The eggs are laid on the that you keep on such good terms with young onion plants in the spring. Several generations are produced during the season.

Remedial measures consist in repelling the adult flies that come to lay their eggs and in stimulating the young you. When I go down the street I plants to very vigorous growth by means of commercial fertilizers and cultivation. Pull out and destroy the young plants as soon as they show the presence of the pests and do everything possible to stimulate the plants to rapid growth. The best repellent thus far discovered is carbolic acid emulsion diluted thirty times and applied with a sprinkler. It will be necessary to repeat the application at intervals of about a week, but good work early in the season is sure to result in reducing the number of the flies later


> Carbolic Acid Emulsion. Hard soap, one pound, or soft soap, one quart; water (boiling), one gallon;

crude carbolic acid, one pint. The soap is to be dissolved in the water, and while it is still boiling hot who, perhaps from want of brilliancy ed by forcing the stream from the nozzle into the kettle, just as is done in making kerosene emulsion. Dilute with thirty times its bulk of water and apply. If any injury results from the use of this emulsion, dilute it still more.

A HAY BARRACK.

A Movable Roof of Light Wood, to Be Raised and Lower 1. A movable roof for a haystack, one

that can be raised and lowered, is briefly described in Ohio Farmer. The diagram herewith shows the true way to frame around the corner post and the manner of arranging the sweep for raising and lowering. Four straight chestnut poles twenty-two feet long are selected from the woods and bored with holes one foot apart to receive the bolts which support the roof. They are set four feet in the ground and eighteen feet apart, as that is a convenient size to make a barrack
