valuation," says the Attorney-General, "and a very lax administration of the fruit cake hasten to get them out of subjected the Government to a very material loss of revenue. A general by undervaluation has only commenced, and this branch of the subject will now be pressed vigorously.'

The Attorney-General recommends that a general immunity statute, such as exists under the inter-State commerce laws, should be enacted to apply to criminal prosecutions generally, but says such a statue should only protect a witness from the consequence of the testimony he is about to give.

Twenty-five criminal indictments charging rebating and other illegal dis criminations are pending against railroads, private corporations and individ uals. Two convictions, with annes, were secured.

I,od frauds are probably entitled to place with the customs frauds and violations of the Anti-Trust law. In 98 civil suits against the Central Pacific Railway more than 400,000 acres of land illegally fenced were restored to the Government.

Prosecutions against the Oregon and California Railroad Company and 45 other defendants to recover 2,300,000 acres of land, valued at \$50,000,000, which the Government claims are illegally held, are now pending. There are also under way 24 suits against the Central Pacific Railway Company and others to recover thousands of acres of valuable lands which the Government contends were illegally patented, probably with the knowledge that they were valuable for the minerals and oils underneath.

In the campaign against bucketshops 350 such places were closed, others voluntarily discontinued as a result of the crusade, and indictments are pending against men and corporations and the telegraph company which allowed the use of its wires.

The Bureau of Investigation, which has built up an efficient secret police, began raids on firms charged with using the mails for fraudulent purposes. The Attorney-General recommends legisla tion to permit the agents of that bureau to administer oaths and serve processes.

During the year there were 15,371 criminal cases of all sorts in the United States courts, which produced fines, forfeitures and penalties aggregating \$1,083,974.

Mr. Wickersham recommends legislation to give the right of appeal in Indian cases, a law for the issue of search warrants for property stolen from the Government; that Federal judges be allowed traveling expenses within their own districts, and that the salaries of all Federal justices be increased. He also recommends that the statute of limitations in customs frauds be extended from three years to five years. He recommends legislation to permit the United States to sue and prosecute an offending corporation wherever that corporation may do business.

FRUIT CAKE

PRESENTED A Receipe Which Can Be Depended Upon. By Dorothy Avery Howard.

> If you have not already made your Christmas will find you in such a rush that the cakes may not be a success. annual cake baking, but many of them are no good. The experienced housekeeper will need no advice on the subject, but to the young bride, who has never tried to make this kind of cake, which is called one of the most difficult to undertake, a few suggestions and a tried recipe may not fail of appreciation. She need not fear to trust these, as they have been tested by one of the best housekeepers I know. And the cake is not as expensive as some which taste no better. One pound of butter, 1 pound of sugar, 12 eggs, 1 pound of flour, 2 teaspoons each of cinnamon and mace, 1 teaspoon each of allspice and utmeg, ½ teaspoon of cloves, 2 pounds raisins, 2 pounds currants, 1 pound citron, 1 pound almonds (after shelling), 1 wine glass of brandy, and 1 lemon. Cut the citron in rings, blanch the almonds and chop fine. Mix all the fruit out the citron with enough flour to coat it. Mix spice with sugar, cream the butter, add sugar, the beaten yolks, beaten whites, lemon rind and juice, brandy, flour and fruit.

A pan with a stem in the middle makes the cake bake better, since the heat radaiates all through it. Line the pan with grocers' dark-brown paper, which has been greased, to keep from

Another thing, which is most important of all, do not attempt to bake the cake yourself unless you are experienced in this line; for this is the test of cake making, and you cannot afford to throw away the ingredients of fruit cake or have it burned. Even some of the best cake makers send their Christmas cakes to a reliable baker, who charges only 25 cents for relieving them of all the responsibility, to say nothing of the saving in their coal bill and their time. When the cake is done, sprinkle it every few days for a week or so with port or some good wine, to insure it from getting too dry.



\$2,000,000 for That Purpose.

Senator Shelby M. Cullom, sometimes said to resemble Abraham Lincoln, has introduced a bill authorizing a memorial to Abraham Lincoln in Washington, to cost \$2,000,000. His bill creates a permanent commission composed of President Taft, Senators Wetmore and Money, and Representatives McCall and Champ Clark. The President is authorized to fill vacancies in the commission,

if any occur. The bill appropriates \$100,000 to be immediately available. The Federal Commission on Fine Arts is authorized to advise with the Lincoln commission on the design.

Paradise Not Kansas.

During the past year forty-eight of the 105 Kansas Counties, with a population of 430,274, did not send a single prisoner to the state penitentiary. Fifty-seven out of the 105 counties had not a single prisoner. not a single pauper. Eighty-seven of the 105 counties did not send a single insane patient to an institution. Kansas's death rate is the lowest in the world, seven and one-half in 1,000 persons. The state still boasts of the lowest percentage of illiteracy.
