The plan includes the location of the new plant in that city, and it is considered the best industrial stroke the city has ever made. <br> The Board of Trade has been investigating it for some time. At a meeting recently the committee appointed to look into the proposition made a favorable report and President Gambrill appointed Casper E. Cline, Emory L. Coblentz, R. Rush Lewis, Charles Wertheimer. Edward D. Shriner and D. John Markey to secure subscriptions for the sale of $\$ 30,000$ worth of bonds. This amount will be subseribed without trouble. The Frederick works, owned by home interests, are leased by John H. Mitchell, Jr., of Washington. The latter is largely interested in the new deal. |
