Hot Water Heat For Barns Becoming Popular

Increased use of hot water in the dairy barn is causing many dairymen to ask what size and type of water heater should be purchased.

He explains that there are two general types of heaters in addition to the steam boilers which many farmers have. One is the "non-pressure" type while the other is the "pressure" system.

Dairymen needing more than 10 gallons of hot water per day, or needing to draw hot water at frequent intervals, will find the pressure system more satisfactory, Mr. Krewatch states.

The chart prepared by the engineer shows that about one-half gallon of 150 degree water is needed for each calf at each feeding. A gallon is needed for the average person at each washing, and a bucket of 135-degree water is needed for each five cows in preparing for milking and stimulating milk let-down.

County agents in each county have been supplied with a copy of the chart and can help guide interested dairymen.

NEW SULFA DRUG VS. COCCIDIOSIS

A new sulfonamide that is effective in preventing and controlling outbreaks of cecal ("bloody") coccidiosis in chickens has been announced.

Sulfaquinoxaline has been widely tested at poultry experimental farms and its effects on disease conditions such as coccidiosis and fowl cholera have been noted.

An outstanding feature of sulfaquinoxaline is its preventive ability against coccidiosis. When given constantly in the feed or water of chicks during the first few weeks, this drug succeeded in preventing most Eimeria tenella infections.

When used to prevent coccidiosis, sulfaquinoxaline is administered at very low dosage — 0.0125 per cent in the feed or water. As mentioned above, this dosage was constant every day through the first few weeks.

Sulfaquinoxaline is also used at a higher concentration on an intermittent schedule of medication to control outbreaks of cecal coccidiosis in chickens.

All in all, sulfaquinoxaline appears to be one of the most potent drug-aids in the war on poultry disease.

choose family names. Finally an edict was passed requiring all who had not complied by a certain date to appear before the magistrate in each district and have a family name imposed on them. Some of the magistrates with unjustified prejudice toward the Jews, imposed many insulting names on hordes of families. One unfortunate merchant was assigned the name of Scheisshund, meaning "dirty dog." He protested in vain. Finally it cost him a lot of money to have even a W inserted in the name making it Schweishund, meaning bloodhound. Other insulting names were assigned such as cabbage-head, ass-head, hog pouch, pig-style, swineheart, oxhead, cowhide, glutton, carbuncle, destitution, kiss-me-not, jail-bird, etc. Some of these derogatory names were later modified. Others had to accept them and live them down. Some vestiges of these names are found in America today. In general, however, most of the family names were chosen voluntarily and represented something very close to the heart.

day afternoon in Taneytown. Rev. Miles S. Reifsnnyder officiated. Interment was made in the Taneytown Reformed Cemetery.

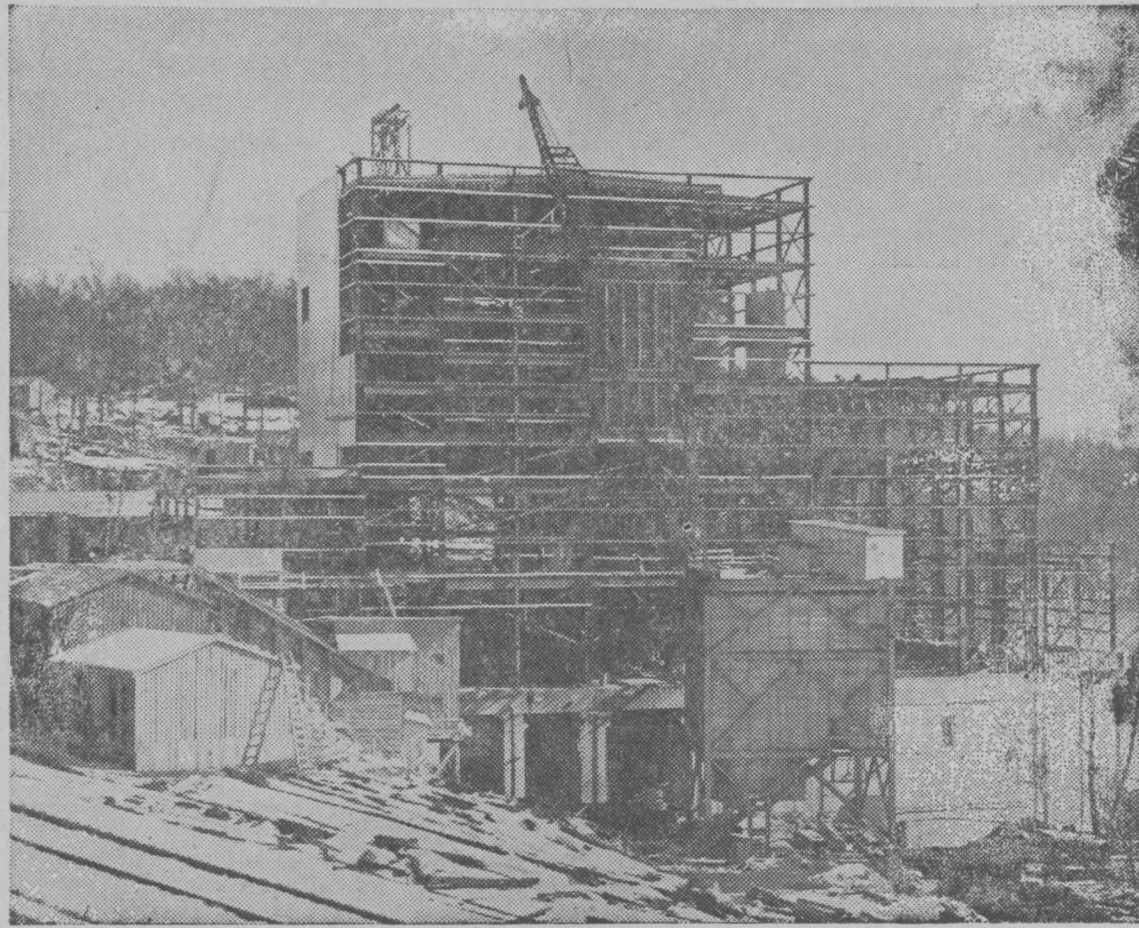
HARRY E. McCLEAF

Four Years' Research Discovers New Quality Of Milk

CHICAGO, March 3—Something new has been discovered about the nutritious quality of milk.

Science reported that milk, because of its high protein value, is an important source of niacin, a vitamin required by the body for normal health.

Working on a four-year research project at the University of Wisconsin under the sponsorship of the National Dairy Council, Chicago, Dr. Elvehjem and his associates point out that niacin's dietary values became known in the search for a cure for pellagra, a skin disease with a history of several thousand fatalities annually, particularly in the South. Patients fed milk improved in health but no one understood why. More recent research discloses that milk prevents early signs of niacin deficiencies which may occur even in persons who think they are well nourished.

The University of Wisconsin study provides proof that milk, generally thought to be low in niacin content, acquires an abundance of the much-needed vitamin for health from the protein in the milk through the process of synthesis in the body.

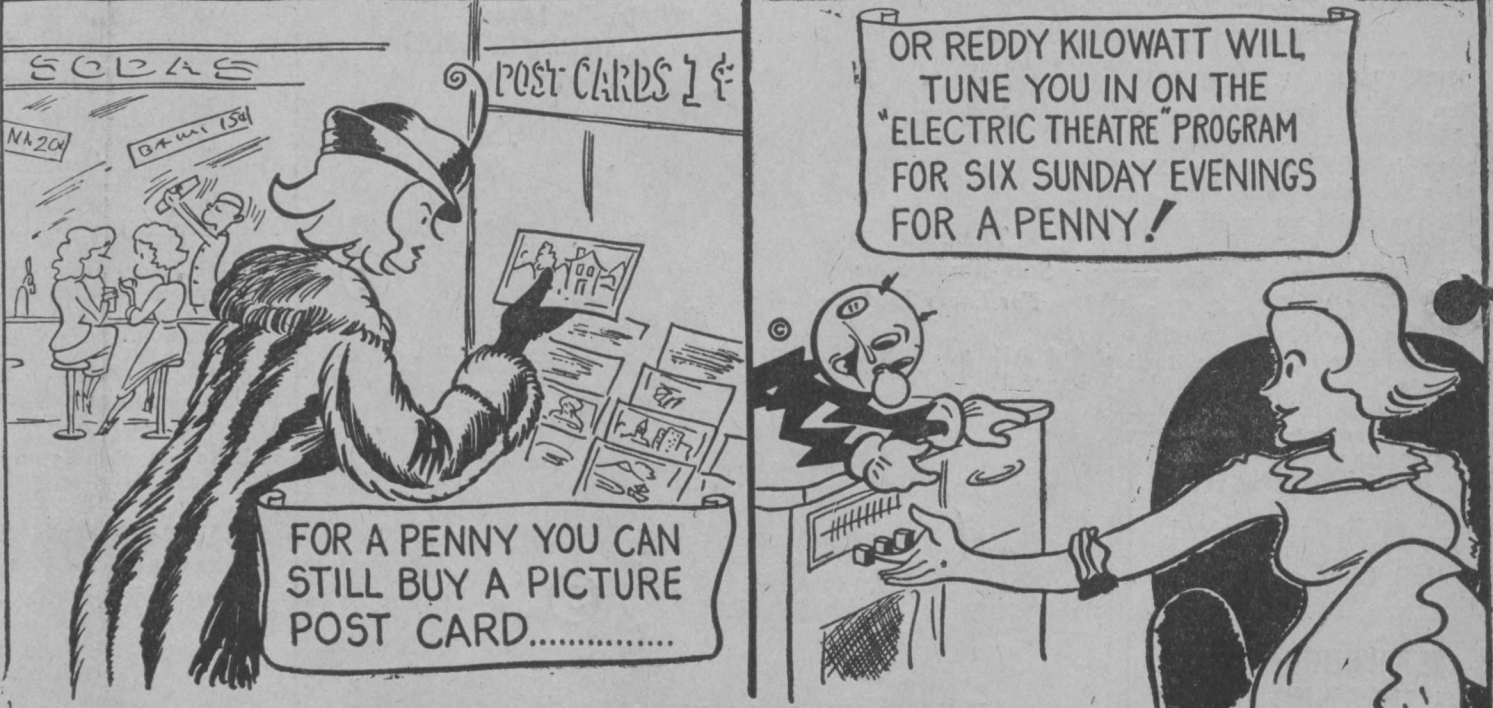
