ODD ROCK FORMATIONS. Two Queer Freaks of Nature on the Island of St. Helena.

There are at least two queer freaks of nature on the island of St. Helenaor rather four, for one of them is a group of three figures-known the world over as the "Devil's Nose" and "Lot and His Daughters." Any one who is able to study the island as it is and not run wild over the Napoleonic legends which have clustered about that "seabound rock" since the days when the "Little Corporal" was housed there in his living grave will find much that will repay for investigation, time and study.

The queerest of the natural formations are the oddities above alluded to. BELL FOUNDING.

It Is an Ancient Art, Its Origin

Shrouded In Antiquity. The art of bell founding is undoubtedly of great antiquity. The Saxons are known to have used bells in their churches, although probably but small ones, for the Venerable Bede, writing at the end of the seventh century, alludes to them in terms which seem to show that they were not unfamiliar things. The towers of the Saxon period have belfries of considerable dimensions in most cases, and at Crowland abbey, in south Lincolnshire, there was a famous peal of seven bells many years before the Normon con-

The monks at that time and for long after were the chief practitioners of the art of bell founding. Their bells were rarely without inscriptions, often in Latin, containing perhaps some obscure joke, the point of which is quite lost. More often they were of a religious nature, sometimes, we fear, not unmixed with a dash of superstition, as when the bell declares that its sound drives away the demons of the air who caused pestilence and famine, lightning and thunderstorms.

As a rule, unfortunately, they put no dates on their bells, a defect which has been in some measure overcome by the researches of many enthusiastic campanologists, but which is likely to keep the early history of bells shrouded in darkness for a long time to come.-Gentlemau's Magazine.

THE WORD "BUT." -

An Analysis of the American Habit of Using It. The word "but" is sometimes said to

be characteristic of Americans. it marks the qualifying spirit, which hesitates at extremes and likes to adjust the balance of truth. If, for instance, somebody speaks extravagantly of Emerson's genius the critical spirit replies, 'Yes, he was a genius, but" he had such and such limitations. If, on the other hand, the limitations are meutioned first at another time, the same spirit observes, "Yes, he has those faults, but he is a genius with it all." "But" expresses the desire to have both sides presented. Carried to excess, the habit leads to argumentativeness and carping. The person who gets only argument out of conversation is usually a barren companion. Sometimes also it shows an unkind nature. when the word is used regularly after hearing others praised. It becomes the index of envy or of the absence of enthusiasm. Qualifying too constantly in appreciation is like damning with faint praise, or, rather, praising with an accompaniment of faint damns. The ardent, imaginative temperament makes less use of qualification. Carried along with a rush, whether of praise or reproach, it seldom stops to split the hair of exact truth. "But me no buts." says. The little word is more leniently treated by judicial and scientific minds. If its constant use is typically American, as the English not infrequently allege, it fits in with the proverbial idea of Uncle Sam-a sort of cautious and skeptical New England farmer, with his "Waal, I don't jest know," rather than with the American type which has been developed since the west became a greater element in


