Appeals to Miners and Operators to Avert Soft Coal Strike.

New York, Feb. 27. - President Roosevelt has again intervened as a peacemaker between the coal miners Mitchell, president of the United Mine an agreement with the soft coal operators in the hope of averting the stabbed himself. threatened strike of April 1 in the bituminous coal fields.

The president's letter and the announcement that the national convention would be called were made pubwith Francis L. Robbins, president of the Pittsburg Coal company, and chairman of the bituminous operators.

The president's letter to Mr. Mitchell follows:

"White House, Washington, Feb. 24. "Sir-I note with very great concern the failure of your late convention on the joint interstate agreement to come to a basis of settlement of the bituminous mining scale of wages. You in this business have enjoyed a great industrial peace for many years, thanks to the joint trade agreement successive conventions.

"A strike such as is threatened on April 1 is a menace to the peace and \$20,000 in gold and paper money. general welfare of the country. I urge you to make a further effort to avoid such a calamity.

As the death march started, Hoch stopped several times to shake hands with the attendants, saying: "Good bye. boys." Hoch's face was pale, but his manner was composed and his courage unsurpassed. He had said several times that when the hour of his death came he would meet it bravely, that he had been a soldier and knew how to die. His attitude on the scaffold bore out his words in full. He stood erect, his heels close together, his shoulders back and his gaze directed over the heads of the crowd toward the far end of the corridor. Rev. J. R. Burkland, who was reciting the prayers for the dying as the procession approached the scaffold, continued them while Hoch was preparing for execution. He had said that he did not care to say anything on the scaffold, but while the deputy sheriff was pinioning his feet, Hoch spoke to died in Philadelphia from drinking banks, and did not wish his friends to him in a low voice.



Hunting Birds With Greyhounds. The great bustard is the rarest bird that comes under the category of all the level counties of England and was particularly common on Salisbury Plain. From the reign of Henry VIII. repeated measures were passed in order to protect it; and it is expressly included under the head of game in the statute of the first year of the reign of William IV., which codified and reformed the laws relating to game.

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jungle talk of the sky as a painter talks of the horizon or a seafaring man of the offing-as if when you wanted to see it you only need use your eyes. But in the jungle you don't see the sky-at least you only see a few scragopenings in the twigs and leaves. Neither do you feel the wind bolwing, nor get burned or dazzled by the sun, nor even see that luminary are the sun and leaves. Neither and quickly. Then came a drop of rain and a peal of thunder which seemed to make the world stop.

Then the storm began. The sky above darkened; the trees clattered; the brushwood beneath hissed and bowed itself. A deluge of raindrops blotted out the narrow view. Down it came, soaking through the densest leaves under which one fled for refuge, striking the grass and sand with millions of dull thuds, dashing furiously against the leaves as if they were so many hostile shields, streaking the air
