valuation," says the Attorney-General, "and a very lax administration of the customs laws in the past, which has subjected the Government to a very material loss of revenue. A general investigation into the subject of frauds by undervaluation has only commenced, and this branch of the subject will now be pressed vigorously."

The Attorney-General recommends that a general immunity statute, such as exists under the inter-State commerce laws, should be enacted to apply to criminal prosecutions generally, but says such a statute should only protect a witness from the consequence of the testimony he is about to give.

Prosecutions against the Oregon and California Railroad Company and 45 other defendants to recover 2,300,000 acres of land, valued at \$50,000,000, which the Government claims are illegally held, are now pending. There also under way 24 suits against the Central Pacific Railway Company and others to recover thousands of acres of valuable lands which the Government contends were illegally patented, probably with the knowledge that they were valuable for the minerals and oils underneath.

In the campaign against bucketshops 350 such places were closed, others voluntarily discontinued as a result of the crusade, and indictments are pending against men and corporations and the telegraph company which allowed the use of its wires.

The Bureau of Investigation, which has built up an efficient secret police, began raids on firms charged with using the mails for fraudulent purposes. The Attorney-General recommends legislation to permit the agents of that bureau to administer oaths and serve processes.

During the year there were 15,371 criminal cases of all sorts in the United States courts, which produced fines, forfeitures and penalties aggregating \$1,083,974. Mr. Wickersham recommends legislation to give the right of appeal in Indian cases, a law for the issue of search warrants for property stolen from the Government; that Federal judges be allowed traveling expenses within their own districts, and that the salaries of all Federal justices be increased. He also recommends that the statute of limitations in customs frauds be extended from three years to five years. He recommends legislation to permit the United States to sue and prosecute an offending corporation wherever that corporation may do business.

As a result of his recent trip, the Attorney-General presents some recommendations for relief in Alaska. Some law should be enacted to help the needy and deserving poor in that clime, when a person is found with legs or arms frozen off or starved nearly to death it is necessary to charge the invalid with vagrancy and have him committed in order to get treatment in a Government hospital.

Few Congressional Briefs.

Making provision for paying the expenses of the newly created Court of Commerce, Attorney General Wickersham has asked Congress for an urgent deficiency appropriation of \$17,500 for the salaries of five additional judges, and \$49,750 for the other officials and for rent.

The government of the United States owes the Broadway Bargain House of New York \$3,357.04, and the Secretary of the Treasury asked that a bill be passed providing for the payment of this amount. The Broadway Bargain House bought condemned clothing from the government and delivery was short by the sum mentioned.

The President's recommendations in his annual message for increases of judicial salaries are embodied in a bill introduced in the Senate by Senator Depew. The salaries recommended by the President and proposed in Senator Depew's bill are as follows: Chief Justice of the United States, \$18,000; associate justices, \$17,500; circuit judges, \$10,000, and district judges, \$9,000.

Secretary of State Knox asked Congress to include in the urgent deficiency appropriation bill an item of \$50,000 each for the expense of arbitrating the outstanding pecuniary claims between the United States and Great Britain and for arbitration of international title to the Chamizal strip between Mexico and this country, conditioned upon the ratification of conventions on those subjects.

FRUIT CAKE

A Recipe Which Can Be Depended Upon.

If you have not already made your fruit cake hasten to get them out of the way this week, for the week before Christmas will find you in such a rush that the cakes may not be a success. There are all kinds of recipes for this annual cake baking, but many of them are no good. The experienced housekeeper will need no advice on the subject, but to the young bride, who has never tried to make this kind of cake, which is called one of the most difficult to undertake, a few suggestions and a tried recipe may not fail of appreciation. She need not fear to trust these, as they have been tested by one of the best housekeepers I know. And the cake is not as expensive as some which taste no better. One pound of butter, 1 pound of sugar, 12 eggs, 1 pound of flour, 2 teaspoons each of allspice and mace, 1 teaspoon each of cloves, 2 pounds raisins, 2 pounds currants, 1 pound citron, 1 pound almonds (after shelling), 1 wine glass of brandy, and 1 lemon. Cut the citron in rings, blanch the almonds and chop fine. Mix all the fruit out the citron with enough flour to coat it. Mix spice with sugar, cream the butter, add sugar, the beaten yolks, beaten whites, lemon rind and juice, brandy, flour and fruit.

A pan with a stem in the middle makes the cake bake better, since the heat radiates all through it. Line the pan with grocers' dark-brown paper, which has been greased, to keep from burning.

Another thing, which is most important of all, do not attempt to bake the cake yourself unless you are experienced in this line; for this is the test of cake making, and you cannot afford to throw away the ingredients of fruit cake or have it burned. Even some of the best cake makers send their Christmas cakes to a reliable baker, who charges only 25 cents for relieving them of all the responsibility, to say nothing of the saving in their coal bill and their time. When the cake is done, sprinkle it every few days for a week or so with port or some good wine, to insure it from getting too dry.

Now, I have figured out just the exact cost of the cake, the materials of which were bought in Washington last week at prevailing prices of the green grocery stores.

- For a thirteen-pound cake there are one or two slight changes in the recipe. Two pounds raisins. . . . .20 Two pounds currants. . . . .25 One pound citron. . . . .25 One pound almonds. . . . .50 One pound figs. . . . .20 Three pounds flour. . . . .10 Twelve eggs. . . . .40 One pound butter. . . . .38 Spices. . . . .10 Wine and brandy. . . . .10 Baking. . . . .25 Total. . . . . \$2.73

What are the Schools Doing to Check Profanity.

"Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain, for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain." ### WOMAN SUFFRAGE COLUMN.

This column is edited by the Woman Suffrage Committee of Frederick, which assumes responsibility for all statements, facts and arguments here presented.

Anti-suffragists, when they say "A man's place is in the home," feel as if this is the ultimatum, and think they have left the suffragist stranded with an unanswerable argument.

Suffragists know from experience here, and from results in states where women have the franchise, that the ballot is most needed and most valuable to the mother and homemaker. Suffragists believe the foundation of the nation is the home, and that the strength and purity of the home rests more with the mother than with the father.

To quote from Mrs. Maud Nathan, President of the Consumers' League of New York City,—"I have been a housekeeper for 25 years. There is not a department in my housekeeping that is not affected by politics." If any of us will reflect a moment, we can see that our homes are entirely controlled by law.

In taking up the relation of the law to the home, let us first consider the question of public sanitation:—

The drinking water for the family comes from the city water supply. This is controlled by the city government. The milk is supposed to have come from carefully inspected dairies. The Health Department is under the city laws. If it is appointed on account of political affiliations and not efficiency, we are in danger of having disease in the home. Such preventable diseases as typhoid and tuberculosis could be practically eradicated with a pure water and milk supply, which spreads these contagious diseases. The women of the equal suffrage states have protected the health of the home by improved civic housekeeping. Women, when once aroused, take a deep interest in such things as street-cleaning, garbage removal and sanitation. The meat from the butcher, the canned goods, the bread, cakes and crackers, the material used for clothing, ready-made garments, in fact every commodity that is brought into the home prepared for use, is made ready for us under conditions that are controlled by law. It is the woman's duty to see that the conditions under which these things are prepared are hygienic and sanitary. In this way, through the use of the ballot, the mother protects the home.

In New York last year an inspector found in a dirty tenement room, nuts being picked by a young girl with a tuberculous hand, and these nuts were being packed, without being cleaned, in a jar marked "Health Food."

Judge Lindsey, of Denver, says: "We have in Colorado the most advanced laws of any State in the Union for the care and protection of the home and the children, the very foundation of the Republic. These laws, in my opinion would not exist at this time if it were not for the powerful influence of women, which, at all times, has been back of them and those who have conscientiously and faithfully administered them."

**Frederick Bar Lauds Former Judge Henderson.**

Lauding former Judge James C. Henderson, who retired as associate judge in the Sixth Judicial Circuit several weeks ago, members of the Frederick bar met Monday in the Court-house and adopted resolutions expressing regret at the retirement of the Judge.

The resolutions were signed by Ex-Judge Glenn H. Worthington (chairman), William P. Maulsby, F. S. Stoner, Milton G. Urner and D. P. Bailey. Addresses praising Judge Henderson were made by Chief Judge Hammond Urner of the Sixth Circuit, State's Attorney A. D. Willard and John S. Newman.

### YOUR TUBERCULOSIS BILL.

A man of facts and figures in a Pennsylvania city recently computed that the illness and death of his child from scarlet fever, which she contracted in school, cost him \$377.50, while his or his neighbor's share in the prevention of this easily preventable disease would amount to only \$3.47. A similar calculation could be made in the case of tuberculosis.

Suppose a man, father of a family of three children, and earning \$3.00 a day, is taken sick with tuberculosis. What does it cost him to get well, and what would it cost each person in the United States to have prevented him from ever having had the disease. Here are a few of the leading items of expense to him in getting cured:

Six months treatment in a sanatorium ..... \$250.00  
Care, family of four at \$8.00 per week for six months ..... 192.00  
Loss of wages for six months', at \$3.00 per day ..... 432.00

Total ..... \$874.00

STATE MISCELLANY

Interesting Paragraphic News From Various Sections of Maryland. Governor Crothers has issued a proclamation declaring Monday, December 26, to be a legal holiday.

A special medical board of the navy is in Annapolis to investigate the typhoid fever situation that has prevailed among the midshipmen for a month.

Midshipmen at Annapolis who have been drinking are under a cloud. An effort will be made to suppress such indulgence and eight students are under restrictions pending an investigation.

Judge M. L. Keedy has overruled the demurrer to the petition filed by John W. Dorsey and others to compel the Hagerstown and Conococheague Turnpike Company to keep the road in repair.

The Cumberland City Council proposes to go ahead with the erection of the proposed new City Hall, and bids will be opened early in January.

Much to the gratification of Governor Crothers and the members of the State Roads Commission, the owners of the Frederick turnpike have decided to sell the thoroughfare to the State at its offer of \$100,000.

Port Deposit is anxious over the effect of the McCall's Ferry dam on the ice situation. The turbine gates were opened on Tuesday and since the ice at the north end of Port Deposit has been flooded.

The saloon of Paul Bihler Hagerstown early Wednesday morning was entered by robbers who carried away about 50 quarts of whisky, and wine, a quantity of cigars and tobacco and robbed the cash register of about \$8.

Dr. Thomas Fell, president of St. John's College, announced Tuesday that he had received from Andrew Carnegie a check for \$16,700, to be applied to the debt created for the reconstruction of McDowell Hall.

The Frederick Board of Trade has forwarded to Congressman George A. Pearre, a letter in which is said: "It is with much pleasure we note the stand you have taken in the House of Representatives respecting Frederick's war claim and your position on all subjects of importance and interest to those of your district."

The Washington County Water Company which supplies Hagerstown, it is believed, will not purchase a site for a new pumping station the Willow Grove Mills property, on the Antietam creek above Fiddlersburg, on which Mayor J. McP. Scott obtained and option, as he announced to the City Council.

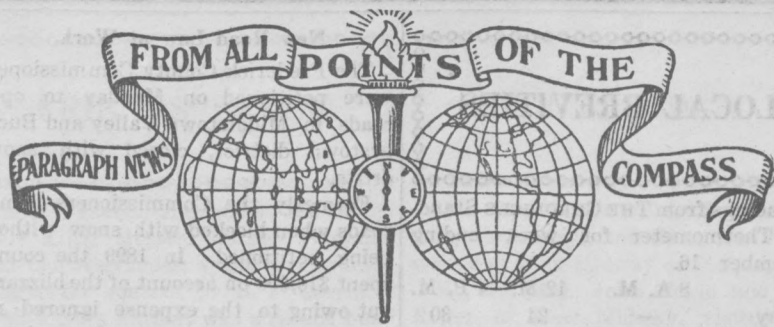

### Inheritance Tax Bill in House.

The House of Representatives on Monday passed an inheritance tax bill for the District of Columbia. The measure provides that all collateral inheritances amounting to more than \$3,000 be taxed 5 per cent., while direct inheritances up to \$10,000 be exempt; those from this amount up to \$50,000 be taxed 1 per cent.; from this up to \$200,000 2 1/2 per cent., and those above \$200,000 be made to pay 5 per cent. Numerous amendments were made before its passage.

### PROPOSED CHANGE IN RITES STIRS UP PRESBYTERIANS

Baptism by Immersion or Sprinkling Brought Up Before Pittsburgh Presbytery this Week.

A movement to substitute immersional baptism for the sprinkling method now employed by the Presbyterian Church in the United States was approved in the report of the committee to the Pittsburgh Presbytery, but, after a heated discussion, the idea was turned down.

The Rev. Dr. D. S. Schaff, of the Western Theological Seminary, chairman of the committee on bills and overtures, reported the recommendation that the words "sprinkling and pouring" be stricken from the Book of Discipline and the word "baptize" be substituted. Dr. Schaff pointed out that the word "baptism" was from the Greek, meaning "to put under," and said that even in Germany, where the Baptists had no following and the question was not an issue, the churches agreed on this point.

The movement, although a futile one, was regarded as important from the fact that the Presbyterian headquarters are nominally in Pittsburgh.

#### Where The Money Goes.

For the fiscal year ending July 1, 1910, the United States expended on the Navy, the Army and on pensions, which are the result of past wars, \$447,620,723.65, constituting 68 per cent. of the ordinary disbursement, including post office deficiency.

### UNCLE SAM PRIZE PRINTER

Published More Pamphlets Than Any Other Nation.

According to a report given out by Joseph A. Arnold, editor of publications of the Department of Agriculture, the United States government publishes more pamphlets than any other government in the world, and the Department of Agriculture publishes more than any other department.

A total of 25,190,469 copies were issued by the Agricultural Department during the past year. This is the largest output of the publication division in years.

On an average of 3,000 requests per day are received for pamphlets by the division. Most of these call for the bulletin on how to use meats economically in the home.

There is also a large demand for United States publications in Europe and in the Orient. Thirty-two thousand pounds of mail were sent abroad during the past year.

#### World Wide Opium Fight.

The State Department has announced the successful completion of long-continued negotiations for an international conference to suppress the opium traffic. With one exception all the nations addressed have agreed to the conference and word came from The Hague that May 30 next had been unanimously accepted as the date and The Hague as the place for the conference. China is one that accepted.
