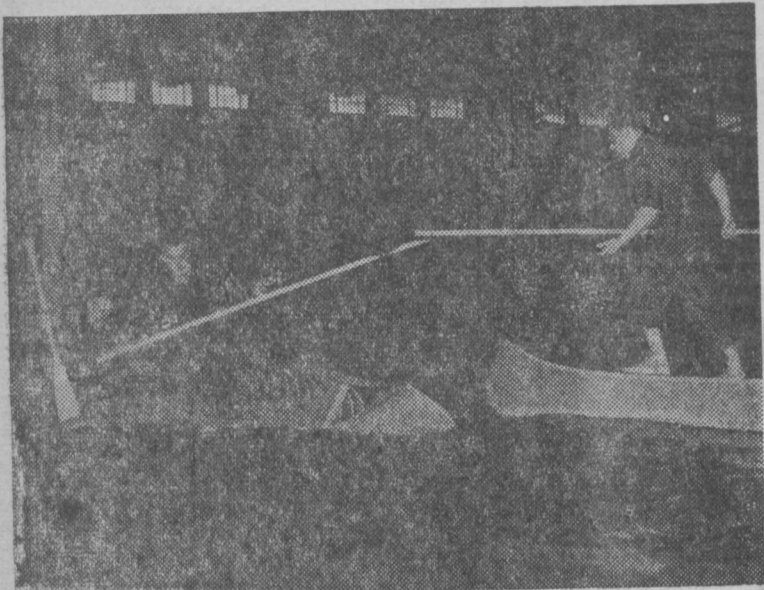


Running Stream Stocked with Trout To Be Fished at Armory Exposition

Tank and Water Carnival Feature Outdoors Show

A carload of actual outdoors—foliage, soil and water, is being moved into 5th Regiment Armory, Baltimore, for Maryland's third annual Sportsmen's and Outdoors Show, Saturday, March 19th, through Sunday, March 27th. Paraphernalia valued at more than \$500,000 will be on display in some 100,000 square feet of exhibit area featured by artificial waterfalls, a running stream stocked with trout, a wildfowl refuge, model chinchilla and mink ranches with live animals, and miniature farms cultivated by toy electric.

The show's stage is one of the country's largest for events of this kind. The tank, considered the best portable show tank in existence, is sixty by twenty-four feet. It was designed and manufactured in the plane plant of Glenn L.

give educational demonstrations on the theme of conservation. A 75-minute stage and water carnival will offer log rolling and canoe tilting contests and champion fly and bait casting exhibitions; a man and woman firearms team shooting targetttes out of each other's lips; a champ archer; and the Aquamaids, nationally famous girls' swimming team, in a water ballet.

Ben Dova, Broadway musical comedy acrobat, will introduce a new comic coon-hunting act and Chief Red Eagle, Indian master of ceremonies, will present the double show which includes educated stallions, retrieving dogs and a flock of trained pigeons and doves.

Maryland Feed and Grain Markets

The feed market in Baltimore, following the national trend, averaged about unchanged for the week ended March 18. A decrease in production of wheat mill feeds, however resulted in strengthening the Baltimore mill-feed market. Bran advanced about \$4.16 per ton—over 5% more than last week. Middlings increased about \$1.78 per ton—over 2% more than the average price on March 11.

The broiler-feed ratio for Maryland producers was unchanged for the week March 11 through March 17. Broiler prices averaged 29.8 cents per pound (29.6 cents last week). The price of 20% broiler mash on Eastern Shore on March 17 averaged \$91.72 per ton (\$91.14 per ton last week). On this basis one pound live-weight of broilers would buy 6.5 pounds of feed (6.5 last week).

Maryland Grain Markets
Grain markets in Baltimore, following the national pattern, week-end during the week ended March 18. The wheat market was

dull with little change in price. Oats were about the same as last week. Barley, contrary to the national trend, increased about eight cents per bushel on the Baltimore market. A dull market with demand slow resulted in declines in corn and soybeans.

Army Shortens Training Period To Fourteen Weeks

A revised fourteen-week program of basic military training for enlisted men was put into effect recently replacing the eight-week course, the Department of the Army announced.

The Army explained that the eight-week basic course was being increased to fourteen weeks now that the Army has reached its authorized strength. The mission of the basic program is to effect a smooth transition from civilian to Army life and produce basically trained soldiers through the study of fundamental military subjects essential to all branches of the Army. It emphasizes physical conditioning and discipline, develops pride in self and pride in the Army.

After completion of basic training, the majority of the men will join units in the United States or overseas. In the units, the new soldiers will receive advanced training in the branch to which they are assigned such as infantry, artillery or armored cavalry. Others will attend technical training schools in military specialties.

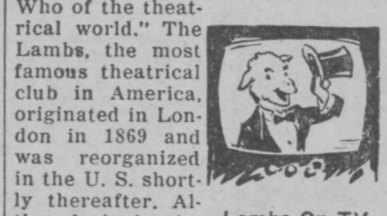

County Tax Receipts Highest on Record

Over three quarters of a million dollars was collected in current county taxes during the month of February, undoubtedly the largest total of any month in the history of the county.

County Treasurer James H. Falk said Wednesday the figure was \$755,165.24. State tax collections on 1949 levy during the same month amounted to \$37,255.89. They were the largest collections for any month since Mr. Falk has been treasurer and he believes that they set a new record for the county, which in many past years used to collect no more than \$750,000 over a whole year.

The collection total in February, 1948, was \$678,045.99 and in 1947 it was \$613,322.79.

The county's new assessable basis is \$80,639,440 and the estimated total revenue is \$1,080,571.17 for 1949.

Business personal property tax bills are not included in the collections, Mr. Falk said. Under a new regulation which went into effect last year the business personal property bills are prepared from yearly inventory schedules filed with the Supervisor of Assessments in January.

\$1,000,000 IMPROVEMENT TO STATE SANATORIUM

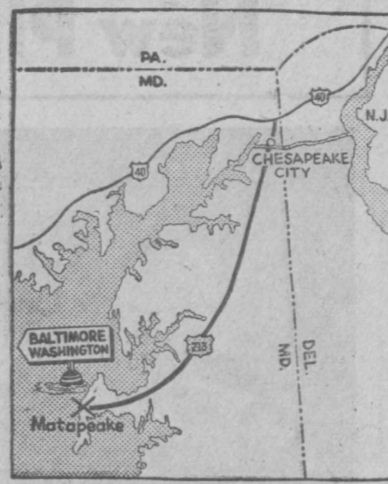
Gov. Lane recommended recently a \$5,731,555 improvement program for the four sanatoria of Maryland so that Maryland might have "up-to-date" State hospitals for the treatment of tuberculosis.

The Governor suggested the money be spent on a modernization program for the institutions:

At Maryland Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Sabillasville—a \$1,022,700 construction program, including a new 4-story wing on one of the buildings. The \$900,000 addition would be used for vocational rehabilitation facilities, new kitchens, dining rooms, a library, and "a number of additional beds."

Another \$30,000 would be used to enclose four open-type patients' cottages. The remainder would be spent on miscellaneous improvements.

New Delaware Canal Span Rises



Important link for traffic between North and South on Eastern Seaboard rises at Chesapeake City, Md., where engineers of U. S. Steel's American Bridge Co. are erecting the 4,000-foot bridge over the Delaware Canal. The bridge will feature a 540-foot arch span which will rise 235 feet above the water and provide 135 foot clearance above the channel. This

will permit passage of ocean-going vessels on a short-cut route to Baltimore and other Chesapeake Bay ports. It eliminates current ferry service and will be completed in the Fall of 1949 at a cost of \$3.5 million. The new structure will replace an old draw bridge demolished by a French Tanker in 1942. Workmen are shown erecting girder approaches.

CROWN MARYLAND WHEAT CHAMPION



George F. Bayne

George F. Bayne of Fallston, Maryland, has been awarded the Philip W. Pillsbury trophy for growing the best wheat in his state, as judged at the Annual Corn and Grain show, conducted by the Department of Agriculture at the University of Maryland.

Bayne grew the prize-winning wheat on 25 acres of his 65-acre Harford County Farm, where he also raises potatoes and corn. He grows his wheat from certified seed, and has raised as much as 46 bushels per acre.

Bayne's sample of prize-winning wheat has been forwarded to Minneapolis where it will be judged for the national Philip W. Pillsbury prize on March 23. The national prize includes a large trophy, \$100 in cash, and an all-expense trip to Minneapolis as guest of the donor.



KITCHEN MEMO

Put that individual touch to meal for guests or when you feel the family would especially appreciate your adding a decorative food, serve Orange Sweet Potato Basket. Squeeze the juice from 6 large orange halves. Remove and discard the membrane. Cut the edges of the orange shells in a scallop design. Mash 2 cups cooked sweet potatoes and beat in 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 tbsp. brown sugar and 1 tsp. salt. Pile sweet potato mixture into orange shells. Dot with 1 tbsp. melted butter or margarine. Place on broiler tray under a medium flame and broil 12 mins. Save time and gas by serving a complete broiler meal including thick ham slices and broiled grapefruit halves.

An 1890 cook book advised cooks to drop water on the oven bottom. If the water hissed, the oven was supposed to be hot enough for baking. Today the thermostat on modern gas ranges keeps baking temperatures at exactly the degree needed.

Yellow and light green celery tops combined with brown onion skins simmered in water over a low flame for about 20 minutes makes a nourishing and tasty drink. The liquid can be added to soups and gravies for flavoring.

Water has some sediment in it. To keep your automatic gas water heater free of this sediment, once a month draw off a quart or two of water until it flows clean.

When washing windows in cold weather add a little vinegar or household ammonia to the water to prevent it from freezing on the glass.

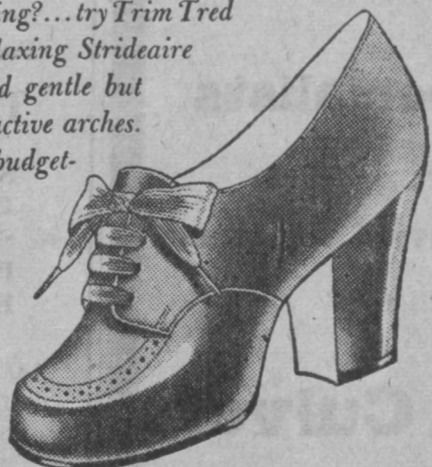
