### **COUNTY CONVICT CHARGED WITH MURDERING MAN**

Robber of Thurmont Garage Is Alleged To Have Slain Druggist in Florida

Merlin James Leiby, 25, Frederick, who forfeited a \$1,500 bond inCircuit Court there last week when he failed to appear to answer a grand larceny charge, has confessed to killing a Baltimore pharmacist in Florida, it was announced Monday by Jacksonville Florida police.

Accused of Thurmont Robberies

He was arrested two months ago following a series of robberies at O'Toole's Garage in Thur mont and was named in several indictments returned by the recent February grand jury. He was scheduled to be tried in Circuit Court last Thursday. When he failed to appear, his bondsman, quired to pay the \$1,500 by the

The seriousness of the charge in Florida left some doubt here as to whether Leiby will ever be returned to Frederick County as a fugitive. The forfeiture of the bond would result, it was said, unless Leiby can be returned to this jurisdiction. The bondsman is bound to produce the person of Leiby in court in this county.

According to dispatches received here, Detective Inspector H. V. Branch of Jacksonville said this week that Leiby had admitted killing Leonard Applebaum, 27-yearold Baltimore pharmacist. on the Tamiami Trail, about 72 miles from Miami, where the victim's body was found under a bridge over a dry creek.

Killed in Argument

Branch said Leiby told officers that he won an automobile and a large sum of money from Applebaum in a gambling game at Tam pa.In an argument later, the confession disclosed, Leiby said he shot Applebaum in self defense.

When arrested, Leiby had a .22 caliber pistol in his automobile. Applebaum was shot with .22 cal-

The police inspector said Leiby told him that he drove the body from Tampa to the point in Collier County, where he disposed of it. Later, he said he sold the car hitchhiked to Jacksonville. Branch Members of the delegation said said Leiby had not admitted know-

He also said Leiby claimed the shooting occurred after Apple baum "pulled a gun" on him in an attempt to regain the money lost in the gambling game. Leiby Veterans of Foreign Wars held said Applebaum didn't have suffi-
