

WILL PROBE RAILROADS

Ownership of Coal and Oil Properties to Be Investigated. Washington, Feb. 24.—Preceded by a debate which indicated no hesitancy, but rather a relish in taking action against alleged railroad combination, the house agreed without opposition to the Tillman-Gillespie resolution directing the Interstate commerce commission to make an immediate inquiry and report regarding alleged restraints of trade on the part of certain railroads in the handling of coal and oil.

The resolution was not in the form in which it passed the senate and will go back to that body for its second action. Mr. Crossen, of Ohio, characterized it as a rebuke to the recent "puerile" report which had been made to a certain railroad official. Mr. Gillespie (Texas) said if half he had heard was true, the commercial brigandage of today put entirely in the shade the hold-up man of the frontier days. Mr. Townsend (Michigan), who presented the resolution from the committee, discussed the conditions which in his opinion made it a necessity. The only note of apprehension was from Mr. Mann (Illinois), who called attention to the law which exempts from prosecution persons who may testify in the inquiry. In this manner, he said, the guilty officials, if any such were found, might be able to escape punishment. It was explained that the resolution in no way changed existing law on this side, and the belief was expressed that in making the inquiry the commission would exercise discretion in getting its information from sources which would not exempt possibly guilty parties.

WILL BURY PAUL JONES APRIL 24

Great Sea Fighter Will Be Interred With Imposing Naval Display. Annapolis, Md., Feb. 27.—Secretary of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte, General Horace Porter, Governor Edwin Warfield, of Maryland, and Admiral Bands were in conference relative to the interment of the remains of Admiral John Paul Jones, April 24th, the anniversary of his victory over the British frigate Drake. The body of the great sea fighter will on that date be removed from the temporary vault in which it was placed upon its return to this country, to the handsome memorial hall in the new memorial quarters. While all the details have not been arranged, the ceremonies of April 24, which will be held in the armory of the naval academy, will be presided over by Secretary of the Navy Bonaparte, and addresses will be made by President Roosevelt, General Porter, Governor Warfield and the French ambassador, M. Jusserand. It was decided to make the display a purely naval one, except that the various patriotic societies throughout the country will be invited to attend and participate. A feature of the occasion will be the fleet of warships of the United States, France, and it is expected, other countries which will be at anchor off this city.

RATE BILL REPORTED

Large Crowd Present When Tillman Presented Bill in Senate. Washington, Feb. 27.—The Hepburn railroad rate bill was reported to the senate by Senator Tillman in accordance with the action of the senate committee on Interstate commerce last Friday. Large crowds assembled in the galleries, anticipating a field day of debate, but were disappointed. There was little of interest in the proceedings regarding the bill. A brief statement from Mr. Tillman, with the necessary arrangement for printing the report of the hearings before the committee and a promise that a formal report would be made later, was followed by a few remarks from Mr. Aldrich showing the position of the five Republicans who opposed the bill as reported. Mr. Aldrich indicated that there would be no unnecessary delay, but that the bill would be discussed in accordance with its importance.

Battling Nelson Steps Runaway

Huntington, W. Va., Feb. 26.—Battling Nelson, the champion lightweight pugilist, who is spending a few days in the mountains at Blue Sulphur, near here, prior to going into training at Philadelphia, was patently bruised in stopping a runaway at that place, and rescued Mrs. Frank Howard, with her two small children, from a perilous situation. Mrs. Howard had taken the children for a drive, and the horse, becoming frightened, bolted and ran. As the runaway neared Nelson, the pugilist leaped for the horse's neck and succeeded in stopping it only after he had been dragged a considerable distance. The bruises are not serious.

Diseased Pork Deadly

Savannah, Ga., Feb. 27.—Rufus Woods, aged 24 years, of Collins, Ga., is at the Savannah hospital, recovering from an attack of trichinosis. He is the seventh victim. His wife is now recovering. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wozart, Wood's father-in-law and mother-in-law, and their three daughters have all died of the disease within the past few weeks, caused, it is believed, by eating diseased pork.

Wife Saw Husband Drown

Lancaster, Pa., Feb. 24.—William Shaub, 25 years of age, was drowned in a mill dam at Conowingo, Drumore township, while skating. His wife was standing on the bank and saw him go through the ice.

Finishing Robbers Get \$37,500

Helsingfors, Finland, Feb. 27.—Ten men forced an entrance into the Russian state bank, shot the guardian and secured \$37,500. The robbers have not been captured.

\$600 For Death Of Boy

A verdict for \$600 was rendered against the United Railways and Electric Company Tuesday by a jury in the Court of Common Pleas in the suit of \$10,000 damages for the death of Howard E. Smith, 11 years old, who was thrown from a Back River car and killed on June 8, 1904. The boy was riding on the rear platform of the car, and the accident happened when the car struck a curve. John W. Smith, the boy's father, brought the suit. It was tried by William H. Lawrence, J. Cookman Boyd and Chas. R. Schrim, for Mr. Smith, and Geo. Dobbin Penniman and Lee S. Meyer, for the Railroad Company.

Fatally Crushed By Wagon

Mr. Charles Mueller, 28 years old, a cartman, of Baltimore, was fatally injured Sunday afternoon at Fayette street and Milton avenue by his wagon being struck by an East-bound Edmondson avenue car, which threw him out and toppled the wagon over on him, crushing his body. He died half an hour after the accident. The car became unmanageable while descending the steep grade and Motorman Thomas J. Briedy could not stop it. After traveling at a rapid rate for two squares it crashed into Mr. Mueller's wagon, which was crossing the street. The vehicle was turned over and Mr. Mueller thrown out. The heavy milk box fell upon his chest and the weight of the wagon rested upon it. The car continued on, and the motorman seeing that it was going to crash into another car, which was standing at the terminus of the line at Luzerne street, jumped off and called to the crew of the other car. A second later the runaway car crashed into the standing car, and both cars were thrown from the track and damaged.

As claimed by Carter on December 22, the day of the murder, he was in the employ of Richard Seek, of Montgomery county. Mr. Seek corroborated his statement Saturday. The man was consequently released.

Clarence A. Miller, of Bakersville, Washington county, has received a certificate from Secretary of the Navy Bonaparte certifying that he stands fifth among the gunners of the Navy for marksmanship. He is now at Monterey, Cal., and his term of enlistment will expire in April, when he will return home.

Raymond S. Keeney, the 19-month-old son of Milton P. Keeney, died suddenly while playing in his father's arms at the latter's home in Waynesboro. He was sick a long time afterward and his death is attributed to injuries sustained in the wreck.

Upon the traverse's plea of guilty in this case the Court sentenced him to four years in the penitentiary.
