




FIGS. 1 AND 2. to prune too much and that it requires the greatest good judgment to prune

How to Prune.-1. Never cut away more wood than is necessary to obtain the end in view. Err on the side of cutting too little rather than too much, for if too much is taken off it cannot be replaced in many years. Large crops of fruit cannot be grown on trees with a few exposed branches. 2. Cut out all dead wood as soon as it is discovered. (Summer is a good time to do this, as dead branches can then be seen at a glance.) 3. If two branches rub together so as to injure one another, the weakest should be cut away. 4. If one branch rests on the top of another, as in Fig. 1, one should be removed. 5. Head back and thin out the top rather than cut off the lower branches to bring the fruit as low as possible on account of thinning, spraying and harvesting (see Fig. 2). 6. Never remove side branches if it can be avoided. If it must be done, cut as shown at B, Fig. 3, and cover the injured parts with two coats of linseed oil paint, gas tar or grafting wax. Cover all wounds over half an inch in


