

According to a subsidiary clause, if any publisher issued a book at a price persons" he was liable to a penalty. The "discreet persons" included, among others, the archbishop of Canterbury, the lord chancellor and the vice chancellors of Oxford and Cambridge. On them devolved the somewhat delicate task of fixing the book's value. 



The Coloring Qualities of Pepper. Canaries when fed with cayenne pepper gradually change their color, passing from yellow to red. Cayenne pepper contains a tinctorial substance, an irritative principle and an oil. When the last two substances are extracted by steeping in alcohol, pepper loses its coloring properties, but an addition of olive oil restores them. From this fact the conclusion is drawn that the oily principle of pepper is the necessary vehicle of color. Experiments made with white hens gave similar results. 'These hens have also the quality of being able to indicate changes of temperature by a marked change of plumage. The yolk of their egg is bright red.


