The room is lighted by one window, in which paper takes the

place of glass. The first duty of the proprietor in making a patron comfortable is to step up the holes in the paper window pane. He never tears the paper off entirely and replaces it with a new one, because the sheet of paper is worth about one-tenth of a cent, and the innkeeper is not wasteful. Indeed he pastes little slips of paper over the holes until all the light that filters through it is of a mottled hue.
