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PATENT LEATHER.

The Process by Which It Takes on the Enamel Finish.

All manufacturers of patent leather have their own tanning processes, much like those of the calfskin tanner, though some patent leather is given a bark tanning. Horsehide and colt skins are the chief leathers made with a patent

The patent or enamel finish is really painted and baked on, as the bicycle manufacturer paints and bakes enamel on to a frame. Tanners are very particular about keeping their processes secret, and nobody but workmen is ever allowed in the finishing rooms.

The hide or skin, having been stretched and dried as much as possible, is first given a coating of a mixture of linseed oil, litharge, white lead or similar materials, boiled together until they make a pasty mixture.

This is daubed on the surface with a steel tool and well rubbed in, so that the pores of the leather will be filled up. Then the leather is put into the oven, its surface being exposed to steam pipes at a temperature of about 160





The entire surrounding land, over 4,000,000 acres, has also been reserved. The ultimate reclamation of land through the great system of dams and canals eventually to be constructed on this river alone will be something over a million acres, but the first step in this work will probably reclaim about 500,000 acres of rich delta land.

The second project which has been investigated is the storage of the waters of the King's river, about midway between Los Angeles and San Francisco, formed by two large mountain streams heading far up in the snow capped Sierras. The regular flow of the With careful han King's river irrigates today an enormous acreage in the fertile San Joaquin valley, while the storage of its waters by the government would increase its irrigable capacity by at least 100,000 acres. At present its flood waters flow wholly to waste, as does likewise almost the entire flow of the Colorado river running through the extreme southern part of the state and emptying into the gulf of California.

While destroying this brushwood any kind of indigenous grass will spring up as fast as the sunlight is admitted to the soil. The goats will not eat this grass further than to snip off a blade top now and then unless they are confined to it as their feed. Usually, especially in blue grass regions, there is a pretty fair pasture ready for sheep, horses or cattle as soon as the goats are done with the brush problem. Such pastures are sometimes improved and hastened by the sowing of grass seed among the stumps. While destroying this brushwood the goats are enriching the soil by their droppings, the value of which depends upon the value of the land receiving them. In a general way the droppings may be valued at \$2.50

PHOSPHORESCENCE.

Animal and Vegetable Light Rank

Among Nature's Mysteries. Animal phosphorescence is one of the most surprising and least understood of nature's phenomena. The pale, bluish white light of the glowworm has been found by naturalists to be dependent upon the motion of the insect's body or legs. From this it would seem that the phosphorescence depends upon some nervous action, regulated at pleasure by the insect, for it has the power of obscuring it entirely. If the glowthose produced by phosphorus will appear. They shine more brightly in oxy-

these is the great lantern fly of South America, which gives enough light to enable a person to read by the rays from a single insect. Numerous classes of these flies are found in Surinam, where they illuminate the darkness in a most remarkable manner.

In some of the bogs of Ireland lives a worm which gives out a bright green light, a fitting color for the Emerald Isle. There are many other kinds of insects which become luminous in the

Yet there are many eurious instances of phesphorescence in dead animals among crustaceans, the whiting among fishes and decayed wood being striking examples. Their emission of light seems to depend, however, not upon putrefaction, for as this progresses their luminosity diminishes, but upon matter has been regarded as somewhat different from the slow combustion of phosphorus, but upon examination all the chemical conditions are found to be the same.

The strange phosphorescent quality of some plants and flowers is not exactly the same as that possessed by animal matter, but it is as little understood. It seems to be an absorption of light and a subsequent liberation of it. If a nasturtium is plucked during sunshine and carried into a dark room, the eye, after it has reposed for a few moments, will discover the flower by the light emitted from its leaves.

The phosphorescence of the sea is due to a living animal, which gives out its light under nervous excitement, as when it is stirred by the motion of a passing vessel.




