grown into a vigorous adult stage, are meeting in Washington in what they term a reciprocity convention. While they will discuss the tariff upon which their infants have so generously fed, their president says the leadang object of the meeting will be to "harmonize as far as possible the widely different opinions represented." But he first warned his hearers that "our aim has been to forestall tariff agitation, not to encourage it." Thus he submits a narrow platform upon which the "harmonizing" might be done-that of reciprocity in trade. To make this possible, and still not to take from the infants' bounty, favored tariff schedules may be recommended with countries which produce materials not produced by any of several American manufacturers, especially those which have enjoyed the richest fruits of the tariff. With any such selfish motive as this the delegates now assembled will doubtless sustain some severe

But it must be understood that the convention does not expect to upset the tariff. Reciprocity seems to sound better than tariff reduction, and, besides, it affords an opportunity for discrimination not possible in a horizontal reduction. It is a much more selfish principle which is not to be found in a general scaling of duties whereby the best and poorest of foreign-made goods have an equal chance, with the consumer as a judge of their




