Thirty-two officers and men of the crew of the transatlantic liner Touraine who took part in the rescue of the passengers of the Volturo, were decorated with medals last Saturday by the French Government before the departure of the vessel for New York.

Suffrage News.

The following items from the Woman's Journal, are submitted by the Equal Suffrage League of Emmitsburg: The Danish Constitutional Amendment Bill, which includes the enfranchisement of women, has passed its third reading in the Lower House by a majority of 101 to 6, with four absentees. There is no opposition to the woman suffrage clause.

Iceland has followed Norway and Finland in granting full suffrage to women. The bill had to pass two parliaments. It was first passed in 1911, and has just passed again almost without opposition. It must be signed by the King of Denmark but this is merely a matter of form. His signature will be given as a matter of course.

The Dutch States-General, i. e. the parliament, were opened by Her Majesty Queen Wilhemina. In her speech she said that the government would proceed to the amendment of the constitution without delay, the object in view being the reform of the suffrage. All men are to have votes, and the constitutional barrier to the granting of suffrage to women contained in the words "male subject" in the electoral qualifications is to be abolished.

All Parties are for the Woman Suffrage Amendment in New Jersey.

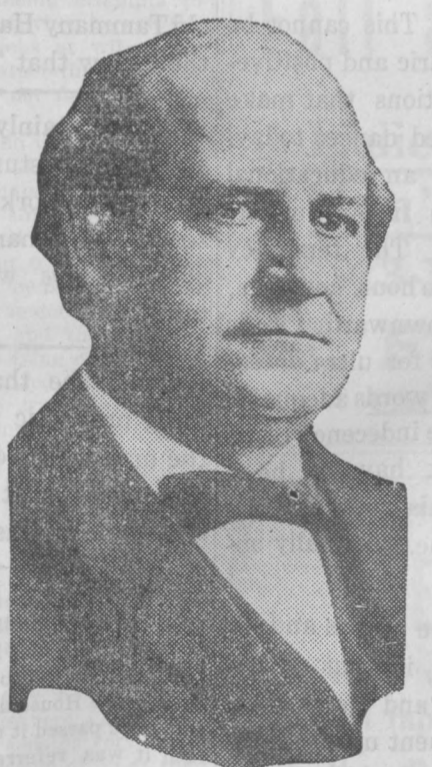
